Holy Trinity Church

THE BELLS OF HOLY TRINITY CHURCH, BOTTISHAM

We wrote a note in the June 2014 issue of Cresset warning that the ancient bells in the tower of Holy Trinity church were in urgent need of refurbishment and re-hanging. We have one bell, dating from circa 1590 which is described as a rare survivor and four of the remaining five cast before 1640; three of which came from the same foundry, apparently uncommon. We noted that our main hope of securing funding of the level we would need lay with the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF), who place considerable importance on there being a demonstrable benefit to the community in any project that they fund. We announced that we would be putting a slip of paper through every door in the village inviting you to say whether the bells were important to you. We are very grateful that a large number of you took the trouble to respond and indeed every one of the 140 replies was positive. A number added very helpful comments, several of which were included in our application to HLF.

This alone will not have been the determining factor in the assessment of our application, but the very happy result is that we had notice just before Christmas that HLF has awarded us a grant of £48,000 under their 'Our Heritage' scheme. With this grant, along with the monies promised by the Ely Diocesan Association of Bellringers, plus contributions from the Bottisham bellringers and the Parochial Church Council, and some generous contributions from individual donors, we are now only *circa* £3,700 short of our target of £65,200.

It has been a long, and at times frustrating, process to get this far, but a very positive outcome is in sight. We are anxious to try to get close to our target as soon as possible, so that we can get the project underway. If we can sign up to starting soon, the firm who will be doing the work on the bells, Nicholsons of Bridport, would have a slot for us in late March, which would allow time for the building work that needs to be done to get the bells out of the tower - not a simple process. I hope to be able to write about this is more detail in a subsequent issue of Cresset, but in the meantime we would be very grateful to receive any donations that will help to take us towards our target. Either the Tower Captain, Derek Latchford, the Treasurer, Norman Green, the Vicar, the Revd Sue Giles, or myself (30 Tunbridge Lane; 811754) would be very happy to receive any contributions. Cheques should be made out to 'Bottisham PCC' and marked 'Bell Fund'.

RE:NEW

Last Christmas was a full-on family time for us. For the whole of the Christmas holiday, with the exception of one clear day, the house was full of a constantly changing procession of family, ranging from 18 months to 88! A dozen or more round the dining table at a time; bedrooms full to overflowing: the hosts sleeping in the lounge. Cheerful chaos! So many different characters, likes and dislikes; so many different life-experiences, hopes and expectations. Yet every one belonging; connected. Family - united by love.

Not everyone is fortunate enough to have a family like that, but we all need to belong somewhere, to feel that we are not isolated. Ever since the beginning of the human story, when God said, 'It is not good for the man to be alone', and He created Eve to be his companion, we have been hardwired to belong; to be connected to others. We are social creatures, made for community, and for many of us loneliness is one of our deepest fears.

From the beginning Church has been about belonging. People being drawn together by a common faith; a shared purpose. Church too should be a family – united by love.

However, perhaps the most powerful image of the church in the Bible is not of family, but of the church as a body, with Jesus as the head. The Apostle Paul wrote to the Christians in Corinth: 'Now you are the body of Christ and each one of you is a part of it.' He wrote of every part of the body being important. All the parts – hands, eves, ears, feet – being needed for the body to function properly. 'There are many parts, but one body'. They all belong together, and when every part is doing its job the whole body is strong and healthy.

Our churches need to be places where people can feel that they belong. Church is a place where every effort must be made to promote what is the best for one another. The Bible challenges us to love one another; accept one another; encourage one another; be kind and compassionate to one another; forgive one another; live at peace with one another. It tells us that it is by sharing one another's burdens that we fulfil the law of Christ. This is what it means to belong to God's family.

This is the kind of church we are striving to build at RE:NEW. We are all in it together. Like a family it can sometimes be hard work, sometimes frustrating, but also rewarding and fun! The door is open; all are welcome! Peter Wells

Refugees from Bottisham Swimming Pool

As a consequence of Bottisham Village College closing its doors to public swimming during school hours we paid our first visit to Impington Sports Centre for an over 50's session today (12th January). www.impington.cambs.sch.uk/impington-sports-centre.html

The impression is of an extremely well run, technologically up-to-date and reasonably priced facility. Entry requires one off registration for a leisure card (including a no cost 'at the desk' digital photo), ensuring that all sessions are paid for and individual identity is recorded. The session we attended was 'heaving' but there seems to be a reasonable number of sessions available to make swimming possible and enjoyable. One downside is that the changing room/shower facilities are not ideal, but at least the shower area is warm and the water hot. While there we bumped into at least 3 other refugees from the group of former Bottisham daytime swimmers.

Perhaps BVC could learn some lessons by studying the Impington set up and we continue to believe that public swimming during school hours needs to be restored at Bottisham. We also understand that households in Bottisham recently received a full colour leaflet advertising the Sports Centre and its revised hours. If that approach had been adopted prior to making a decision to reduce the opening hours, the need for that reduction might have been avoided. *Rich Braun/Ione Evans*

However we have learnt that the public open space at Ancient Meadows has now been adopted by the District Council. This means they are responsible for all grass and hedge cutting and have responsibility for trees in this area. Roads and paths will at some stage be adopted by the County Council but this will take longer as they like to wait a period of time to check that there are no problems.

Parish Council have been in correspondence with the Police regarding the parking situation outside of the shops and will be meeting with the PCSO shortly to discuss this further. I know a lot of people are concerned about the precarious parking on pavements and double yellow lines which obstructs pedestrians and other road users.

Some Parish Councillors met before Christmas with a solicitor with regards to making a compulsory land purchase of land on Lode Road. He will be writing to the District Council asking them to proceed with this. We were disappointed when we were told that we would not be able to use S106 funds, which is a fund provided by housing developers for the Parish when they build homes in our village. Rules state the funds have to be used for projects that will improve the community infrastructure of the village and apparently a new cemetery or a new playground does not come under this. Under the rules the funds could also not be used to purchase playground as to what we can spend the money on and is contrary to what we were led to believe. The way that funds are now provided has changed and we have been reassured that money from any future development will have no restrictions on how it is spent.

It was agreed at the January meeting that our precept for the year 2015/16 would remain unchanged at £23000. Our expenditure for the year had been less that we had predicted and we had been able to make some savings with regard to grass cutting for the next financial year. This would be the third year that it remained at £23000 although it was recognised that this would probably have to rise the following year.

NOTE: Although we have no official confirmation yet we understand that the application for the development of 24 dwellings at the Crystal Structures site on Tunbridge Lane has been approved and we await details.

Public transport does indeed matter – we saw the chaos caused to people's plans due to the overrunning railway works near King's Cross after the Christmas celebrations. It is fortunate that no-one was badly injured in the resulting crush of people at Finsbury Park station. Peterborough station also had problems as some King's Cross trains terminated there.

We value our local 10,11 and 12 services but sometimes as people age or become disabled a more supportive, personal type of bus service is needed and it is good to see that the Ely Soham Dial a Ride service is being offered a lifeline of £15k in the form of a grant by East Cambs. District Council. Closure can be suspended and hopefully a financial plan can be worked out to enable the service to continue. The Voluntary Network offers dial-a-ride for Newmarket and our area on 01638 608022 and Cambridge dial-a-ride is on 01223 50633. Country Living in January had an article on how to revitalise your village and it listed providing local transport including community transport. The Campaign for Better Transport has listed Peterborough as the hardest place to live without a car due to the lack of public transport.

Rail fares rose on the 1st of January and we are told that this is in part due to the involvement of foreign rail companies. An appreciated Christmas gift each year is the special Christmas and New Year editions of the Mainz, Germany local paper – I read that their bus (locally run) and train fares are due to rise by 2.55 per cent!

With family to visit in Bedford we do find the X5 a good service – the A14 is a busy road but we can relax and read while the bus driver copes with the traffic problems. We alight at Maids causeway on the way back to Cambridge and then can catch our local bus home from there. As it is a well-used service, we depart from Parkside to ensure a seat. Bus journeys can be a time of exploration and I have been lent an interesting book 'Great British Bus Journeys – Travels Through Unfamous Places' by David McKie – the cover bears the exhortation by James Naughtie to 'Climb Aboard'. It covers 25 routes around the country including Uttlesford and Irthlingborough areas but also Trafalgar Square! It has interesting little stories about the places en route.

Articles continue to appear in the papers concerning the need for more connecting rail routes around the country. The name Beeching often appears as the bad guy but it has been pointed out that Ernest Marples, the then Transport Minister, was really responsible for the cutbacks and closures – he ran a company that built roads. There was public outrage so he sold his shares – it is said to his wife. He finally left the country and lived for the rest of his life among the vineyards in Beaujolais. We may one day have a restored rail connection to Oxford but we must continue to use what we have – as always, use it or lose it!

The cross-channel ferry companies are facing problems due to competition from Groupe Eurotunnel and its company MyFerryLink and the new regulations for maritime pollution (Marpol). P and O and DFDS claim unfair competition. The Competition and Markets Authority has been involved and MyFerryLink is now for sale. Should DFDS buy it? They are closing their Portsmouth to Le Havre route. P and O reckons that due to Marpol its annual fuel bill will rise by about £30 million a year. Stena Line quotes £41 million a year.

The big health story in the news this New Year is about pressures on our local hospitals. We know that these are linked to other issues like getting to see a GP when you need to and getting care in place when you are coming home from hospital. We have two new projects that will look at some of these issues from a different view point.

In our **"First Steps to Health"** project we want to find out about the first thing you would do to solve different health issues. Would you work it out yourself, see a pharmacist, call NHS 111 or see your GP? We all solve things in different ways. We are also talking to the County Council and the Care Quality Commission, to help us plan where we should visit.

East Camb District Councillor's Notes

CRYSTAL STRUCTURES SITE, BOTTISHAM

On 7th January, the Planning Committee considered a full application to change the use of the Crystal Structures Site off Tunbridge Lane from employment and for 24 dwellings. A previous application was refused last July. The meeting had presentations from the planning officer, the applicant, a neighbour and the Parish Council. This time, the application included an outline application for 600 square metres of space for non-domestic institution use (eg a dental practice) or business use (eg office or research).

There had been improvements to the design arising from requests from District Councillors at the meeting last July. The dwellings will comprise 9 Affordable Homes for rent under a Housing Association for those with connections with Bottisham and 15 for sale on the open market. There will be 6 two-bedroom, 7 three-bedroom, 10 four-bedroom and 1 five-bedroom dwellings. There are 33 planning conditions to be met and approval was given subject to a legal agreement on financial contributions towards off-site public open space provision and maintenance. Education provision will be covered by funds from the Community Infrastructure Levy to the County Council.

Papers for the January meeting may be found on the District Council's website and the draft minutes will appear on the February meeting papers. These provide a large amount of information about trees and landscaping, archaeology, potential contamination, parking, traffic calming, ecology, drainage, energy and construction impacts.

ANCIENT MEADOWS, BOTTISHAM

The public open space at Ancient Meadows has now passed into the ownership of the District Council from the Administrators of Land Charter Homes, subject to Land Registry confirmation. The grass and trees should now receive regular maintenance by the Council_s Open Spaces Team. It comprises about 4000 square metres of land on either side of the development and the square open area. As decided in legal agreements back in 2005 and 2007, the space is for recreational use by the public.

A 'Village Society' for Bottisham?

But first, as I write, the Post Office in Bottisham Village Stores is undergoing refurbishment with the powers that be saying they have consulted with the village concerning their wishes. The truth more likely is that the decision had already been made regardless of a consultation. We've already seen in the Bell Road Masterplan how responses to questions can be twisted to suit a particular outcome. I cannot help but think that to put a counter distributing cash and other such like adjacent to a window and in the proximity of an open door is rather foolhardy and pays scant attention to staff and customer security. How this managed to pass a 'risk assessment' I cannot but wonder. The cynic in me suggests it's all part of a grandiose Post Office plan to encourage 'Internet On Line' usage of services thus prompting eventual closure!!

But now to my main topic; as Bottisham has grown I've frequently heard it said there's not enough happening to stimulate and to inspire a 'Community Feel'. Others have commented that there are broader matters influencing the natural village environment which require better communication and more rigorous reflection. I do empathise wholeheartedly with both viewpoints but in order to revive or to instil a 'community spirit' you need a willing community. Sadly, my belief is that we in Bottisham now tolerate 'Community Inertia' and so have lost what was once a 'willing community'!

However, quite by coincidence over the Christmas and New Year holidays this topic of 'community spirit' cropped up whilst chatting with a number of acquaintances, both old and new. Examples were conveyed as to how some villages pull together to promote a particular community project or objective. And I was interested to hear about and indeed became envious of those villages where such 'community forums' exist in one guise or another. In these 'forums' community matters are raised and, where relevant, are proactively addressed allowing initiatives to be put in place without the burden or bureaucracy of local government. Often overseen by a small nucleus of folk this band of willing volunteers involve themselves in the sort of 'community action' that often sits outside the scope or remit of a Parish Council. And what makes these 'forums' truly remarkable is that local people are willing to be co-opted in to help when a specific expertise or a vocational skill is needed. Furthermore these 'forums' can confront any issue and can formally press a case for a particular opinion and or outcome.

But let's be perfectly clear and without confusion – Community Forums to do not replace the role of Parish Councils, and if asked to do so can support and can complement the work of Parish Councils in certain village matters.

Just two models of such 'forums' not far away from us are the 'Haslingfield Village Society' and the 'Fulbourn Forum for Community Action'. I would recommend anyone wanting to know more about these organisations and what they do for their local community, often in partnership with other village groups, to use your Internet Browser and research either organisation or any other Community Forum.

Should a similar 'Community Forum' ever be considered for Bottisham it could for example inspire action of all kinds in support of improved community amenities and even possibly a Community Website including an archive for historical documents, maps, books and photos. A 'Community Forum' could even spearhead and develope ideas for improved community cohesion and an enriched community spirit through purely social get-togethers like a village festival. An annual 'Harvest Feast' is one such initiative that several community forums seem to put on which typically include a Hog Roast, Ceilidh and a display of farm machinery, etc.

Having found out from other communities about the indigenous potential that often lies dormant I wonder how willing the hidden potential in (Jolley ol' World continued on page 56.)

Bottisham would be in trying to renew and to advance community participation? So, having thrown down the gauntlet I wonder if anyone is willing to take up the challenge?!

Our family moved to Bottisham in August 1971. The primary school was still at the village college site, the playing fields were lined with tall trees, there were three pubs in the village and no swimming pool. This was before the time of Queen's Court (where there was an orchard) and Hilton Park and there were far fewer houses. Our dad, Dan McMahon, had recently left the U.S. Navy after 25 years of service and was reading History at Downing College, Cambridge. Dad became a teacher at St. Bedes School, then at Newport Grammar School and was a member of the Staine Hundred Local History Society.

We children gradually left Bottisham, returning for student holidays, 'between jobs' and for a bit of TLC and a good meal at weekends. After retirement, Dad enjoyed reading the paper, keeping up with current affairs and meeting his friends at the Bell where he had his own pint mug behind the bar. Over the years, our visits home became less frequent until our mother, Felicity, died in July 2001. We then started to visit Dad in Bottisham more often.

As Dad became frail, the community network kicked in. Friends and neighbours looked in on Dad to make sure he was okay, popped to the shops for him, helped him to visit the surgery and found him after he fell and needed emergency care. In the last year Dad was in and out of Addenbrookes Hospital, had a brief stay at Queen's Court in August and went to Hilton Park two days before Christmas. Our family certainly made full use of Bottisham. It has everything a family will ever need: good schools, sports facilities, shops, pub, surgery, dentist, care homes and Church (with a good bell tower for ringers). What a great place to live.

Dad died on Boxing Day in Bottisham, the village that was his home for nearly 45 years. In those years he lived at 4 different addresses, saw his family grow with the addition of 6 grandchildren and made many friends. The list of Bottisham people that helped Dad in his final years and days is too long to list but a special mention is to Tunbridge Close residents James & Harriet Fitch (good friends for many decades), Mike & Jane Seakins, Nick & Anthea Smith, Neil & Angelique Ridyard; also to Gregg & Thelma Dean, Dr Croucher and the team at the surgery, the staff at Bottisham Stores, the teams at Queen's Court and Hilton Park; and to Rev. Sue Giles and Deacon John Morrill for the prayers. Thank you for looking after our dad so well, we will miss him.
