March is a month with which I have a love hate relationship. It is a month that brings delight with the emerging spring, evidenced by the burgeoning flowers in the garden and buds on the trees. All brought about by some warmer temperatures and more importantly for them, the lengthening daylight. However, in the same vein comes the explosion of weeds and thickening of the grass in the lawn. School time now. Some facts about March. Named after Mars, the Roman god of war' and the third month of the year—or, if you were born before 150 B.C., the first!

According to the oldest Roman calendars, one year was ten months long, beginning in March and ending in December. You can still see traces of this old month-naming system in our modern calendar: because December was the tenth month, it was named for the number ten in Latin (decem), just like September was named for seven (septem). So, what about January and February? They were just two nameless months called "winter," proving that winter is literally so awful it doesn't even deserve a spot on the calendar.

Finally a useless bit of information for you. March always begins on the same day of the week as November and a non-leap February.

March is also mainly remembered for St Patrick's Day. He was born in Great Britain—not Ireland—to wealthy parents near the end of the fourth century. He is believed to have died on March 17, around 460 A.D.

Although his father was a Christian deacon, it has been suggested that he probably took on the role because of tax incentives and there is no evidence that Patrick came from a particularly religious family.

At the age of 16, Patrick was taken prisoner by a group of Irish raiders who were attacking his family's estate. They transported him to Ireland where he spent six years in captivity.

During this time, he worked as a shepherd, outdoors and away from people. Lonely and afraid, he turned to his religion for solace, becoming a devout Christian.

Dear Editor

Having just returned home I heard with absolute revulsion the decision by the Planning Inspector to allow the appeal in favour of a Retirement Village in Bottisham. This is the most harmful and bewildering planning decision to affect the vibrancy and sustainability of this village for some while.

If ECDC has the backbone to enforce its legally adopted Local Plan, I would contend that the Planning Inspector's inexplicable decision not to follow the evidence of past refusals should be challenged either directly with the Secretary of State or through a Judicial Review. I would therefore urge folk to contact Parish Council, ECDC and our MP to make their thoughts known as quickly as possible. Any challenge has to be submitted within six weeks.

As a matter of principle I for one will be boycotting Scotsdale's Garden Centres and I don't think we as a community can trust Rayner's Farms to provide safe guardianship of Bottisham's heritage.

WELCOME TO YOUR TO LICENSING HELP NEWSLETTER

You will find information below on TV Licence concessions and; the Simple Payment Plan, to help people in financial difficulty.

Licence fee concessions are available to the following groups:

- If the licence holder is 75 years or older and they, or their partner living at the same address, receive Pension Credit, they can apply for a free TV Licence.
- Anyone who is blind (severely sight impaired) is eligible for a 50% concession on their TV Licence. This licence will also cover anyone they live with.
- Some residential care homes; supported housing; and sheltered accommodation are eligible for a discounted TV Licence.

Parish Council Report

The next full council meeting will be held by on 4th March 2024, 7.30pm at the Poppy Room, Bottisham Sports and Social Club. All Parish Council meetings are open to the public. Please note that the clerk to the council does not keep regular office hours. Replies to emails and phone calls will be attended to as soon as is practicable.

BOTTISHAM GREENWAY

The Parish Council hosted a well-attended information evening for all residents at the end of January 2024, to discuss the proposals from the Greater Cambridgeshire Partnership (GCP) for the Bottisham Greenway. This includes a proposal to introduce a 20 mph "Quiet Street" from the build out in Lode Rd, down to the entrance to Beechwood Avenue near the brick bus shelter. To facilitate this, the 40 mph zone in Lode Rd beyond the build out will be reduced to 30 mph. The Quiet Street would then extend down Bell Rd to the back entrance of BVC – where cyclists will be directed to join a new multi-use path that will lead them along the A1303. At Quy this will be joined by the Swaffhams Greenway and thence to Riverside in Cambridge.

The Parish Council have been working tirelessly to clarify the impact the introduction of this scheme would have for both the residents of the village and those transient to the facilities the village offers. The Council has made comment on the whole extent of the Greenway. Albeit most of it down to the entrance to Bell Rd is within South Cambs (which with the City itself comprises "Greater Cambridge"). So, most attention has been given to the changes proposed within the village itself. In this Bottisham Parish Council has worked with other East Cambs Councils in seeking improved consultation between the GCP and impacted villages - seeking the best outcome for our communities.

Apart from reducing the speed to 20 mph, the GCP are proposing a new build-out in Bell Rd beside the entrance to BVC and further speed calming measures around the busy shops/Triangle area and Bell Rd T-junction. The latter has been most challenging. The GCP have presented the Parish Council with six options for this area. In consultation this has now been whittled down to three viable options, on which the Council sought the views of residents at the evening.

The three options were an asphalt table or speed cushions around the Triangle – then thirdly ending the Greenway in Bell Rd. Residents who attended the presentation evening were provided with more detailed information about the individual options and had opportunity to ask questions. If you wish to see the presentation, a copy is available on the Parish Council's website.

"Quiet Streets" are governed by the LTN 1/20 legislation adopted in 2010. Those at the meeting will recall there was confusion created by the GCP's rigid interpretation of the LTN 1/20 guidance for cyclists to adopt the "primary position" in the road. Subsequent discussion with the GCP has clarified that cyclists should observe the more recently adopted (2022) revisions to the Highway Code (Rule 72). This advises cyclists in 'quiet streets" to "ride in the centre of your lane, to make yourself as clearly visible as possible",

but "if a faster vehicle comes up behind you, move to the left to enable them to overtake, if you can do so safely". Which is entirely sensible.

Residents were asked to provide written feedback on the three options, with the following first preferences indicated:

Raised Asphalt Table = 52.9%

Speed Cushions = 1.2%

Greenway Ends in Bell Rd = 45.9%

The results of the Greenways feedback were discussed at the February Parish Council meeting and, while this was not a formal village-wide survey, the narrow preference for the raised table was noted. But the Parish Council felt it needed to discuss the matter further with the GCP and a request has been made for the Transport Director, Peter Blake, to attend a meeting with the Parish Council to address concerns we have.

Residents were also asked whether they felt that the Parish Council should make an application to the Local Highways Improvement 20 mph scheme, to introduce a reduced speed limit up Lode Rd/High St, Bell Rd & Tunbridge Lane – covering effectively all roads within the village. The residents present were overwhelmingly in support of this approach, regardless of the Bottisham Greenway. Those of you present at the Community Safety Forum last autumn will recall the enthusiasm for 20 mph in the village expressed then. It was agreed at the Parish Council meeting that an application will be made to the Local Highways Improvement 20 mph scheme. However, the funding for this scheme is limited and the whole of Cambridgeshire gets an opportunity to bid. It is evaluated on a merit system, so there is no guarantee that this will happen in the immediate future.

Any reduction in speed limit (for the Greenway or 20 mph scheme) requires full public consultation, so residents will have further opportunity to comment should either scheme be confirmed. As further information is available for either of the schemes, this will be shared with residents via the website and through the Parish Council update.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

Just a reminder that the Annual Parish Meeting is being held on 30th April 2024 at the Main Hall, Bottisham Community Sports and Social Club at 7.30pm. The Parish Council and County/District Cllrs will give a short presentation, followed by the opportunity to further mix and discuss with representatives of the Parish, District & County Councilors, local schools and the Police

BUSES

We have been notified by District Councilor Cane that, in the new funding round, a new bus route from Soham has been proposed by the Mayor – which will reconnect Bottisham with the B1102 villages. This is great news. However the exact route is unclear – with interest in potentially directing it via the Wilbrahams to Addenbrookes. The B1102 are waiting for the full review of their survey to be complete, which will assist them in their discussion with the Mayor. More details will be shared as soon as they are available via social media, our website and the noticeboard.

STREET LIGHTING

The Parish Council have had the Parish owned streetlights inspected, as several are experiencing problems. Balfour Beatty have carried out the inspection and made a few recommendations. This report has been studied and, while still to be approved at the next meeting, it is likely that the posts and lanterns will be replaced on two lights in Downing Close and one in Jenyns Close. The post will be replaced on the lamp on College Close as the lantern is reusable. The quotation for the works is £7647.52 exc VAT.

PARISH CEMETERY

A quotation was received to tidy up the area where the spoil heap has been removed, to create a more aesthetically pleasing aspect and free up more burial space while we await the new cemetery. The laurel hedging will also be significantly trimmed to make the burial spaces more accessible. It is hoped the works will be carried out early spring.

District Councillors' Report

RETIREMENT VILLAGE APPEAL ALLOWED

Despite significant, well-reasoned, objections from residents and relevant professionals, the Planning Appeal has been allowed for the Green Belt field behind 163-187 High Street and east of Rowan Close. The applicants have been given permission to build the Retirement Village with up to 170 extra care units and up to 51 affordable dwellings.

This is outline permission, so the developers need to submit detailed plans, including layout and design for planning permission. But the Council cannot use that process to stop the development.

The Inspector accepted many of the objections but decided on balance that the need for extra care housing and affordable housing outweighed the harms of building on that field.

The Inspector noted that although other extra care facilities were being built in the area, there would still be a shortfall against the predicted need, and he found that the need is acute. He found that delivery of extra care housing in East Cambs in the past had been "abject at best". He went on to say "That the predicted supply of extra care housing falls significantly below the identified need, and is anticipated to do so in the future, is partly a result of a distinct lack of robust local planning policies and site allocations to support this form of housing. Furthermore, the Council's robust housing land supply position is not predicated on the future delivery of extra care housing, which reinforces the inadequacy of the Local Plan in supporting the delivery of this type of housing for older people."

The Inspector noted that the average completion of affordable housing in the district was 67 a year, against a need of about 200 a year. He recognised "that the Council have made progress in addressing under-delivery over the past two years in particular" but that "a notable unmet need still persists."

The Inspector also noted the benefits of "additional planting proposed, dedicated play space for children, and the conversion of an area in excess of 3ha for use as public open space." Together with the benefit of biodiversity net gain and employment opportunities.

There are many conditions, such as construction working hours, protection of existing trees, delivery and maintenance of the public open space. There are also requirements to make financial contributions towards the local infrastructure.

I know that many Bottisham residents will be upset by this decision. We will now need to work together to make sure that the development is well-designed and that the new residents are supported to become part of the Bottisham community.

OTHER MATTERS

The Conservative majority on the Council's Finance & Assets Committee pushed through a recommendation to the Full Council to build their crematorium and cemetery at Mepal. John and his Liberal Democrat group colleagues on the committee voted against this for several reasons. We both feel it's a misuse of the land – which used to be an outdoor centre enjoyed by countless young people – and of £9 million of Community Infrastructure Levy funds – which could have been spent on amenities in our towns and villages.

One of the stated aims of the plan for a crematorium is to have a facility in the District, and to make it more convenient for residents in East Cambridgeshire. However, Mepal is at the very edge of the District, the nearest possible location to the Council's major competitor at March, and for residents here in Bottisham it will be no more convenient than our current nearest providers.

ECSS were given a £500,000 increase to their fee for 2022/23 and 2023/24. Despite this increased fee, they are now asking for a further £200,000 for 2023/24. This will be considered by Full Council in February. Earlier this year, the Chief Executive of ECDC (who is also Managing Director of ECSS) reviewed the arrangements for ECSS and introduced various changes to address the weaknesses which he found. Charlotte proposed an external review but this was blocked by Conservative Councillors. Internal Audit have now reviewed the Governance Controls between ECDC and ECSS and found that there are gaps in the internal control framework.

The Combined Authority will be introducing a new bus service between Soham and Cambridge, via Burwell, Swaffham Prior, Swaffham Bulbeck and Bottisham. This will restore the connection with Bottisham, lost when the route for the No 11 changed. Charlotte has pressed the officers to consult locally on the details of this new service. She has also suggested that rather than going into Cambridge Centre they consult on if it should go via the Wilbrahams and Fulbourn to Addenbrookes, Long Road and Hills Road 6th form colleges and Cambridge rail station.

The Combined Authority has given ECDC £300,000 to distribute as grants to local businesses. The grant scheme will support local businesses who are looking to scale and grow within the District with capital and/or revenue grants. The scheme will target businesses from start up to a maximum turnover (2022) of £10million. Applications open on 1 April and funds will be allocated as eligible applications are received, so businesses would be wise to get their applications ready to submit on 1 April. Cambridgeshire County Council Report

MORE TRAFFIC RESTRICTIONS

The GCP are now looking at road classifications throughout Cambridge, which will restrict traffic even more and, in my opinion, cause more congestion.

CCC have a stated aim of getting people out of their cars and use public transport, which is admirable, but it must come with reliable services otherwise that will not happen.

A complete rethink is required, but the ruling administration refuse to listen to constructive comments. The ruling administration voted down at a County Council meeting last year, a Conservative group proposal to have a cross party working group to look at the issues and try to resolve them. Working together for all residents. They refused that.

At the February 13th Meeting of County Council, I stated that the ruling administration continued to ignore sensible proposals from our group and seem hellbent on pushing their own ideology at the financial expense of residents, as well as ruining the City, where people are going elsewhere to shop rather than put up with the congestion.

I have ideas on how we can solve traffic issues within and outside the City and will continue to put those forward and welcome any suggestions from residents.

BUSES

The mayor is increasing the mayoral precept by 200% from £12 to £36 for a Band D property, which will apparently be spent on bus transport including Demand Responsive Transport, one scheme that will be in East Cambridgeshire towards the east of the district.

However, despite my lobbying, there is no proposal to change the route of the number 11 to divert into Bottisham. This is disappointing, as even diverting every other service would have helped residents from outside Bottisham with access to the GP surgery and the Village College facilities and give Bottisham residents access to Anglesey Abbey and the other villages.

There is talk of using the extra money to provide additional services, through the B1102 corridor, but whilst some outline detail has been produced, there is still a lot of detail to come.

There is a potential proposal to move to a franchising model, which will mean that the Combined Authority (CPCA) as the transport authority could dictate where and when buses run, rather than the bus operators, as at present.

Franchising costs a lot of money and there is no evidence that the money will be forthcoming from Government, which is the main source, based on previous poor bids that the CPCA have made.

There will be a public consultation on this later this year, once the Business Case has been published. I will update once more details are known.

CCC BUDGET

The CCC decided at a meeting on 13th February to increase their portion of the Council tax by 4.99%, which is the maximum allowed. Our group put forward proposals to spend the money differently and put even more into repairing our roads, but that was rejected.

Swaffham Heath/A1303 Crossroads – Staggered Junction

I have some great news. After a very long wait due to legal issues purchasing land around the junction, construction is due to start on March 4th and last for 15 weeks.

Mark Towriss Bursary Fun. - A Letter From Ute Towriss

Dear Supporters of the Mark Towriss Bursary Fund,

My grateful thanks to all of you who, over the past fourteen years, have contributed to the Bursary Fund. It has truly made a significant contribution to the founding and training of Family Medicine/ GPs in Kenya – and beyond. After fourteen years, and with a heavy heart I am now closing the fund.

Over the years this fund has raised approximately £200,000. This has supported 23 Family Doctors throughout their training and another 13 who are still part way through their four years and will still benefit from the remaining funds.

In 2008, when Mark died, there were only 3 Kenyan-trained Family Doctors with just one university, Moi, offering this new Master's degree. Now there are five universities in Kenya training Family Doctors – and over 100 Kenyan-trained GPs/ Family Doctors. It is a demanding programme and the majority of these doctors will sacrifice a comfortable life, working far from the cities in poor rural communities, where a broad set of medical and social skills will be needed.

The Mark Towriss Bursary Fund was set in motion with the proceeds from a memorial concert given for Dr Towriss in Swaffham Bulbeck church a few months after his death. I wanted to fulfil his wish to make a connection to primary health in East Africa and was glad to discover that a group of doctors in Kenya had recently set up a Family Medicine/GP training programme and were looking for scholarships. This would indeed fulfil Dr Towriss's wish. Initially we hoped to support one student, then we became more ambitious and agreed to fund three – and so it has rolled on. There have been so many gifts from residents and patients in Bottisham where Dr Towriss practiced, from Swaffham Bulbeck where he lived, and the surrounding villages, from medical friends and my family.

In 2017 I visited their four rural training hospitals and the university where our bursary scholars studied. I followed those doctors around in clinics and on the rural hospital wards, sat in on training sessions and talked to them about the fund and primary health care in the UK. The scope of their chosen work is huge, daunting. But they are dedicated to their vision – giving neglected communities access to medical care. I had good reason to be impressed, and moved by their dedication- and glad that this fund has supported such doctors in gaining much needed skills.

I recently received the following update from Dr Bruce Dahlman, a founding member of Family Medicine training in Kenya and ex-Director of Family Medicine Training at Kabarak University Kenya:

Ute, these family doctors (sponsored by the Towriss Bursary Fund) are all continuing to serve across Kenya and in Ethiopia with others intending to return in due time to their home countries of Uganda, Burundi and DR Congo. You likely are aware that Dr. Elijah Terer from the first class is now the CEO of AIC Litein Hospital; Dr David Mung'ara leads the family medicine program at Kijabe Hospital; Dr. Faith Lelei is the Clinical Services

Director over all clinical and support staff at Kijabe; Dr. Boaz Niyinyumva leads AIC Litein residents but plans to return to his native Burundi to help start family medicine there next year; Dr. Sifora Fanta returned to her home in Soddo, Ethiopia and will assist starting family medicine at her hospital later this year. This very partial "reading out" of who the Mark Towriss Bursary has helped will continue into the future as the newer graduates also take their places of leadership and service.

The countries in which these doctors will practice have no primary health care as we know it. Most of them will work in small rural hospitals where a wide variety of medical, psychiatric and surgical skills are required. All of them will need to be teachers of the next generation of Family Doctors – for there are still so few of them. I feel positive now, after fourteen years, that Family Medicine has a strong enough foundation to survive. The greater the number of Family Doctors, the more likely it will be to become a more common career choice/possibility.

Now, after fourteen years I will close the fund. I do so with great sadness but also with a lot of gratitude. Gratitude to the donors for your generosity, gratitude for insight into the skills and dedication of the Kenyan Family Doctors – and gratitude to those who have enabled this fund to reach those who needed it.

He with 49 others (most of whom continued careers in the service) had a gruelling initiation as on their second day they were called to a dreadful bus crash where 6 people had died - he had never seen a dead body before. 6 weeks later he found the body of a drunken sailor.

In those days such cases and especially murders meant that the Force called in Scotland Yard to investigate and he was fortunate to work with the lead officer. This led him to train with the Met and become a detective.

He was involved with many important cases, The Thriplow Murder, Fen Ditton Post Office Robbery, a murder in Histon and Cambridge's Biggest Armed Robbery Case the final one of 13 in the local area.

He met Harold Wilson, was involved in the Garden House Riots of 1970, helped Lester Pigott avoid the press, and quickly dealt with the release of a jockey who was needed by Jenny Pitman to ride in Ireland the next day.

Not gardening related at all but very interesting and told with good humour. He has plenty of stories to tell and I am sure he will be back.

News from Bottisham Medical Practice Patients' Participation Group

Two Important Messages from the Practice: Reception staff have been receiving an unprecedented level of verbal abuse in recent weeks. This will not be tolerated.

GPs and their staff have a right to care for others without fear of being attacked or abused. To successfully provide general practice services a mutual respect between all the staff and patients has to be in place. All our staff aim to be polite, helpful, and sensitive to all patients' individual needs and circumstances.

We respectfully remind patients that very often staff could be confronted with a multitude of varying and sometimes difficult tasks and situations, all at the same time. The staff understand that ill patients do not always act in a reasonable manner and will take this into consideration when trying to deal with a misunderstanding or complaint. However, aggressive behaviour, be it violent or abusive, will not be tolerated and may result in you being removed from the Practice list and, in extreme cases, the Police being contacted.

Patient demand outstrips capacity: Our contract from the NHS states we supply 90 appointments per 1000 practice population per week, that is 531 appointments per week. We supply between 700-800 appointments per week. 34% more than we are funded to do. Tuesday 6th Feb 2024 we had 142 appointments available. We received 831 phone calls. 382 of these being before 9:30am.

We have a population of 5900. 1 in 7 of those wanted an appointment yesterday alone. Last month 31 people did not attend a booked appointment. This is more than one patient a day.

The government has proposed an increase in funding of 1.9% for general practice this year. All other areas of the NHS have had 5-6% to deal with inflationary pressures so effectively general practice has had a cut in funding but is expected to provide more every day.

The doctor is explaining this so next time you are cross there are no appointments it truly isn't our fault. All our staff work flat out to provide a high standard of care. We are not sitting here doing nothing, we are often here 12-13 hours a day. We care hugely about our patients and want to provide the best possible care we can, but we must do this safely.

How can you help?

Use 111 where you can. Use walk in centres where you can for minor injuries. Go to A&E if you have an emergency like chest pain - coming to us merely delays your treatment.

Attend for check ups when you are asked. Cancel appointments you can't make We understand your frustration when there isn't an appointment. This is not lack of appointments or lack of us working, but simply that: Demand outstrips capacity

Closure: The Surgery will be **closed on 27 March from 14.30-18.30** for training. Please use 111 Service during this time.

Medication Storage: It is important that drugs are stored according to the instructions accompanying them. This is usually related to keeping them at the right temperature.





Bottisham Bird Brain

It was pointed out to me recently that the Finch family (Fringillidae) had not featured in the Bird Brain articles to date – other than the occasional passing mention – so I'd like to set about rectifying my apparent neglect of a wonderful, colourful, group of birds which often go unnoticed; and I



wondered why this should be so. Well, most finches are sparrow-sized and will often appear only in silhouette as one looks up to the branches of a tree. The other thing is: their abundance... Chaffinches, in particular, are such a normal part of the rural and garden landscapes that they just blend in to the backdrop and form part of the everyday cacophony of birdsong.

But a closer look at Fringilla coelebs, the Chaffinch – well, the male anyway – will reveal one of the most colourful and characterful birds found throughout the British Isles. And, once you have an ear for the song, you will hear it everywhere, I promise!

Firstly, let us inspect the plumage. As with many Finches, the male is abundantly more colourful than the female – reflecting their 'traditional' courtship behaviour and parenting habits (where the male attracts the female and the female sits on the nest). He sports a pinkish-red face and breast with a blue crown and nape, and he is particularly bright in the spring and summer when his feathers are fresh after the annual moult. His back is a chestnut brown and there are greenish feathers on the rump but, often, the first thing you will see will be the double white wing-bar on the wings, which are otherwise mainly black. The white flashes, along with the white outer-tail feathers, are pretty obvious in flight, too, which makes him identifiable even if only glimpsed.

The female, in contrast, is a pretty drab, buff-coloured individual, possibly liable to confusion with a female House Sparrow except that she, too, displays the striking double white wing-bar. She often appears slimmer, more delicate and demur in character, than the male who tends to stand proud and handsome and keen to be noticed.

And, of course, the male Chaffinch sings – often repeatedly! The distinctive song is usually issued from a fairly open perch in a tree or bush, each phrase lasting three or four seconds. The volume is loud considering the bird's size but the sound is less sweet than, say, the Robin and nowhere near as fluty as the Willow Warbler. It's a slightly harsh, tweeting tune that starts high and comes down the scale, finishing with an upward flourish that seems to press home the 'pronouncement'. The complexity of the song gives rise to variations between birds of different localities and this is sometimes described as regional dialects, but there is little scientific evidence of such distinctions, even though the length of the final flourish can vary significantly in different places. There is also a range of calls (depending on what the bird is doing) the most frequent of which are a sparrow-like 'chrip

chrip' or the more metallic-sounding 'pink pink' alarm call that you'll often hear in woodland (less often in gardens).

The other thing you may notice about Chaffinches – indeed all finches – is the stout, conical beak, which gives it away as a seed and nut eater, a diet which also includes fruit, insects and grubs. Upon hatching, a young bird will be fed almost entirely on arthropods – mainly caterpillars – by both its parents until it is mature enough to learn how to forage for seeds. In fact, it is the bird's fondness for seeds that probably gave rise to its English name – originally 'Ceaffinc'. After farmers had threshed their crops, Chaffinches would find easy pickings amongst the discarded chaff. In Old English, chaff was 'ceaf' and the bird was a 'finc'. 16th Century naturalist William Turner also referred to the nickname 'Spink', probably derived from the alarm call. What a shame that such rustic expressions have largely disappeared from our language these days. (Perhaps nicknames could be an interesting feature in a future edition of the Cresset?)

The Chaffinches represent one of the more stable bird populations in the UK and, in terms of conservation status, they are on the 'Green List' – not considered to be of conservation concern. Having lost only about 15% of numbers over the last 50 years, they number around six million resident birds currently. Their numbers are maintained by the fact that they commence breeding at one year old and the female lays four to five eggs, typically. The average lifespan of a Chaffinch is only about three years, with juveniles having a 53% first year survival rate, and adults 'enjoying' a 59% annual survival rate; but, if a bird can avoid illness, accidents and predators like sparrowhawks and domestic cats, a 10-year life is possible (with a 15 year-old Chaffinch once recorded in Switzerland)!

Other finches frequenting our gardens and parks in Bottisham will include Goldfinches, Greenfinches, perhaps Linnets and – if you're lucky – Bullfinches or even Bramblings. But I will cover these in future Cresset bulletins. As far as the remaining British finches are concerned – Siskins, Redpolls, Crossbills, Twites and Hawfinches – you'll need to not only go further afield (e.g. to coniferous or coastal woodlands) but also to enjoy more than a modicum of luck!
