This month's cover picture is of Lode Mill (©Ashley Dace 2001). Back in 1896 it used to be a cement mill with 4 cement kilns producing some 40 tonnes per week! The business expanded with two more kilns and produced cement and fertilizer until 1920. Apparently, the cement produced was not of the best 'Portland' quality. It was run by the Bottisham Lode Cement Co.

The churchwardens from the Anglesey Benefice have been meeting together and with officials from the Diocese of Ely and communicating by email, hopefully to bring about a successful outcome.



I am delighted to report that the final sum raised, as a result of our Easter Gift Day Appeal, is £6250 which is a magnificent response. I would like to thank each and every one of you who has donated. Although only around 1% of Bottisham residents regularly attend our church services nearly 10% responded to our appeal. We have already met with our Church Architect and are discussing our rebuilding priorities. Should we repair the roof – which has stopped leaking at present since the repairs were done or start to repair the extensive crumbling clunch stone of the South Clerestory?

In the month of June we held funeral services in the church, for three former Bottisham Residents; Rocco Fabitene, Liesel Boughton-Fox and Christopher Nowak. Our thoughts and prayers are with their families at this very sad time. Many thanks to the teams that supported these ceremonies.

For the next couple of months our church services will revert back to our normal pattern. Revd. Keith Morrison will lead us for Holy Communion on the first Sunday of July while Sarah Maxwell will take a service of Morning Prayer on the third Sunday of each month. On the first Sunday of August, the 6th, we will be privileged to host a service of Holy Communion led by the Bishop of Huntingdon, the Rt Revd. Dagmar Winter. Please try to come along and hear what she has to say to us. Finally on September 3rd Revd. Liz Caswell, another Bottisham resident, will come to lead our Communion service. Our toddler group will continue to meet on a Tuesday morning starting around 9.30am in term time. All are very welcome to attend. A small team continues to take a service monthly at Hilton Park and Oaklands on the second Wednesday of the month.

The grasses in the churchyard have grown enormously in the past few weeks and I am liaising with officials at the Cambridgeshire Eco Churchyard project with regard to a formal inspection and certification. If anyone is interested in helping with this project, please contact me.

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Dear Editor

Bird Brain's delightful article about the Sky Lark in last month's Cresset has inspired me to pen just how fortunate we are here in Bottisham to live in countryside surrounded by the indispensable habitat required for the survival of species such as the Sky Lark. There is even reported sightings of the rare Silver Studded Blue butterfly which thrives on a chalk grassland habitat. But sadly, unlike many villages in the countryside, Bottisham is a prime target for the ravages of misplaced development thus putting this unique habitat under threat. Indeed, if you are followers of programmes such as Countryfile, These Wild Isles and Springwatch you will be acutely aware of the loss of Britain's flora and fauna. Some estimate this to be in excess of ninety per cent over the past sixty or so years. A hard fact to take in but a fact repeatedly made by organisations such as the Countryside Alliance, CPRE, RSPB and the Wildlife Trust.

Furthermore, the National Trust, being but one, has said that over forty per cent of the UK's native species of wildlife is in decline, and that the UK is one of the most nature depleted countries in the world with many of our wild habitats becoming fragile and fragmented. This argument is supported in a recent poll by Orb where a vast majority of people also believe that the countryside should be regarded as part of Britain's national heritage. In this epoch of climate change political leaders and Local Planning Authorities are being encouraged to pay far more attention in making protection of the countryside, environment conservation and wildlife more robust.

After being buttonholed on a similar topic by a social acquaintance a few weeks my retort was it was my belief that whilst most people in this village supported local enterprise, initiative and entrepreneurialism many feel it should nevertheless be achieved within the planning rules that safeguard protected areas and that defend existing residential amenities. Personally I would go even further and say that NO special case can ever exist for building on land with protected status. Just because more suitable (brownfield) sites elsewhere are not in a particular land owner's possession is no justification whatsoever for concreting over centuries old local heritage assets that have provided and continue to provide a biodiverse sanctuary.

Parish Council Report

Firstly, I would like to welcome Cllrs Shaker, Socea & Laurent, who were co-opted to the Parish Council at our June meeting. I am grateful to them for stepping forwards to serve the village in this way and am confident they will make an excellent contribution. However we still have one vacancy and would love to see that filled, so that we are at full strength to take forwards the number of projects in front of us. If you feel that this is a way in which you might be able to support your community, please email the Clerk (clerk@bottisham-pc.gov.uk.) and we would be pleased to discuss further with you.

THE END OF THE BEGINNING!!

Having battled through years of challenge and delays with Covid, I am pleased to report that we finally obtained planning consent to build a new cemetery on 22nd May - some 11 years on from our first working party meeting!! What a marathon!! But it is only the end of the beginning. The next stage is compulsory purchase to be exercised by ECDC. This is not a fast process but, with a following wind, we should be able to commence construction next summer. Optimistically we may then be able to open the cemetery in 2025 - just as we reach capacity in our current cemetery!!

It is important to point out that we hope to establish not only a cemetery, but a much needed leisure amenity for the village. In liaison with a National Trust landscape consultant and other specialists, we have designed what should be a pleasing place to walk and enjoy nature - with extensive planting of trees and shrubs. We hope it will also provide an educational resource for our many school students to explore nature and ecology.

We have presented the developing plans for the cemetery at Annual Parish Meetings over the years and received input from residents. However, if you have not had a chance to view them, there is an introduction to the project on the Parish Council web-site that you might like to read.

BOTTISHAM GREENWAY

There has been much activity around the proposals for the Swaffham & Bottisham Greenways. While supportive of encouraging walking/cycling into Cambridge, all the East Cambs villages impacted by the proposals have been concerned at the lack of consultation with residents - and have had many concerns with the plans. Cllrs Wilson, Winkcup and I recently attended a meeting with representatives from Swaffham Bulbeck, Lode & Swaffham Prior Parish Councils (attended also by County Councillor Alan Sharp) to discuss our response. We are drafting a joint letter to the GCP expressing our concerns at the lack of consultation.

On the plus side the project team have responded positively to requests from Councils to meet on -site to discuss our concerns. On 8th June members of Bottisham Parish Council, supported by District Cllrs Cane and Trapp, had a constructive on-site meeting with the project team viewing the areas impacted. The project team also met separately with the

Village College. We have yet to see what impact our meetings have had on the revised plans, but are hopeful that an improved and more practical solution is forthcoming.

BUSES!!

An item that received a lot of discussion at the June Council meeting. The No. 12 bus is providing a good service into Cambridge and residents of villages along the B1102 are also benefiting from a faster service into the city with the re-routing of the No.11 bus. However the lack of connection between Bottisham and local villages remains a matter of great concern - as we know from resident's communications.

The AtoB 1102 group has provided an excellent cross-village approach and voice on local transport and this is very much on their radar. The group is planning to shortly survey transport needs across the villages, in order to generate a well reasoned case to persuade the authorities to find a solution. Albeit sadly nothing is likely to change until the and of the current contracts in March 2024.

LITTER PICKING

It is always a pity to see the large amount of litter blowing around our streets after "bin day". A lot of this is generated by bags broken open by wildlife, often tempted by food waste. Could I please encourage us all to follow the "Street Scene Team" guidance, to use your green bin for food waste and rinse off food residues on non-recyclable packaging.

The Parish Council employ two litter pickers to keep the villages streets clean. We currently have a vacancy for a litter picker and you will see an advert in this magazine for a replacement. Could I please ask you to consider whether you or someone you know might be able to step in to fill the gap?

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County Council Report

SWAFFHAM HEATH ROAD/ A1303 CROSSROADS

This continues to be delayed awaiting the signature on the land sale to enable the staggered junction to be constructed. The delay to the commencement of these works has been very frustrating and it is hoped that work will commence very soon on this much needed road improvement.

ROAD MAINTENANCE & POTHOLES

I have had continued comments from residents about the poor state of roads around the County. I continue to be in constant contact with Highways officers to get the necessary roads repaired to the level that is expected. The recent Bell Road repairs are not, in my opinion, up to standard and I am trying to get a more sustainable job done.

I proposed a motion at the recent Full County Council meeting on 16th May, asking that in view of the budget for road maintenance not increasing with inflation, there has been an effective cut of \pounds 710k in the road maintenance budget and demanding that the full amount of the extra monies from Government totalling about £3.6m is put into the road maintenance budget, together with a draft action plan submitted in July.

The ruling group have agreed that a draft action plan will be provided to the next Highways & Transport Committee meeting in July showing the improvements in dealing with highways maintenance.

GREENWAYS

There is still a large amount of concern over the proposals by the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) around the village. I will continue to represent residents and assist the Parish Council, in ensuring that whatever is decided has the backing of the Parish Council and represents the wishes of the community, as I have grave concerns about the GCP proposals together with the governance of those proposals.

CONGESTION CHARGE

The results of the Congestion Charge consultation were announced on May 26th. The results showed 58% against the congestion charging proposals and whilst there was over 70% in favour of improved bus services, that was not linked to how they would be funded. Most residents want better bus services, but the issue is how are those funded, as the congestion charge proposal is certainly not the solution. I will continue to object to any imposition of a daily charge on residents driving in Cambridge.

BUSES

The bus service run by Stephensons appears to be running satisfactorily. However, there are issues with the number 11 buses not going into Bottisham, as the previous service, which means that residents are not able to access the Bottisham GP surgery, as before.

The Combined Authority (CPCA) are producing a bus plan, but this has been a very long time in the making and I have little confidence, that it will produce the solution that residents desire. I now sit as the East Cambs District Council representative on the CPCA Transport & Infrastructure Committee and will ensure that the current plan is more fit for purpose than previously submitted and that we can get the changes to services that will help residents in their daily lives.

I am here to represent you, so if there are any issues that concern you, please contact me. If I am not aware of an issue, I am not able to solve it.

Lucy Frazer MP for South East Cambridgeshire writes

Dear Residents,

I know how valuable local assets are to every community. It is therefore important that we do all we can to protect them.

The Community Ownership Fund does this by enabling communities to take ownership of assets at risk of closure, sale or dereliction so they can be enjoyed once again by local people.

Both parish councils and incorporated voluntary or community organisations are invited to apply for the latest round of funding, which is open from 31 May - 12 July 2023.

Up to £1 million is available for all asset types (which is an increase on the previous limit of $\pounds 250,000$) and funds can cover up to 80 per cent of the total capital funds required, with applicants required to raise the other 20 per cent from other sources.

Bonfires or Smoke Nuisance

There is no by-law in the Bottisham district which states when you can have a bonfire & we have no smoke control areas. Although bonfires are not banned, they should be avoided as the ash, smoke & odour they produce are common causes of complaints. Bonfires are often seen as an easy way of disposing of garden waste but they are not environmentally friendly. You should try & make full use of the civic amenity sites in the area that take green waste. Details of the local facilities can be found on the Cambridgeshire County Council & Suffolk County Council websites.

You should only have a fire when absolutely necessary but if you must have a fire there are clear Dos & Don'ts which can help you avoid causing a nuisance!

DO

• Do think about the wind direction & where the smoke is likely to go.

- Do make your neighbours aware that you intend to have a fire. This gives them the opportunity to close windows & take in washing. Especially on these summer evenings!
- Do choose the location carefully. Make sure it is away from trees, fences & buildings.
- Do avoid lighting a fire during unsuitable weather conditions. Smoke will hang in the air on damp still days but can blow across gardens & roads if it is too windy.

DON'T

- Don't burn damp garden waste as this will produce thick smoke.
- Don't burn plastics, rubber, foam, car tyres, etc as this will produce toxic black smoke.
- Don't allow the fire to smoulder overnight. Rake over the ashes to make sure it is fully extinguished.

Under the Environmental Protection Act 1990 (EPA) it is an offence to cause a statutory nuisance. To be considered as such a bonfire would usually have to be a regular problem & interfering substantially with the wellbeing, comfort or enjoyment of your property. Commenting on the upcoming season, Councillor Tom Sanderson, Chair of the County Council's Communities, Social Mobility and Inclusion Committee said: "Everyone is welcome to the Summer Season programme of events, which will be our 11th season of arts activities in libraries. I'm proud to say that we have been successful in our funding application to Arts Council, enabling us to continue until 2026. The programme relies on members of the community to help select the forthcoming programme. We were delighted that this year's programme was built on the selections of around 600 people who told us what they would like to see in their libraries."

I too, was invited to a meeting to discuss the production of a revised village magazine, held in, I think, Susan Threlfall's house on the High Street After wondering for a while why I was there, the penny dropped when someone said "Of course we'll need someone to type the magazine." That would be me then! Of course I was pleased to take on the job. It was typed on a long carriage typewriter (which is still in my loft) on stencils inserted sideways into the manual typewriter. Christine Bryant was the editor at that time.

It wasn't an easy typing job, we had no 'cut and paste' and the right- and left-hand pages were quite separate, e.g. page 10 on the left was typed up with, say, page 41 on the right. So to continue an article from page 6 to page 7 could throw the whole magazine out. It certainly didn't have as many pages in the early days.

Computers made the whole production much easier, but they came in after my time and I recall burning the midnight oil every month and a lot of pink correction fluid! The stencils were then passed to Sylvia in the Resources Office at the College to be manually run off on the Roneo.

I do regret not keeping copies of the early magazines I typed – it would be interesting to see how much styles have changed.

What you are doing is working but this is no reason to rest on our laurels – our target to cover all our costs continues high – about £17m in fact! So, when you see that little red collection box 'winking' at you by the till, please respond with a few coins, some coins, Lots of coins! Purchasing methodology is changing, rapidly, so please carry real money even though you often use 'plastic' to pay.


There are, however, many other ways through which you can support us and help make a difference. 2022 saw EAAA tasked with over 2500 missions, attending 443 cardiac arrests, 386 road traffic collisions, 268 falls, 354 other medical emergencies and, would you believe, 60 assaults!

Unfortunately, where cardiac arrests are concerned, survival rates for patients who do not receive early bystander CPR or defibrillation are incredibly low, so we know anytime the bells ring for a cardiac arrest mission, time is essential. The wife of one such patient, Chris, was able to give CPR followed by the crew's assessment, critical care on scene and subsequent treatment at Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital. Recovery has not been straightforward, Chris having suffered two strokes, a bleed on his brain and another cardiac arrest. He spent four weeks in a coma, six in critical care plus another week on a ward. Nearly a year on, Chris is recovering well and reflects how crucially important to his survival had been his wife's CPR, EAAA critical care and the whole sequence of support.

Help EAAA save lives in East Anglia - 'together we save lives'.

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Public Transport Matters

There's good news again this month as the £2 maximum adult single bus fare (at all times) has been extended to run until the end of October, courtesy of funding from central Government (the Department for Transport). This is a way of the Government financially supporting bus services while at the same time making it cheaper and more attractive for people to use them. Nearly all bus services in this area are included. So while that means that the adult single bus fare from Bottisham, Swaffham Bulbeck or Lode into either Cambridge or Newmarket is only £2, so too is the single bus fare from Cambridge to, say, Bedford (on the hourly and fast Stagecoach 905 bus) or Saffron Walden on the hourly Stagecoach 7 bus. These are bargain prices, and low fares are also set to continue beyond October, with a small increase then in the bus single fare upper limit to £2.50 running until at least the end of the year and probably longer. See https://www.gov.uk/guidance/2-bus-fare-cap for a list of all bus services that are included in the scheme.

Train travellers will have seen extensive works in recent weeks next to the railway line south of Cambridge by the Biomedical Campus adjacent to the Addenbrookes site. All was revealed in a lengthy BBC News article published in early June (www.bbc.co.uk/news/uk-england-cambridgeshire-65807808) where we learnt that the Government had agreed to fully fund the construction of this new Cambridge South railway station. Due to open in 2025, the new station will mean that Cambridge will overtake 'the other place' in rail terms, as while Oxford got its second railway station in 2015, before Cambridge did in the form of Cambridge North, the opening of Cambridge South will put our city 'in the lead', as it were.

Also confirmed recently was Government commitment to the new East-West Rail extension running from Oxford but then east of Bedford on to Cambridge. A southernapproach route into Cambridge (via the new Cambridge South station) has also been given official 'preference', but no doubt there is still much to play for before the new railway line is built, which is probably unlikely to be before the 2030s.

But to turn to new railway lines that can actually be experienced now, the half-hourly train service from Cambridge direct to Gatwick Airport and on to Brighton, stops on the way at the central London station at Faringdon. This enables connection to the new 'Elizabeth Line' service – formerly known as Crossrail. It fully opened on 21st May this year and provides fast, smooth and frequent services between Reading and Heathrow Airport on the west, via Paddington and Bond Street, to Canary Wharf, London City Airport, Woolwich, Abbey Wood and Shenfield (Essex) to the east. Now carrying over 3.5 million passengers per week in airy, spacious trains, and stopping at large, stunningly-designed stations, this is a hugely impressive facility and has made it much easier to travel quickly to key points at the heart of central London and out to major suburbs.

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District Councillors' Report

At the Council's Annual meeting Cllr Mark Goldsack was elected as the Council's Chair. John is on the Finance & Assets, Planning, and Licensing Committees and the Licensing Sub-Committee (non-statutory). Charlotte is on the Licensing and Audit Committees and the Licensing Sub-Committee (statutory). John is the Lib Dem's lead member on Licensing and Charlotte is the lead member on Audit.

All the Chairs and Vice-Chairs are Conservatives, which is not surprising as they have 15 Councillors to the Lib Dems 13. What is surprising, is how little they have shared these roles around their Group. Cllr Julia Huffer Chairs the Operational Services and Licensing Committees; Cllr Alan Sharp is Chair of Finance & Assets and Vice-Chair of the Operational Services Committee; while Cllr David Brown will be particularly busy as Vice-Chair of Council, Vice-Chair of Planning and Chair of Audit.

The Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) has published the responses to its consultation on better public transport and congestion charging. Whilst more than 70% of people were in favour of the future transport network 58% of people were opposed to paying for it through the Congestion Charge. The full report can be seen at MC22-consultation-report (greatercambridge.org.uk). Just 1,061 of the respondents were from East Cambridgeshire. Franchising of bus services would help by bringing routes, timetables and fares under public control—but would need a reliable source of income to fund it. The Greater Cambridge Partnership must think again and find an acceptable way to fund the public transport improvements local people want and need.

We have been working with the GCP and Parish Councils to ensure that local needs are fully considered in the planned Greenways – cycle ways into Cambridge. They were consulted on before the Covid lockdowns and there has been little local engagement since, although they are due to be installed by 2024. Most residents will welcome improved cycle routes, but they need to be the right routes and their design needs to reflect the character and current use of our villages.

Because of the Bank Holiday on 28 August, the waste collections in that week will be one day later than normal. We hope you all enjoy the Bank Holiday weekend and the Summer holidays.

Our July meet your Councillors will be on Wednesday 19 July from 6.30-7.30 at the Committee Room of the Bottisham Sports & Social Club. We will not be holding a meeting in August, due to summer holidays.

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Mothers Anglesey Group Mothers' Union

Fellow members from Three Rivers and Burwell branches joined us in May for Sue Claydon's presentation on her visits to Rwanda, and education for women initiatives in Africa. Rwanda is known as land of a thousand hills. Its stunning scenery and warm, friendly people offer unique experiences in one of the most remarkable countries in the world. It is blessed with extraordinary biodiversity, with incredible wildlife living throughout its volcanoes, montane rainforest and sweeping plains. Kigali, city and capital of Rwanda is located in the centre of the country. Kigali was a trade centre (after 1895) during the German colonial administration and became a regional centre during the Belgian colonial period (1919–62). It became the capital upon Rwanda's independence in 1962. During the 1994 genocide, thousands of Tutsi in Kigali were killed by Hutu gangs and the Rwandan army. Sue worked in Rwanda during the 1970's in an educational role, and met her husband there. Sue's most recent visits took place in 2017 and 2019.

Sue's PowerPoint presentation began with the vast differences in the lives of women in Africa to those here in the UK. The long distances to obtain safe clean water, collection of fuel, and working hard to provide shelter for children as refugees. Sue visited St. Gabriel's Mothers' Union Branch the first formed in Shyogwe Diocese (a 150-minute drive from Kigali). Their members wear beautiful uniforms of long blue skirts with piece of pure white cloth wrapped across and along the back. They meet in the Primary School, and here one of the members told her life story. She had no family, as all her relatives were lost in the genocide. MU had transformed her life, by providing her with support and care. When she suffered a broken arm, MU members tended her land and gathered the harvest whilst she was recovering. Another lady was given the opportunity to attend a training course so that she can teach ladies to make beaded craft to sell. Sue was also taken to the Genocide Memorial on the outskirts of Shyogwe, an experience she found very emotional!

Sue also travelled up to the highest parts of the Diocese, in a car that had no rear seat safety belts, and wheels that frequently spun on the road. Here young people are trained in tailoring and carpentry. There is a full ministry for unmarried mothers, preventing expulsion from their family, baby care training, and birth control. A savings and credit scheme has been set up, including one for children so they have money for text books and school uniforms. Prior to Sue's visit to Rwanda she was given two MU badges by the families of dearly departed members. Sue had the privilege of presented these to the groups' two youngest MU members.

Before closing in prayer, Sue briefly gave us information on how Kenyan volunteers support 1700 families affected by HIV/AIDS. In the recent Sudan hostilities, how women had managed to escape from Khartoum, and the Bishop and children escaped to a safer place from the Cathedral.

Our meetings usually take place on the third Thursday of the month, at 2.30pm in Fassage Hall, Lode. On 20th July Revd. Valerie Kilner will be speaking to us about the MU theme for this year 'Transformation Now', and in August we will be holding our Summer Afternoon Tea.

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Bottisham Bird Brain

Have you ever thought about how birds are named? No I'm not talking about the Latin names. Although I am quite fond of name-dropping in Latin occasionally, that topic could form the basis of an entire thesis, itself! Let us take a little look at the everyday names which, we'll see, are more colloquial than scientific.

Obviously, family names play a major part in nomenclature: finch, thrush, tit, warbler and so on. But distinguishing one species from another is very often a matter of description –



either plumage (Blackbird, Greenfinch), shape (Long Tailed Tit, Crossbill), behaviour (Treecreeper, Oystercatcher), or a mixture of these things (Willow Warbler, Great Spotted Woodpecker, Pied Wagtail). There are even a few with onomatopoeic names... I'm sure most people are familiar with the songs of the Cuckoo and Chiffchaff.

Anyway, my previous jottings about birds with distinctive songs, and farmland species whose populations have declined, got me thinking about a bird with an interesting name and an interesting song that is, sadly, not heard as often as in yesteryear but is, happily, showing signs of recovery. The Yellow Bunting (Emberiza Citronella) – commonly known as the Yellowhammer – is not likely to frequent your garden on a regular basis, given its preference for open land, bushes and hedgerows, but they are still a common sight and sound around Bottisham if you keep your eyes and ears open.

Be careful if you ever discuss Yellowhammers with Americans, though... they have a totally different Yellowhammer, a local Alabama name for a bird properly called a Northern Flicker. It is, in fact, a member of the woodpecker family and is known for hammering on the bark of a tree to flush out insects.

Back to the UK... there are a number of Buntings in this country. They are closely related to the Finch family, from which they differ in some subtle ways, such as slightly flatter heads and longer shape. The Yellowhammer is one of the commonest and most easily identified because of the bright yellow head and breast, especially of the male. So – why is it called Yellowhammer? It's actually not as evocative as you might think, and nothing to do with behaviour! The origin of the English name Bunting is not known, but the genus name 'Emberiza', comes from Old German, and the German word for Bunting is 'Ammer'. Aha!

On to the song, then, which is famously characterised as "Little bit o' bread and no cheese"! The male bird will sit on the top twig of a bush – often a favourite one – and proudly issue this claim on his territory repeatedly. The song comprises a slightly harsh-sounding series of short high-pitched notes followed by the elongated flourish ("cheeeeese") at the end. Just to confuse us, he'll sometimes settle for just the bread and do without the "cheese", as if he's been interrupted, mid-stanza; and occasionally he will forget about the bread and simply call "cheese" a few times – not to be confused with the Greenfinch's deeper, more powerful wheezing call, usually written as "zweee", which you are much more likely to hear in your garden!

The Yellowhammer is resident throughout the UK and there is little evidence of migratory tendencies in our domestic population even though winter numbers – like many other passerines – are swelled by some visitors from northern Europe seeking easier pickings in our milder climate. There is a familiar story in terms of overall numbers though: the Yellowhammer population has decreased by over 50% since the 1980s, for similar reasons as the Skylark's difficulties. However, they, too, are beginning to benefit from initiatives like the Countryside Stewardship Scheme and from the wildlife-friendly farming methods exemplified by the RSPB's Hope Farm, Knapwell project.

Another piece of good news that I'd like to share with you is a nature reserve I recently discovered near Wicken. It's called Kingfisher's Bridge and was the brainchild of retired farmer Andrew Green (Greens of Soham) who, in the mid-1990s, set about converting 250 acres of arable farmland alongside the River Cam into a reserve of wetland, meadow and woodland habitats, now home to all manner of local wildlife. Central to the area is a wonderful lagoon which provides sustenance for a variety of ducks, geese and waders, and the reedbeds offer some of the best views of Marsh Harriers anywhere in East Anglia. It's also worth mentioning that these reeds were the first artificially-created habitat in the UK to host breeding Bitterns – the first in Cambridgeshire since 1938.

The Kingfishers Bridge Wetland Creation Trust continues to research conservation management in the Fens and beyond and provides a valuable resource for school groups and other educational programmes. If you want to know more about their work and visiting options, go to www.kingfishersbridge.org There is a visitors' centre on-site and hides for nature-watching, so when you have a couple of hours to spare, go and have a look for yourself. Last time I was there, I bagged 43 different species of bird, including a calling male Cuckoo, a rare Little Gull, and witnessed an aerial 'dogfight' between a sparrowhawk and a hobby, rivalling each other for a 'kill'. But it's worth the effort just for a pleasant walk – listening to all the birds in the reeds, trees and bushes and trying to distinguish the various songs and calls. You can practice separating a Robin from a Blackcap, a Willow Warbler from a Chiffchaff, a Whitethroat from a Sedge Warbler, and yes – a Greenfinch from a Yellowhammer!

By the way, the Yellowhammer was one of birds that inspired "The Northamptonshire Peasant Poet", John Clare, who is said to have written poems about 147 different species of British birds...!

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Community Herb Bed News

The herbs are growing nicely and since our latest tidy, they are looking well cared for again.

I would like to thank my fellow volunteers for their help, including keeping the newer plants watered well, during the long dry period that we have recently had.

Do please have a look and take a snip of herbs when you need some. We don't have everything, but we continue to add plants all of the time. There are still a few flowering perennials to be enjoyed. The lavender plants are beginning to flower, so expect to see bees visiting the beds over the summer months.



Herb of the month:- DILL HISTORY

Despite this herb originating in western Asia and southern Europe, its common name is said to have come from the Old Norse dilla or Anglo-Saxon dylle, meaning to soothe or lull. This is because Dill was used to calm infants who had hiccups. Gripe water, sold over the counter still contains some herbs, including dill seed oil, depending on the formula.

GROWING

Although dill can be bought in many supermarkets, when in stock, you may wish to try growing your own supply. Dill seeds can be directly sown outdoors. They prefer a poor, well-drained soil. It is a short lived annual herb, but self-seeds easily. Consider that if you also grow fennel close by, then cross-pollination can occur. The resulting seeds will be hybrids of the two herbs.

The plants can grow to 3ft and they make an attractive addition to the flower border as well as to herb beds. The plants will develop delicate clusters of small yellow flowers if left at the end of the season.

RECIPE INSPIRATION

On a recent walk, I enjoyed a lunch stop at the River Terrace café in St Ives.

I chose to have the Pea and Feta toast.

This looks fairly simple to replicate and I have just listed the ingredients included on their menu, so you can play around with the ingredients, depending on your preference and what you have at home. **Some ingredients may contain Allergens, so please check carefully**.

- INGREDIENTS (serves 2)
- Your own choice of toast (sourdough or other fresh bread would work well)
- Frozen peas (approx. 250g for 2 slices)
- 1 tbsp Olive oil or Rapeseed oil
- Zest of half a lemon
- 50g Feta cheese (or vegan alternative)
- A few Sugar snap peas
- Thinly sliced radish
- Pink pickle onions (they can be bought or made easily at home)
- 1tbsp Dukkah an Egyptian seasoning, made with nuts, seeds and warm spices. You can find this in the spice section at the supermarket. If you don't wish to use this seasoning, try any other suitable topper of your own choice, to give flavour and a bit of crunch to your dish.
- Soft herbs- Dill and coriander were used at the river terrace café, to garnish the toast.

SUGGESTED METHOD

- 1. Cook the peas in salted boiling water for 2-3 minutes, until tender. Drain well, but save the boiled water for the sugar snap peas, then mash them roughly with a fork. You could blend the peas if you prefer a smoother consistency.
- 2. Season to taste.
- 3. Blanch the sugar snap peas in the saved boiling water for 2-3 minutes and drain well. Set aside.
- 4. Cut the feta into small crumbly cubes
- 5. Wash and pat dry your soft herb garnish
- 6. Toast your bread
- 7. Top the toast with the smashed peas, crumbled feta cheese and pickled red onions, sprinkling the Dukkah (or alternative) over the top.
- 8. Garnish plate with the sugar snap peas and slices of radish.
