The House closes for the season on 2 November – but it promises to be a very busy winter as we undertake a major restoration of the Newmarket Corridor, which includes Lord Fairhaven's bedroom, bathroom and the bedroom where Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, stayed when she was a guest of Lord Fairhaven. Over time, textiles have faded, carpets have become worn and the clocks stopped ticking. In the past year the House team have undertaken considerable research to identify the original paint schemes, carpets and textiles, which will be restored or replaced. Conservation is not a cheap business; the conservation of Lord Fairhaven's bed alone will cost an estimated £10,000.

During the winter period the House team will be running conservation tours – showcasing the work undertaken by our expert conservators. Tours run Tuesdays – Friday at 12noon & 1.30pm. Tickets are available from reception when you arrive.

The exterior redecoration of Lode Mill is over-running due to the combination of additional work which needs to be undertaken and the recent wet weather which is not ideal for painting – hopefully the mill should look fantastic for Winter Lights which starts at the end of the month. This year's Winter Lights runs for three weekends starting on Friday 28 November. Tickets (Adults £11.50 Children £8 Family Ticket £35) are available from the NT Box Office on 0844 249 1895.

At Wicken we have a **Christmas Decorations Workshop** on Friday & Saturday 21 & 22 November, with sessions from 10-12.30pm or 1.30 - 4pm. The workshop will be led by local weaver, Nadine Anderson, who will teach you how to make traditional decorations out of willow and rush. Tickets £18 (including materials) are available from the NT Box Office. Our ever popular **Father Christmas at the Fen**- runs at weekends from Saturday 6 – Sunday 21 December. I don't want to sound like a Grumpy Old Man, but I don't really get the social media craze. The way people quite happily share all sorts of stuff about their lives; what they eating, or drinking, or thinking, at any given moment. The accumulation of hundreds of 'friends', most of whom they have never met. How do we define friendship these days?

Before I go any further, I have to confess that I do have a Facebook account, although I hardly ever think to use it and don't really know what to do with it anyway. I can never think of anything I consider interesting enough to post! Even less do I understand Twitter. Although I'm a keen birdwatcher, I don't Tweet! (*Sorry*!)

It is concerning to me that social media can also be used in such anti-social ways, with 'trolling' and cyber-bullying being so widespread, sometimes with serious consequences.

I know it isn't all bad, and that things like Facebook can be great for keeping in touch with relatives and friends who live in far-flung places and with whom we might otherwise lose contact.

Who writes letters any more? Before computers and email my handwriting used to be quite good, now it has seriously deteriorated, and not just because I'm getting old! I hardly ever pick up a pen, I just hammer a keyboard.

I was thinking this morning about Paul's letters, in the New Testament, to the young churches scattered throughout the Roman Empire. Written by hand and carried over hundreds of miles; then read out loud, memorised and copied and passed on. Letters which are still full of rich meaning, significance and relevance today. What are the odds of anyone reading my emails, or even this article, in 2 years time, let alone 2000 years?

In some respects, those letters and those early church communities were the first social media. Groups of people of all kinds sharing their lives together, making friendships, with an unprecedented degree of intimacy, and crossing social and geographical barriers to do so. All connected by a common desire to follow Jesus. It is that same connection which still unites Christians today.

And so, my favoured social medium is the church, in particular RE:NEW, where real, rather than virtual, friendships are to be found, along with mutual support, encouragement, and quite a lot of fun! Parish Council Report

Many people have commented that the traffic calming has made the situation in the village much better. Vehicles in Bell Road and Tunbridge Lane are slowing down and drivers are thinking about the speed they are travelling at. There are still road signs to be installed on Bell Road. The County Council are awaiting delivery of these signs and will then complete the project. There were some initial complaints: these have now subsided as people have become used to the bumps. The scheme has taken a good deal longer than we expected but Cllr Altham thanked Tony Jolley for his hard work on the traffic calming and his liaisons with the County Council.

At our October meeting the Clerk reported that there have been concerns from several residents over the parking on Bell Road as you drive away from the High Street. There are often several vehicles parked here where the road is on a slight bend. It is therefore difficult to pass these vehicles and be able to see what is coming the other way from the A1303. Sometimes there have been up to 10 vehicles parked here which has meant cars having to reverse back down the road as they haven't enough time to overtake before another vehicle comes along. This has been reported to the PCSO but, as is often the case, especially with parking outside of the shops, the vehicles weren't there when they visited the area. After a near miss myself the other evening, we would like to ask all residents to consider the safety of their parking and encourage visiting tradesmen to do the same. If any residents have an issue with parking please contact your PCSO as this is a police matter.

The footpath round the moat at Ox Meadow has, after much correspondence, been tidied up by David Wilson Homes and is looking very nice. The broken barriers by the drainage ditch have still not been replaced and we are still chasing this with another department of David Wilson Homes. You will recall that discussions on further development at this site stalled after the developer wanted to put an application in for 100 dwellings. This was withdrawn and discussions are once again moving forward for the original plan of 50 dwellings. Once a planning application has been submitted it will be displayed for the community to have the opportunity to view and make comment.

You will be aware that the Parish Council has for some time been seeking a site for a new cemetery. As well as proximity to the village and ease of access, our enquiry has also had to take into account potential flooding, environmental pollution and ease/cost of purchase. Much of the village is low-lying and has a number of springs and watercourses flowing through it, which precludes some sites on the grounds that the water table is too close to the surface. Other potential sites are considered too far away or have existing permission for industrial uses and/or potential for housing – which would make them prohibitively costly to purchase.

After extensive research, the Council has identified an area of just over two acres of agricultural land to the south side of Lode Rd on the edge of the village. The area is owned by the National Trust, who have indicated a willingness to co-operate if a Compulsory Purchase Order (C.P.O) is made on the land. Trust provisions prevent the National Trust making a free sale of land.

To that end, at our next Parish Council meeting on 3rd November, the Council will seek to pass a resolution requesting East Cambs District Council to implement the compulsory purchase of the land - the Parish Council does not, in itself, have authority to exercise a C.P.O. The area will provide ample space for burials for the next 100 years or so. Clearly part of the land will not initially be required for burial purposes and this could be used to benefit the village in other ways. As completion of the purchase approaches, the Council will carry *(continued next page.)*

out a consultation with the village as to how the spare land could be best used in the short to medium term.

A working party will be created which would consist of residents and parish councillors to discuss the best use for the community.

It is possible that you have questions you would like to discuss with the Council about the purchase. There are 15 minutes available at the start of every Council meeting for questions from the public. Could we encourage you to avail yourself of this opportunity, or to contact the Council before-hand with any questions you may have. It should be remembered that we are at a very early stage. The District Council need to establish ownership of land, investigate legal interests and title deeds etc. before any maps can be drawn up and costs discussed.

At this time of year we ask any club or society in need of some extra funding to make contact with us. We have a nominal fund available each year to provide grant funding. Please see the advertisement in the Cresset.

Finally, one of our parish councilors Mr Mark Heider has decided to resign to concentrate on other commitments. We thank him for his work over the past year and wish him well. We now have 2 vacancies and urge any resident who would like to get more involved in the village they live in to contact either myself or our Chair, Christine Bryant.

Public Transport Matters

Still no National Express timetables at the bus shelters on Newmarket High St. and no further response from the company regarding stopping at the A1303/High St. bus stop, as Whippet do, but what fun to see the same bus stop on The One Show recently on TV when they explored the uses of the oldies bus pass. They instigated a race between two couples using their bus passes with one couple coming from Stevenage and one from Ipswich to Cambridge. They had to meet up at Chocolat in Cambridge and it was more or less a tie. They were shown researching the bus timetables and then their trip was followed. The Ipswich couple ended up taking the 11 from Bury St. Edmunds and – you have guessed it! – sailed right past our stop on the main road. The programme was exploring the effects if the bus passes were withdrawn. Many people now get out and about who otherwise would stay at home. There were 152,000 signatures on a petition to Downing St.

The Imperial War Museum at Duxford recently hosted a Showbus rally – hundreds of buses from all over the world, including New Zealand and Hong Kong, were on display. It is believed to be the world's biggest bus rally and was to mark the 60th anniversary of the Routemaster bus. The new model Routemaster was available - climb aboard!

The man who introduced the Oystercard, Jay Walder, is now running the Crossrail project -62 miles of the route, 26 miles of new tunnelling beneath London at a cost of £14.8 bn. and with 10,000 people working on the project. This is the most significant London project since permission was granted to the Metropolitan Railway in 1853 to run trains underground. It could be extended into Hertfordshire. Mr. Osborne has also talked of a Crossrail of the North - linking places such as Manchester, Leeds, Sheffield and Newcastle. Prosperity could be improved and benefits cut - justifying the cost of perhaps £15 billion.

There is hope once more that the Oxford/Cambridge rail route could be re-established. Dr. Beeching cut so many very useful services and the Private Eye columnist, Dr. B. Ching, writes useful articles of interest to rail passengers. A recent one studied the effect of rail franchises as opposed to the former unified services. The state-owned East Coast line has given the taxpayer £235m in profits, a 12% increase on last year.

Stagecoach is now running a coach service called Megabus – it seems to cover Norwich and Cambridge and has been spotted in Newmarket. It has cheap fares. See Megabus.com.

The guided busway continues to have problems. It has cost the County Council \pounds 319,000 to research the faults situation and now will cost an estimated \pounds 31 million. Bam Nuttall is to be presented with the bill.

Cityjet are suspending their services to Amsterdam and Dublin – just after last month I mentioned that Marshalls was now connected to the world.

Line closures are sad but lack of passengers often makes it a necessity. There is a SNCF 200 mile line towards the Mediterranean and to Beziers which is under threat. It is a six and a half-hour single track train ride – a 19th century line which plunges straight through the Massif Central in France, climbing and falling, diving through tunnels, clinging to gorges and clattering across Gustave Eiffel's amazing Viaduc de Garabit of 1880. Michael Portillo in his TV programmes has boosted interest in train journeys. One of Europe's best kept rail secrets is the Euskotren to San Sebastian and Bilbao in Northern Spain. It is called The Mole as it burrows through hills – it stops at every town and village and takes twice as long as the main line but it costs half as much for being twice as nice.

Dear Editor,

In the dispensary at Bottisham Medical Practice, we strive to provide an excellent service at all times and as such welcome constructive feedback. We were therefore disappointed to read Mr or Ms S. Bennett's letter to you in your last edition.

The letter seems to be based on a misunderstanding about what is involved in dispensing medication which could have been clarified if they had spoken to any member of our dispensary team.

When a patient drops off their repeat prescription slip or makes an online request a new prescription has to be generated by the dispensary staff, then checked and signed by a doctor before a dispenser is permitted by law to actually take a medicine off the shelf and dispense it. As in pharmacies and other dispensaries, medicines are not always held in stock and although we have twice daily deliveries there can be further delay before a medicine is dispensed. For this reason we ask for 48 hours to dispense the medicine to ensure that it is ready when the patient returns to collect it. 48 hours turnaround is the industry standard and is in line with the National Pharmaceutical Association and Care Quality Commission standards.

Drugs are potentially dangerous when used inappropriately and it would be unsafe as well as illegal to simply take a medicine off the shelf on presentation of a repeat medication slip without any safety checks or proper authorisation by a clinician.

We would be delighted to discuss this further with Mr or Ms Bennett if they would like to contact Mrs Beverley Weller-Lewis, our Dispensary Manager at the surgery.

We would like to reassure our patients that all processes and systems are in place for their care and safety.

Did anyone see the Bottisham connection when Cambridge United announced the appointment of their new Chief Executive in October? Jeremy 'Jez' George, formerly United's Youth Coach, First Team Manager, Director of Football, fundraiser extraordinaire, and once described by Dion Dublin as the 'heart and soul of the club', took over the day to day running of United to complete a remarkable rise from grass roots to the Football League.

Jez began his career as a teenager in the mid-1980s playing in goal for Bottisham before being snapped up by Cambs Premier high-flyers, Philips, where he had the dubious pleasure of attempting to cover for your scribe's mistakes in the back four for seven years! Modesty does not permit me to number the trophies we picked up in that time, but having cleaned up at county level, Jez, already a keen youth coach, moved up to play in higher leagues, including a spell at Cambridge City, before 'retiring' into full time coaching, first at City, then at Cambridge United.

I'm sure all locals, especially those who remember him as a raw youngster in Bottisham colours, will join me in wishing him every success in his new role at The Abbey.

Talking of football management, what on earth is this new clamour for the 'Rooney Rule' all about? Even Greg Dyke, the FA Chairman, has jumped on the political correctness bandwagon to appease the agitators recently. Now it won't surprise you to know that I am all for equal rights, but I think the argument to follow American Football's NFL is deeply flawed.

In a nutshell, the Rooney Rule requires teams to interview at least one ethnic minority candidate for head coaching positions. A number of players, pundits, and (failed) ethnic minority managers in England, including Rio Ferdinand, Garth Crooks, Chris Hughton and Paul Ince, have talked up a storm based on the fact that, currently, there are only two black managers out of 92 teams in the professional football league, and they claim the rule has transformed the fortunes of African Americans in the NFL.

Admittedly this is a poor representation when you consider how many BME players, both English and foreign, are currently active in professional football. However, one wonders just how many have not only the qualifications and the track record, but also the desire to secure the top jobs in the English game. The two who are in post – Chris Powell at Huddersfield and Keith Curle at Carlisle – are both English, but of course many of the black players in the game are not, and perhaps have no intention of hanging around after making their millions, to serve their apprenticeship as managers in the lower reaches of the league.

I am not convinced that doors are closed to the minorities. There are plenty of foreign managers in the game after all... just look at the Premier League. Clubs simply go out into the world and employ the best they can afford. And just what constitutes an ethnic minority anyway? Is it simply the depth of someone's tan? How does it tie up with nationality? (Are we soon to campaign for Eastern European or Asian rights as their numbers grow in our international 'domestic' game?) How far back in family history would we go? My children's children could have a black grandmother, three white grandparents, white skin and blonde hair... would they qualify for a fast-track to the interview panel? What a nonsense!

I simply do not see that forcing clubs to put the names of brown-skinned coaches on interview short lists for jobs is going to make much difference. After 11 years of the Rooney Rule in the NFL, they currently have 4 black head coaches out of a possible 32. Big deal! I believe that equality will wash through in the end, as the gradual positive shift in culture – that is already well under way in business and the professions – encourages black and ethnic minorities to see themselves as leaders of men. Until that happens I think that market forces will do very nicely thank you without any help from American style law enforcement.

Taking on responsibility...

Whales, Bears, Eagles, Glaciers and real Mountains – these were some of the treasures in store for us during our recent trip to Alaska, British Columbia and Alberta. And of course the Rocky Mountaineer train was a must to conclude our trip and didn't disappoint. We chose to take the reverse route through the Rockies and went from Vancouver via Kamloops to Banff, in other words ascending into the Rockies and enjoying a vista that became more and more dramatic and imposing as the two day journey unfolded. There were so many highlights during our tour but I think the moment that made us look on in awe and wonder and one that really grabbed the essence of raw nature was to listen in total silence to the 'talking' Glaciers – creaking, grumbling and groaning; displaying a deep incandescent blue. And then to hear the rumble followed by the boom of the fissure as the glacier calved into the sea forming a new iceberg. I have no doubt that close friends and new acquaintances will hear about nothing else for weeks and possibly months to come...

What also impressed us about Canada in addition to the interested and helpful people was the courteous, considerate and tolerant nature of the motorists. We hardly ever heard the blast of a horn as traffic regulations in the most part were adhered to wherever we went. Speaking to our 'Tofino Bus' coach driver he said there was a scheme in place that allowed members of the public to report 'irresponsible driving' which tended to have the effect of normalising motorists' behaviour. A form of self-policing I suppose which accorded the general public empowerment to concern themselves with upholding better driving standards. Another quality we found in Canada that we certainly don't find in this country anymore, or elsewhere in Europe come to that, is 'taking responsibility for your own actions'. For example; if you're daft enough to be wearing ear buds plugged into your Smart Phone and step into the road and get hit then YOU, and no one else, are at fault! I'd like to see that endorsed in Cambridge! Furthermore, and comparable to the US, railway lines are NOT fenced off in rural towns and villages and have 'open' barriers at formal crossings – your safety in crossing those lines is your responsibility. Tragic though it was I wonder what the outcome of the Elsenham enquiry would have been had the same happened in Canada or in the US!! Much sensibility could be regained from our 'Commonwealth Cousins' who continue to nurture the use of 'common sense'. Justifiably even more reason why the Commonwealth should continue as a valued institution! Perhaps to disentangle the UK from the 'red tape' of the EU, other than for trade, in favour of a new relationship with the Commonwealth is not such an impractical idea. After all it is argued that we Brits are not really Europeans in the manner that Brussels would have us be having far more in common with those once colonial nations who continue to share like values!

And so closer to home; sadly while we were away another stalwart of the Bottisham community left us, this time Charles McCartney. I didn't know Charles that well but my memory of him is that he didn't shy away from community and public responsibility; volunteering and devoting much of his spare time in the village to Parish Council, the Village College and to local Charities to name but a few. I'm sure we'd all wish to express our condolences and sadness to the whole family at this difficult time.

Scotland would have made it on its own economically and secondly because the Traffic Speed Calming schemes have taken far too long to put into effect. I notice that there are already signs of scuff marks on the top of the cushions which suggest they are being hit at speed – the warning signs are there and are quite visible. The message will soon get through to motorists that if you are travelling within the 30 mph speed limit the cushions can be negotiated quite safely.

I really can't understand the arrogance of some motorists and motorcyclists that persistently exceed the speed limits through the village as well as the air of self-importance of some drivers who persist on parking on double yellow lines outside The Bell – probably the same people! Not only are they parking illegally, even if it is just for a minute or two; they are also creating a dangerous hazard by impeding the visibility of motorists joining the High Street from Bell Road. Admittedly parking is at a premium but with a little bit of common sense and less selfishness it can be achieved. As nice as it is to have the 'triangle' there perhaps village growth advocates this area should be given over to parking. A worthy scheme for consideration as part a Local Highways application perchance, which I gather Parish Council has again turned down due to the lack of identifiable village projects!! Or, if this idea doesn't find favour, possibly a suitably equipped outdoor exercise resource as part of a broader village recreational policy.

Finally, wouldn't it be brilliant if we all became a little more considerate and civic minded - taking on responsibility for what we do rather than persisting with the 'ME' attitude and thus blaming someone else or the 'system'. *TJ*

Bottisham Patients' Group

The big news in October was the awarding of the contract to provide an integrated service to improve older people's healthcare and adult community services across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. The UnitingCare Partnership has been selected; it is a consortium of Cambridgeshire and Peterborough NHS Foundation Trust with Cambridge University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust. The programme's aim is to get the best possible services for older people, particularly the elderly and frail, and adults with long term conditions, providing healthcare in more joined-up and innovative ways. The Partnership will be responsible for ensuring that care is much better coordinated. They will directly provide and hold the budget for the following services:

- Urgent care for adults aged over 65 including inpatients as well as A&E services;
- Mental Health Services for people aged over 65;
- Adult (all people over 18) community health services for example, district nursing, rehabilitation and therapy after injury or illness, speech and language therapy, care for patients with complex wounds, support for people with respiratory disease or diabetes;
- And other health services which support the care of people aged over 65.

UnitingCare is not a private company but a partnership of current providers of NHS services. It will employ staff who currently provide these services and will need to work closely with GPs, social services (provided by local authorities) and with others, including ambulance services, out-of-hours services, voluntary organisations and housing services. A set of criteria (What do good services look like?) called an Outcomes Framework has been developed. This is part of the contract and performance will be measured against it, with payment linked to achieving the outcomes. This should ensure improvements can be achieved across the whole service. The service will start in April 2015 after when the Patients' Group will welcome feedback on patients' experiences of the service and about whether or not it is meeting its objectives. Ambulatory Blood Pressure Monitors (ABPM) Keeping high blood pressure under control is crucial to the successful treatment of many conditions, e.g. diabetes and heart disease. Monitoring a patients' blood pressure for 24 hours is frequently used by doctors to inform their choice of effective treatments. Currently, Bottisham patients who need an ABPM have to travel to Addenbrooke's hospital to have it fitted, then travel back there to have it removed. Then their GP has to wait for the results to come back to the Practice. The Patients' Group has agreed to raise funds to pay for an ABPM for Bottisham Medical Practice so that patients can have the monitor fitted at the surgery and their GP can have quick access to the readings. If you attended the 'flu clinics in October and bought a ticket for the tombola, you were among the first to contribute to this fund raising project. More details of the project and of how donations can be made will be posted on the PG's notice board and explained in the December village magazines.

'Flu jabs If you are reading this, are eligible for a free 'flu jab but haven't yet had it, phone the Practice on 01223 810030 to book an appointment. While the Saturday morning clinics have finished, 'flu jabs are still available.
