



At the beginning of November around 1000 revellers held an illegal rave on Burwell Fen. To access the fen, they cut fences and broke gates and bollards causing significant damage, both physical and financial. The party goers left a large amount of waste (including human waste as there were no toilet facilities on site) leaving a particularly unpleasant task for our Rangers and volunteers who spent several days clearing-up the mess. If you're out and about in the Vision area and suspect a rave maybe about to take place, please call the Wicken Fen Visitor Centre on 01353 720274 or Cambridgeshire Police on 101.

Essential maintenance work on the access ramps to Reach Lode Bridge is scheduled to take place in December. This will require the bridge to be closed for a period of five consecutive days between sometime between 4 -18 December - the exact date being very weather dependent. The dates will be posted on our website and Facebook pages when known, or please call the Visitor Centre for up to date information.

They met a Bedouin Tribe and rode camels all day.

At St. Catherine's Monastery at the base of Mount Sinai they decided to join a group making the journey to the top at 2a.m. in the morning. They rode camels and to Beryl's amazement they were left on their own to make their way up, being assured that the camel knew the way! The party had never seen so many stars and a trainee Vicar from Manchester took Holy Communion on the Plateau. At the top there is a tiny chapel where there is a wonderful feeling of calm and peace.

The following day the Bedouins took the Group further into the dessert, this time in four-wheel vehicles. Some of them asked to leave the camp on their own to experience the silence, this was very special. They are with the Bedouins and then slept out under the stars.



WW1 REMEMBRANCE, DUXFORD

For the Remembrance Day on 10 November the Imperial War Museum, Duxford laid on several events including a Spitfire aerobatic display to remember the fallen of WW1. The BBC did a live broadcast from a mobile studio on a BBC bus, which was parked next to the replica of a WW1 trench. Visitors with family memories of WW1 were interviewed, and visitors were also given a chance to be filmed whilst reading the news from WW1. Two other volunteers and I were given a crash course on how to work the knobs and switches to bring up the BBC regional programme 'Look East' news introduction and work the auto cue from which everyone read the news. They saw themselves on screens in front and on the side of the bus.

At 11am there was the silence to remember the dead. Since I was standing close to the WW1 trench I could not help thinking about those who spent months in those trenches, enduring the daily attacks during which many of their comrades where either injured or killed. This was unlike any Remembrance I had attended before.

Later in a live radio interview I was asked what this meant to me. Since I was born in India the only family connection with WW1 that I am aware of was through my grandfather's brother, who was a chaplain in the Indian Army in Basra, Iraq and who died 3 weeks before the war ended. His grave is still in Basra, but he is also remembered at India Gate in Delhi.

More than 1 million Indians volunteered in WW1, and many who left their villages never came back. Some of those injured were treated at the Royal Pavilion at Brighton, which was converted into a hospital, and in 1921, near Brighton was erected the Chattri Memorial (meaning umbrella), which was unveiled by the then Prince of Wales, in memory of some of the Indian soldiers who were either cremated or buried there.

There was a Service of Remembrance in the chapel at Duxford. Sitting in the BBC control room it occurred to me that even though we now get news of fighting from around the world in an instant, the suffering from war is exactly the same for the soldiers and their families as it was 100 years ago.

Christmas Blues.

As I write this there are six more weeks until Christmas. Why does that thought give me a sinking feeling in the pit of my stomach? Am I alone in that? What have we done to Christmas?

It all seems to have got out of control somehow. For many it has become the most stressful time of the year. Every year I seem to hear more and more people saying how much they dislike Christmas.

'Peace and goodwill' has a hollow ring to it.

And all those cheery, sentimental Christmas songs just make it seem worse.

The lonely feel even lonelier. The depressed feel even more depressed. The poor get poorer. Those in debt get even further into debt. Those who already have plenty want even more. Many of us spend far more than we need on food and drink and frivolity.

We and our children are bombarded with advertising whose sole purpose is to make us feel dissatisfied with what we have and to want something bigger or better.

Whilst a majority of people agree that Christmas is about spending time with family and friends, and a smaller majority feel that it is a time when we should be generous to people less fortunate than ourselves, a survey taken before Christmas 2013 found that 18 million people were worried about how they would afford Christmas. Many people expected to start the New Year in debt and many were still paying for the previous Christmas in November. Surely this is not how it was meant to be?

The true meaning of Christmas is simple. We remember, and celebrate, that God came as a new-born child to live among the people he created. Yes, I find that mysterious and difficult to understand. But I believe it. One of the names given to Jesus is Emmanuel. It means 'God is with us'. He came to be with us in this world, to show us how to live a fully human life, and to give us a hope and a future. The real peace and joy of Christmas are to be found in this Jesus. He is still with us amid all the hype and superficiality of our modern Christmas. He is here to be found among the tinsel and the trimmings; the loneliness and depression; the poverty and extravagance.

Why not try to find a quiet space in the midst of it all to think about who Jesus really is and why he came, and whether it ought to mean something to you? Throughout Advent there are churches near you where people will be meeting to reflect on the true meaning of Christmas. Why not come and try it out for yourself?

Bottisham Sports Centre

It is with great regret that the governors of Bottisham Village College have taken the decision to shorten the hours that the Sports Centre will be available for community use from January 2015.

For a number of years the income generated by the community use of the Centre has fallen short of the amount required to cover the proportion of costs relating to community use. During that period the Village College has met the greater proportion of the costs of the centre, in recognition of its own use of the facilities. In addition it has met any shortfall relating to community use.

That position is no longer sustainable. The shortfall is predicted to increase significantly in 2014/15 to a level equivalent to 40% of the entire College spend on curriculum resources. In the light of the poor funding position faced by Cambridgeshire schools (the worst-funded schools in the country), the College can no longer justify subsidising community use of the Sports Centre with funds intended for the education of the College students. It has also been made clear to the College by the DoE and its auditors that to do so would breach its funding agreement.

Immediate action is required. The only option that offers the possibility of avoiding the predicted losses is to reduce the hours when the centre is staffed and available for community use.

From 2 January, therefore, the new opening hours will be,

Monday to Friday 4 pm to 10pm, Saturday and Sunday 8 am to 4 pm, School holidays 8 am to 10 pm

The governors are very grateful to all who informed their thinking, through contributions to the public consultation in writing, face to face, or by attendance at the two open meetings

Other ways of clearing the shortfall were considered, especially additional income generation. Previous attempts to do this through increasing usage have been unsuccessful. Professional advice from the charity, Nuffield Health, who manage a number of similar sites, has indicated that the centre's rural location and local demographics mean that there is no likelihood of generating sufficient additional business to bring the community use of the centre back into financial balance. Sources of grants have also been investigated, so far without success. A review of current charging levels, compared to our nearest competitors, suggests that there is little scope for raising them and governors are committed to ensuring that the changes to be implemented do not make the facilities unaffordable. There will, though, be a streamlining of membership options to make use of the centre more attractive.

Nuffield's advice is that, even within the reduced opening hours, there is potential for greater use of the centre. Any surplus generated would be reinvested to replace ageing facilities and equipment or to developing new activities. Governors and the College will be pursuing this in parallel with the cost saving measures.

To provide an excellent experience for current users and to successfully attract new ones, significant improvements are needed to the management and operation of the centre. Governors have appointed Nuffield Health on a one year contract to advise and help the College implement the required management, operational and marketing changes. Governors expect this to address many of the day to day issues raised by users in their consultation feedback. As part of these changes, the Centre will also be establishing a community user group, to meet monthly and consult about the running of the facilities. The first meeting will be in January 2015. (Bottisham Sports Centre continued on page 32.)

If you are directly affected

Governors are very conscious of the potential impact of these changes on some users and groups whose sessions are currently during hours that the centre will not be staffed from January. The Governors have asked the College and its advisers to meet with these groups and investigate whether any mechanisms can be found to allow continued use. Those meetings will be arranged as soon as possible. Current members of the centre will be contacted to discuss the options available to them. However, if you are directly affected and wish to make contact, please email Keith.Osborne@nuffieldhealth.com

Parish Council Report

Regular users of the footpath leading from Beechwood Avenue through Ancient Meadows will be aware that the kissing gate has now been moved making the route usable for those with pushchairs and bicycles. The kissing gate has now been placed further back at the entrance to the footpath across the field towards Swaffham Road and the landowner has fenced off the field. There have been problems with motorbikes using the field in the early hours and this should remedy that problem.

It has been noticed by many that parking outside of the shops seems to have worsened of late. The PCSO states that whenever they come through the village there are no vehicles parked on the double yellow lines but we find that difficult to believe as it is flouted so often. It was agreed at our last meeting that parking was a problem and we need to look at ways that this can be alleviated. Councillors will take a close look at the area to discuss in more detail at our December meeting. The PCSO has contacted Parish Council asking for our support in recommending a single yellow line in Beechwood Avenue from the High Street and in front of the primary school all the way to West Walk. This follows a recent incident where a child was struck by a vehicle, although thankfully they were not badly hurt. This was agreed to be a sensible measure.

92 residents came to the public consultation on the proposed new development off of Bell Road. This will now go to formal planning application and residents in the immediate vicinity will be consulted which we expect to happen mid-December.

As you all sort your cupboards and garages making space for those new gadgets for Christmas please remember that we have another electrical recycling collection on Thursday 4th December. Posters will be displayed in the village nearer the time. They will take any electrical items no matter how large, please just leave them outside your house on the day. Merry Christmas.

East Cambs District Councillors' Notes

RECENT FULL COUNCIL MEETINGS • There have been two recent meetings for all members of the Council. The Ely Bypass was added to the list of strategic projects on which the Council may in the future spend Community Infrastructure Levy, which is raised from new domestic and retail developments. The other strategic projects are in Ely, Soham and Littleport. I supported this but stated how important it was that the Council identified other projects that will benefit villages, particularly in the south of the District. There will be consultations on this during the next year. Villages are in need of better cycle links, pedestrian crossings, traffic calming, better community facilities etc, as evident from the village consultations carried out previously.

As the Member Champion for Energy Conservation and Renewable Energy Generation, I welcomed the Supplementary Planning Document on Commercial Scale Renewable Energy Schemes. At the first meeting, I gave a technical analysis of the schemes required to reduce carbon dioxide emissions, to allow the country to be more reliant on locally-produced energy and to meet planning guidance under the National Planning Policy Framework and the Local Plan. Such schemes include wind and solar farms, anaerobic digesters and biomass schemes. The document gives many safeguards about community engagement, landscapes and views, heritage assets, biodiversity, residential amenity and land use.

A draft Masterplan for up to fifty new homes off Bell Road, Bottisham was approved as policy guidance. This is required should a planning application for these homes be submitted before the adoption of the district-wide Local Plan next year.

CRYSTAL STRUCTURES SITE, TUNBRIDGE LANE • A new Planning Application for this site has been received and was issued for consultation on 10th November. Details may be found on the yellow notice posted outside and on the District Council website under application 14/01239/FUM. This application will be considered by the Planning Committee next year. Responses up until the end of this year will be considered, and even up until the meeting.

PLEASE BE CONSIDERATE WHEN PARKING • There are continuing complaints about parking. Please be aware that it is illegal to park on single yellow lines during the times shown on notices and on double yellow lines at any time. A vehicle displaying a Blue Badge is allowed to park provided the badge holder has been the driver or a passenger. Parking on roads is otherwise allowed provided it does not cause an obstruction or a danger. This may include near a school entrance, near a bus stop, opposite or within ten metres of a road junction, on a bend, on a cycle track, or obstructing a dropped kerb or pavement so that pushchairs and mobility vehicles cannot pass. Also, if insufficient space is left for the Emergency Services to pass. If seen by the Police, they may issue a Fixed Penalty Notice. If there is an accident, the person who parked the vehicle may be held partly or wholly liable. Details of vehicles (registrations, makes and colours) may be reported to the Police by ringing 101, and they may visit the location or contact the owner.





Public Transport Matters

Arguments for and against the guided busway rumble on. The county council claims that passenger numbers have hit the 3-year target with 3,457,354 passengers in the past year while a representative of Cast Iron points out that not all those will have been on the busway section and that many passengers will have had free bus passes. He also points out that they spent 3 years developing plans to buy the mothballed St. Ives railway line from Network Rail to reopen it for passengers, using private money. Oxford in contrast is set to get another new rail line as plans are on track to further reverse the Beeching cuts around the university city.

Chiltern Railways is unveiling plans to reinstate passenger services along the Cowley branch line to the south and east of the city and to connect it directly with London. A science park and business park and big housing estates would all benefit. The Varsity Line to Cambridge is also under consideration. Another ongoing argument is the question of returning to state-owned railways. As a letter-writer in the Cambridge News points out three out of four railways are state-owned but by foreign states – Deutsche Bahn, for instance. GTR (Govia Thameslink) has taken over locally from First Capital Connect - a franchise to run for seven years with a promise of £430 million of investment – new trains, improved reliability, increased capacity, better connections, improved stations. Stephen Hawking is one of the suggestions for the name for the new North Cambridge station.

More people are using their local buses due to the problems with the new method of payment at the park and ride sites. 'Use it or lose it' is quoted by a local CN letter writer regarding the new Bikebus service on Sundays and Bank Holidays from Cambridge station to the southern villages with a trailer for bikes and wheelchairs. Explore the countryside, visit a village pub! See the South Cambs. website.

Another excellent service is the Stagecoach X5 to Oxford via St. Neots, Bedford, Milton Keynes but also picking up all along the route in smaller villages. Why struggle with the busy road when you can just relax or read in comfort. It is a coach with leather seats and a toilet. It departs from Parkside but also connects to our services at Victoria Avenue and Maids Causeway. It can get full so we depart from Parkside and alight on the return journey at Maids Causeway to link with the 10,11,12. National Express seems to have dropped the '0' prefix from its local services and now also has a 10,11,12! For those able to access the A1303 stop the excellent services to Ely or Bury St. Edmonds continue. Just across the road from Bury bus station is the library with a good café run by Realise Futures Catering which helps people back into work. Newmarket library has a range of timetable booklets produced by Suffolk County Council and showing the buses which run in the western part of the county and into Cambridge. The Bury to Newmarket rural services are also shown if you feel like exploring.

The Dartford toll booths are being axed from 30th November with number plates being filmed and either payment in advance by phone or online or by a system similar to the London Congestion charge. Stagecoach aims to make travel easier with its stagecoachsmart.com for regular travellers - Megarider extra and Megarider plus extra monthly tickets. This is cheaper than buying on the bus. We recently went by Brittany Ferries to stay for a week in Santander, N. Spain. While packing I discovered the smartcard for their buses which I had had 3 years before. We popped into the local tobacconists near our hotel, offered 10 euros and without any problems we were able to top it up! Would it still have been valid if it had been an English card here?! It even had 6 euros still on it!

Bottisham Airfield Museum

We would like to thank everyone from the local community and further afield who visited us on our Open Day on the 28th September and helped to make it such an outstanding success.

The Museum, which was originally housed in wartime buildings off Tunbridge Lane in Bottisham, had been facing an uncertain future, after that site was sold for development in 2012. This summer, however, thanks to the great generosity of a local benefactor, we were able to secure the future of the only remaining wartime buildings on the airfield itself by making them the museum's home. These buildings were until recently the River Farm Smokery. During the war, they were the operational buildings for the 375th USAAF Fighter squadron.

The museum group moved into the site on the 17th September and ten frantic days of clearing, cleaning and repairing ensued to enable the Open Day to take place. The former latrine and kit drying room was used to display some of the major parts of our Mustang Cockpit project, as well as a collection of the Museum's artefacts relating to the RAF and USAAF in Bottisham. The main building which housed the squadron offices, crew room, and locker room is our major renovation project and is, for now, not open but we were able to give our visitors an idea as to our vision for the site.

Elsewhere, we had a comprehensive collection of WW2 military vehicles together with their very enthusiastic owners, a Mk IX Spitfire cockpit section, live music and many stalls including a tombola and detailed display of our plans for the future. Period costumes were also very much in evidence and we were very lucky that the Home Guard could attend to keep us safe in the event of an invasion! The day was rounded off beautifully by the appearance of some WW2 aircraft, most notably Maurice Hammond's Mustang 'Janie' which thrilled the crowds lining the perimeter of the Museum with an air display which made everyone nearby stand still to watch. Coincidentally, the return of the Mustang to the skies over Bottisham marked 70 years to the day since the USAAF left the airfield.

We were very happy to welcome so many local people to the new museum site and were amazed when several donated items for the museum, including photograph albums, personal belongings of people connected with the airfield and other artefacts which we will be honoured to exhibit when the buildings are ready.

Since the Open Day, work has continued apace to remove many of the 'modern' alterations to the large building and see what remains of its original wartime features. At the time of writing we are planning to reinstate the Nissen Hut on the south side of the main building, which was taken down soon after the airfield closed. The hut will initially house our exhibits while work continues to restore the other buildings on the site. In the future we hope the Nissen hut will be a venue for educational and social events, hosted both by the museum and the local community, set on a site with plenty of character.

One other significant development since the Open Day is that after a lot of hard work the museum is now a registered charity, which will be a real help for securing future funding.



Thoughts of a Sports Nut

Firstly may I take this opportunity to thank Jolley Old Tony for his responses to my little prod on the topic of the Commonwealth. A fine, well reasoned retort, TJ, and a timely reminder that traditional British influences of loyalty, respect and fairness still have great significance and value in the modern world, never more so than in sporting matters.

I was reminded of this recently when visiting my home town of Woodbridge in Suffolk for the funeral of the 86 year old former chairman of the football club where I developed my love of sport. A player for 26 years, secretary for 13 years, and chairman for a breathtaking 37 years, Keith Dixon's name was synonymous with the club and people came from as far away as Dubai to pay their respects. A truly happy occasion ensued, with explayers of several eras exchanging stories and memories over a few drinks, the odd tear, and an unusual number of man-hugs! And we concluded with a 'team' photo of everyone there who had ever pulled on the black and white stripes of Woodbridge Town FC. There was a lot of love in the air, borne out of respect not only for Mr Dixon, but also for each other and for the unique bonds that exist between people involved in team sports.

However, when I looked at the picture a sad thought struck me. Whilst the oldest 'player' was in his mid-80s, the youngest was 40! Which meant that not one single player from the current or recent teams had bothered to show. This, I fear, is symptomatic of a sporting landscape which has changed dramatically in recent years. There seems such a reluctance among players to really commit to a club, both during their playing days, and after. Even in grass roots football, players move from club to club without a second thought for a little financial incentive here, a promise of a trophy there, etc. And one can't help thinking that the overblown rewards at the top of the professional game, together with the globalisation of our domestic leagues, have created a culture where the old fashioned, typically British, characteristics of togetherness and working for each other through thick and thin, have all but evaporated.

Thank goodness for former prolific centre-forward David Leech and his hardcore of stalwarts from the 1970s and 1980s who keep the spirit and the solvency of WTFC alive and kicking in the face of so much apathy.

I hear much lamenting over the dearth of volunteers (perhaps it was always so?) but recently I've noticed that the social side of football clubs is rapidly disappearing too. Players used to socialise in the bar, not only after games but after training too. Pubs and clubs were a bedlam of triumphs, disasters, celebrations, excuses, stories, leg-pulls, hopes, fears, tears and laughter by 5.30 on a Saturday afternoon. Nowadays, it seems, half an hour after games, many club houses are empty, save for the few stalwarts who sweep up, wash up, cash up and lock up... the ones who have the club colours running through their veins. But, as the playing generation becomes increasingly transient, we are left wondering where the next crop of stalwarts is coming from.

And Bottisham is no exception... with the football club now joined with Lode in order to maintain The Game in both villages, we find both of the club's teams languishing at the bottom of their respective divisions and relying on a first team manager – the willing and courageous Tim Sale – to run things from his weekday job in Coventry. It seems that Bottisham & Lode FC is paying a high price now for the previous managers' preferences to bring in outside talent to maintain status, when it might have created a more sustainable future to build teams round the locals. Easier said than done, I know, but it's painful to see players from Bottisham playing for a number of different clubs in the area whilst the village team struggles for its very existence. One hopes that, in time, some may come back and take
