

The Bottisham Bells

The Bells - out of sight, but not out of mind

It is a pleasure (and a great relief!) to report that the bells are down from the tower and away to the works of Nicholson Engineering in Bridport, Dorset. None of a pessimistic Churchwarden's worst fears were realised and in the event the whole operation went smoothly, apart from a small battle to get the bellframe apart. (Why ever did they do it that way in 1929?) The steel beams put in place during the building works did their job as fixings for the hoists and the bellhanger, Andrew Nicholson, who started his working life as a trombonist in the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra, and his volunteer assistants demonstrated, as everyone without exception had told me, that 'they know what they are doing'. Thank you Andy Thompson, Dan Hammond and Phil Gorman for your invaluable



help over the three days.

Having the bells on pallets at the back of the church was quite a sight and even more so when they were lined up in the right and proper order, treble to tenor, outside the church on the morning of departure. I wrote in the last Cresset that this would be a once-in-a-lifetime experience. Not true! Both Tony Newman and Joyce Rank remembered as small children being taken with their class from the old

village school, aka Il Piccolo Mondo, to view the bells on the grass outside the church in 1929. A twice-in-a-lifetime experience for them, but surely just 'once' for most of us. A rare opportunity for certain to be able to photograph Tony with the treble. Recast in 1976 it bears the names of the then Churchwardens, Tony and Fred Cooper, but it also had the original inscription renewed, with the names of the Churchwardens when the bell was first cast in 1828, one of whom was Thomas Newman, Tony's great-great-grandfather. Even more remarkable, if not so interesting for the village, was to photograph Andrew Nicholson with our super-rare bell, cast around 1590 in Cambridge in the foundry of 'Ricardus Nicolson'. Andrew is one of his descendants. Andrew tells me that it is one of only two bells known to have survived from that foundry.

Horror stories of whole rings of bells being stolen - the metal alone (bronze) in the tenor, the heaviest bell, is worth about £6,000 - were sufficient to cause your Churchwarden to spend the night sleeping in the church with the bells. What would have happened if a bunch of desperados had arrived to remove the bells is uncertain, but happily all six were still there on awaking the next morning. If all goes according to schedule, they will be returned to us on 24 August. Re-hanging the bells will take somewhat longer than getting them down, but even a pessimistic Churchwarden has hope that we shall have good news to impart in the next issue of the Cresset in September. *Mike Young*

Parish Council meet once a month (1st Monday of the month). We have a Planning Committee headed by Councillor Hilda Buchanan, an Environment, Churchyard and Cemetery Committee headed by Councillor Steven O'Dell and a Finance Committee headed by Councillor Christine Bryant. One of our new councillors Julia Latif suggested having a Community Working Party which will look at creating a new website and look at how facebook and twitter could be used to promote the parish council and the village. She has agreed to Chair this group. We will also have a New Cemetery Working Party which Councillor Jon Ogborn will chair, this will look at the compulsory purchase of land on Land Road. Both of the working parties will report back to Parish Council for any decisions to be made. Most councillors serve on at least 2 of these committees or working parties. We currently have 10 councillors and hope to co-opt our final vacancy very soon.

We have been complaining to Sanctuary Hereward for close to a year as have some local residents to fix the fences at the rear of the properties which back onto the footpath running alongside the cemetery. Several of these were in a poor condition, leaning into the path and a small barbed wire fence was dangerous as parts of it were sticking out into the path. A representative from Sanctuary Hereward did finally come and take a look and made some temporary repairs. It took some intervention from our District Councillor Vince Campbell but I am pleased to say that all repairs have now been made and the barbed wire fence has been replaced with a wooden one. Very slow progress but we got there in the end.

We have been disappointed that our grasscutters haven't been able to keep up with the weather and keep our grass in the village as tidy as normal. We appreciate that they may have some staffing issues but have told them that any problems need to be rectified by the end of the month.

The planning application for change of use for River Farm Smokery on Wilbraham Road has been approved. The airfield museum which was on the Crystal Structures site on Tunbridge Lane will now occupy this area. Councillors are concerned about parking at the site. When an event was held here vehicles were parking on the A1303 which was particularly dangerous.

Tony Jolley, our Speedwatch co-ordinator tells us that there now has to be a minimum of 3 volunteers on each speedwatch check instead of 2 and the way that data has to be submitted has also changed making it more complicated for those volunteers that are not I.T minded. If you have some spare time please contact Tony, I understand he is putting in a separate report in the Cresset regarding Speedwatch. If we don't have enough volunteers we won't be able to continue with this scheme, it does help to keep speeding in the village down.

Thank you to all those residents who attended the Annual Meeting on Thursday 4th at the Royal British Legion. Thank you also to our guests County Councillor Mathew Shuter, District Councillor Vince Campbell and former Councillor Robert Stevens, Mr Paul Belzar – Bottisham Primary Headmaster, Margret Coles – Bottisham Community Library and Coral Hatley – Bottisham Local Charities. The evening was a review of the past year and a look ahead to what this year may bring. *Claire Fullwood, Parish Clerk*

Just wait a minute!

We're not very good at waiting are we? At traffic lights; supermarket checkouts; doctor's surgery (why do you think it's called a 'waiting room'?) we get impatient if we have to wait. We live in an age of instant gratification. We want everything now! We hurry and we scurry. The African word for white people means 'ones who scurry'! Africans move at a different pace. I once talked to a lady in Uganda who said, 'You people have the watches, but we have the time.' She was talking to me instead of going to a meeting!

My granddaughter is at present working for six months in an orphanage in South Africa. She recently wrote on her blog page: 'African time has taught me that if you're always racing to the next moment then you never fully appreciate the one you're in. There is a beauty and calmness in just being content with where you are right then.'

The New Testament tells us that one of the flavours of fruit which the Holy Spirit seeks to grow in the life of a Christian is patience. The others are: love; joy; peace; kindness; goodness; faithfulness; gentleness and self-control. (See The letter to the Galatians Chapter 5 verse 22) Not such a bad recipe for living!

When was the last time you actually sat down for ten minutes and did nothing? I mean, really nothing. Not watching TV or texting or checking your mobile or reading or talking – just being.

Now I know this is a bit extreme, but I recently spent four hours standing by a large pool surrounded by reed-beds waiting for a brief glimpse of a fairly rare bird – a Little Bittern. I could hear it, but I never saw it! Mad? Perhaps. Did I go home feeling relaxed and refreshed and ready to get on with the busyness again? Certainly!

For the sake of our mental, physical and spiritual well-being we actually need to be able just to relax and switch off now and again. Chill out; de-stress; contemplate; meditate – call it what you will. Try to find, or perhaps I should say make sure you find, a 10 or 15 minute space in each day. (Not four hours!) Perhaps in the garden, or go for a walk, or just sit in a quiet place. Leave your phone somewhere else. Let them wait! There are still 1,425 minutes left in the day to do all the other stuff!

If you are a believer, then this can be time spent consciously with God. The Bible says, 'Be still before the Lord and wait patiently for him.' (Psalm 37 v.7) This is the time when God might just be able to get a word in edgeways – and you might even hear what he has to say! The prophet Isaiah wrote: 'In quietness and trust is your strength'. (Isaiah 30 v.15) Even if you are not a believer, those few moments of quiet and stillness can make a difference to your day – and your life. Peter Wells

Andy Hamilton and High Sheriff join War Detectives

Red2Green held its final War Detectives event on the 10th June, being joined by Andy Hamilton (the scriptwriter, comedian and Red2Green Patron) and the High Sheriff of Cambridgeshire to commemorate the 70th Anniversary of the end of World War 2.



Nearly 100 guests started the event at Red2Green in Swaffham Bulbeck to view displays showing the work done by War Detectives over the past year, and enjoy a buffet lunch. The guests included local residents, students and staff from Bottisham Village College, and representatives from local organisations, joining the leaners, trustees and staff from Red2Green.

Following a short walk to Swaffham Bulbeck Primary School, the next part of the day involved film crews from the Primary School, Village College and Red2Green Aspirations introducing the films they had created of local residents sharing their stories of living and serving in World War 2. Eight films in all were shown on being an evacuee, serving in the RAF in Burma, the local Home Guard, extracts from the diary of a resident's grandmother – who ran a shop in the village, stealing ammunition from a German plane shot down, the double tragedy of some families in Lode who lost sons in the war, and daughters, who married Americans serving at Bottisham Airfield, and the planes and crew that were based there. These 8 films (lasting 45 minutes in total) were, according to Ruth Rogers (Red2Green's CEO) "informative, funny and very moving" and can be viewed at www.youtube.com/channel/UCLeHsG0nWZZQNXkBqGDXviw

In addition to sharing the films they had made, the War Detectives also outlined the work they had done throughout the year, such as poems, artwork, pictures, reports and leaflets of places visited, before placing them in a time capsule. Such work came from the students at the Swaffham Bulbeck Primary School and Village College, Red2Green's Aspirations and Options learners and a local resident.


The time capsule was then put in a decorated wheelbarrow pushed by Ron Butler (a local resident who served in the RAF in the war) who followed the flag of the Bottisham and District Branch of the Royal British Legion and 2 air cadets and their officer who processed to the War Memorial in Swaffham Bulbeck. Following them were the High Sheriff dressed in his very smart uniform, breeches and all, and all the guests and other local villagers.

At the War Memorial the High Sheriff spoke about the importance of the War Detectives project in enabling older people to talk about their wartime experiences at the same time encouraging the young students present to continue to listen while they could still hear the stories directly. He also said that there was a very good possibility that some of the school children present could well be alive when the time capsule is dug up in 100 years time.

With help from a number of War Detectives the High Sheriff dropped the time capsule into the prepared hole sealing it with a lid and plaque that read:

Red2Green

'In commemoration of the 70th Anniversary of the end of World War 2, a time capsule was buried nearby on 10th June 2015 by War Detectives from Red2Green, Swaffham Bulbeck Primary School, Bottisham Village College, and local villagers who lived and fought in the War, the High Sheriff of Cambridgeshire and Andy Hamilton (Red2Green Patron) (War Detectives continued on page 19.)

To finish the day's events Ed Compton (Assistant Principal at Bottisham Village College) played the 'Last Post' on his trumpet before everyone observed a minute's silence.

The day was clearly a great success as has been the whole War Detectives project in bringing schools, Red2Green and the local community together to pursue a common goal to learn and commemorate together.

In making the day a success thanks are due to all the War Detectives and the partner organisations Swaffham Bulbeck Primary School, Bottisham Village College and Red2Green as well as the local residents featured in the filming (Ken King, Stan Hedges, Cliff and Daphne Baigent, Steve Gotts, Heather Hatley and Ron Butler). We are very grateful that both Andy Hamilton and the High Sheriff joined us and took such an active and supportive part. In addition we want to thank the team that 'dug the hole' and sealed the time capsule in it - in particular David Rayner, Martin Mead (Mead Construction), David Ball Group Ltd (who provided the PUDLO waterproof concrete), Nigel Wilson (Andrew Firebrace Partnership) and Barney, Barry and Ken - and Graham Haynes for help with the plaque. We also had a great lunch provided by the Norfolk Street Deli, with the PA system used at the War Memorial provided by PDS of Peterborough. Lastly thanks go to Hi8us who did a brilliant job in working with the students and learners to produce such excellent films.

LANDLORDS of privately rented properties in Cambridgeshire can pick up free smoke and carbon monoxide alarms at forthcoming distribution events. New safety laws will make it compulsory for all landlords to fit, or have fitted, smoke alarms in rented homes. These laws, currently subject to Parliamentary approval, are expected to come into effect from October 2015,.

Under the new laws, smoke alarms must be fitted on every floor of each and every relevant property. Additionally, carbon monoxide alarms must also be fitted in properties where solid fuels are burnt.

Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service has a limited number of free alarms to distribute to relevant landlords and will be doing so at distribution events at it's fire stations on the first Mondays of July, August and September.

We've recently undertaken a major conservation project to replace the worn out millstones in Lode Mill with re-conditioned French Burr stones, which are the correct historical stones for milling grain. The weight of the stones and restricted access meant that it was a major challenge to remove the old stones and lift the new stones into the mill and install them. Visitors to the mill donated an amazing £3,000 to the project with the Herts and Essex NT Association raising a further £2,000 towards the £13,000 project. We've retained the old stones which will be displayed in the garden.

There are a number of vacant plots available on the Sunray Allotments, in Lode, if you fancy a go at growing your own fruit and vegetables. Several plots and areas of pathway had become overgrown but we've recently tidied those up. Thoughts of a Sports Nut

I've always felt a little guilty for not affording Rugby Union a more generous allocation of column inches in the Sports Nut column and, following a chance conversation in the Legion car park with a rugger afficionado recently, I resolved to make some effort to redress the balance in future. The trouble is that, ever since my tiny 16 year old frame was trapped at the bottom of a ruck in my one and only school match in the early 70s, I've taken very little interest in this stop-start game with the incomprehensible rules.

Clearly it's the wrong time of year to expect big Rugby stories from the field of play but, with the World Cup 2015 to be hosted by England during September and October, I will endeavour to be better informed henceforward! Let us hope that recent examples of England players' ill-discipline off the field, in the build-up to the tournament, do not affect the preparations of Stuart Lancaster's squad.

As far as other sports are concerned, I hardly know where to start, this month, with all the offfield dramas in cricket and football!

Ease off on that right foot...

You may have heard of the term 'Speedwatch' and or have seen a few people wearing high visibility jackets standing on the roadside in the proximity of a Speed Display Panel. These people represent the Bottisham Community Speedwatch Team and are residents of the village who periodically give freely of their time to monitor vehicle speeds. Their objective is to make our village roads safer; if at all possible, by educating motorists that excessive speed in a speed restricted zone constitutes anti-social behaviour and of course is unlawful. The presence of this team should be an occasional reminder to all that speed limits are in place for very good reasons. I would therefore like to give over my 'column' this month to specifically comment on the objectives and achievements of Speedwatch in an attempt to persuade more volunteers to come forward. Hopefully most of you will be interested in the focus of this month's piece or if not at least find it informative.

Speedwatch in this area East Cambridgeshire was set up in 2009 as a community led initiative arising from a concern with an increasing number of motorists who habitually exceeded speed limits in residential areas of villages. In response the East Cambs Neighbourhood Panels (as they once were) facilitated the introduction of Speedwatch with the support and guidance of Cambs County Council and of course Cambridgeshire Constabulary - the rationale being to empower communities to help themselves by taking on some responsibility for making their roads safer.

The Speedwatch 'mission statement' for want of a better maxim is as follows: Community Speedwatch (CSW) is a community led feedback scheme designed to allow unpaid volunteers to officially monitor and report to the police the details of speeding vehicles in specific areas where speeding is of concern to the community. Speedwatch is an educational exercise rather than an enforcement tool and has a role to play in supporting local communities to improve road safety.

Bottisham seized the opportunity and became a founding member of the East Cambs Southern Area (ECSA) CSW scheme along with twelve other villages in this part of East Cambs. As the lead village Bottisham continues to coordinate Speedwatch checks in the ECSA area and oversees the deployment of the specialised speed monitoring equipment. Each volunteer has to undergo specific training covering both operational and administrative requirements including of course H&S and Risk Assessment issues. Only when training is completed will a volunteer be indemnified by Cambs Police and be considered suitable to operate CSW checks.

The Bottisham CSW Team commenced its operational activity in late 2009. It wasn't long before speeding hotspots in the village were identified and confirmed - the worst by far being Bell Road and Tunbridge Lane. The High Street and Lode Road also had and still have their speeding problems but due to the new family housing in Bell Road and Tunbridge Lane and the relocation of the Medical Practice, both roads were given priority for further action.

With the support of Cambs Police and the County Council a case was made by the Bottisham CSW Team to have physical speed reducing measures installed in Bell Road and Tunbridge Lane. The case was taken to and endorsed by Bottisham Parish Council and an application was made in 2013 requesting East Cambs to sanction the use of S106 monies to cover funding. The application was approved on the grounds that it was a Community Infrastructure project that had a direct connection with Bottisham's new housing from which the S106 monies had accrued.

A good number of residents have spoken of the benefits the traffic speed calming schemes have brought to both Bell Road and to Tunbridge Lane and this view is reinforced by Bottisham CSW's own checks which show the 'measures' are proving to be effective in the majority of cases. But unfortunately there's only a partial scheme installed in Bell Road (Jolley ol' World continued on page 50.)

which will hopefully be completed in the next few weeks with the addition of Vehicle Activated Displays that will show actual speeds followed by an appropriate 'message'. Alas a full scheme with a series of speed cushions was limited due to the abundance of residential drives with dropped curbs. But Bottisham CSW hopes this will be remedied if and when the extra housing in Bell Road is approved and a three way raised table at the Bell Road/St Peter's Field junction along with a raised table at the gated entrance to the College playing fields are made conditions of development. A raised table was also asked for as a condition to the new development at Crystal Park in Tunbridge Lane.

But of course there are those still opposed to the speed cushions being in place and indeed there are motorists driving certain marques of vehicle to whom the rules observed by most decent and considerate folk obviously don't apply. At least two local motorists have witnessed cars overtaking them in the 30mph zone along Bell Road. What does it matter if one more family pet gets killed? What or who will it be next – someone's child crossing the road to get to school!! One particular motorist driving a VW Passat Estate at around 7.30 in the morning seems to be a persistent offender along with the driver of a Red Van carrying ladders...

Over recent months East Cambs Speedwatch operations have been relocated from Ely Police Station, with whom ECSA-CSW had an excellent rapport, to be consolidated into Police Operations at HQ in Huntingdon. Regrettably the consequence seems to have resulted in a community led initiative morphing into the bureaucracy and confines of a 'one size fits all' countywide scheme. Nevertheless Bottisham CSW is still firmly committed to the Speedwatch concept. But in order to comply with the new operational guidelines Bottisham CSW must have more volunteers able to help out - preferably once a month. If you are concerned about speeding in this village and would like to become a member of the Bottisham CSW Team and are prepared to undergo training please do contact: clerk@bottishampc.org.uk or csw.ecsa@gmail.com

And so after six years of operation CSW has become a familiar sight in Cambridgeshire's villages and has been recognised locally as an informed voice on road safety issues. In some cases comment has been invited by Planners on planning applications in the area. Furthermore not one motorist has had to be reported for abusive language or for making an offensive gesture. Cups of tea and coffee are always welcome! *TJ*

Ambulatory Blood Pressure Monitor: We are pleased to report that this piece of equipment, paid for by a patient following the fund raising campaign by the Patients' Group, is now in use and there is a waiting list.

Shingles Vaccination: Shingles is a very painful disease so if you are eligible, that is patients born between 2.9.44 - 1.9.45 (70 years old), 2.9.36 - 1.9.37 (78 years old) or 2.9.35 - 1.9.36 (79 years old) and have not had this vaccination before then do please take this opportunity. The Practice reports that many patients have not taken up this offer.

Missed Appointments: Although the May figures showed a reduction on the annual average of 100 appointments a month missed, there is still room to improve.

In May, Mike Young came to speak to us on John Argentein, whose family were large landowners in Cambridgeshire, including Bottisham. John Argentein was born in Bottisham in 1443 and was almost certainly baptised in the font that still stands in Holy Trinity Church. He went to Eton and then became a scholar at King's College, where he studied first the Liberal Arts and then Theology. However, he also took a course in medicine and after Ordination was absent for two years in Italy, where it is thought he studied medicine, most likely in Padua. In 1478 Argentein became physician to King Edward IV and then to the Princes in the Tower, Edward V and his brother. He made regular visits and was possibly the last person to see the Princes alive, except for their murderer. It is recorded that he then served Richard III, who still seems the most likely murderer of the Princes, and then, remarkably, Henry VII, following his defeat of Richard at the Battle of Bosworth in 1485.

In 1501 Argentein was appointed Provost of King's, whose mighty new Chapel, started by Henry VI, was less than half finished. It is known that Henry VII and his mother, Margaret Beaufort, celebrated St George's Day in the Chapel in 1506 and it is possible (King's College believes it to be so!) that John Argentein played a significant part in persuading Henry VII to provide the funds for the completion of the building, although neither he nor Henry lived to see it. Argentein died in 1508 and was buried in the Chapel. His Chantry Chapel, now the Memorial Chapel to those who died in the two world wars, is at the east end of the south aisle. His epitaph asked those who passed by to say a prayer for him; perhaps we should spare him a thought too when we pass the font in Holy Trinity.

Our meetings usually take place on the third Thursday of each month in Lode Chapel at 2.30pm. On July 16th, our speaker will be Libby Ahluwalia, Chairperson for Friends of Whitworth House. We have invited members from Impington our link branch to join us. On August 20th, we will be holding our Summer Cream Tea. All are welcome to both events.



Public Transport Matters

Firstly, my apologies for my non-deliberate error last month – we did, of course, travel to Huntingdon on the B guided bus and not the X5. The X5 is our usual service to Bedford, where we have relatives. The B is easy to access for those of us who use the 10,11 or 12 as it departs from an adjacent bay at Drummer St. There is a suggestion that we might have a Sunday bus, as a pilot scheme between Cambridge, Newmarket and Bury St. Edmunds is being considered by Newmarket Town Council and Suffolk County Council. It would be run by the Voluntary Network using a 16-seater mini bus. I followed up on the non-arrival of the 9.08 service from Bottisham recently and received an apologetic e-mail in reply from Stagecoach. It had been due to a mechanical fault which occurred on route. Apparently vehicles are inspected and serviced every 21 days and each day drivers check the vehicle before they depart in the morning and complete a vehicle defect card for any faults that occur during the day. When problems arise, they try to locate a spare vehicle but were unable to do so on that day. I recently returned to commutermode by catching the 7.50 a.m. bus to Cambridge. I was prepared to stand but there were several spare seats. In my real commuter days in the 80s/90s (pre-P and R!) there were 2 different buses which arrived from Newmarket and the A1303 and took different routes to the city. I was not surprised on my recent trip at the slow crawl and the congestion until we reached the bus lane by Marshalls. The Park and Ride was very busy. According to the Cambridge News a public transport revolution is looming as there is to be an unprecedented period of investment - £750 million of schemes under the landmark City Deal - 3 new railway stations at Addenbrooke's, Cherry Hinton and Fulbourn and improvements to the local railway infrastructure. Greater Cambridge needs more devolution, it says, and the power and control of funding from the Government. The 74-page transport strategy is described as Cambridgeshire County Council's wish list. It is detailed in a 2-page spread in the CN of June 1st. Too much to list here!

There has been a lot of rail information recently - Abellio has accepted that it needs to improve its cleaning operations as it has been accused of dirty and flea-infested trains. It is to spend £30 million on the project but a local letter writer appealed to the public to help by taking their litter home or using the disposal facilities. Foxton residents are upset at the news that plans to improve the Foxton level crossing area have been scrapped for the foreseeable future. There are problems with both the functioning of the passenger gates and the ticket machines at Foxton station. There is to be an extra stop on the route between Cambridge and Stansted Airport as the trains will call at Whittlesford Parkway. Abellio is rebidding for the East Anglia franchise but in a surprise60/40 venture with Stagecoach. This would strengthen the Scottish group's grip on England's railways, as it would add Liverpool St. to its portfolio of London mainline stations. Abellio at present (9/6/15) is in crisis apparently as its two top Dutch executives leave their jobs due to a bidding scandal in the Netherlands. German owned Alliance Rail is looking to offer Pendolino tilting services between London and Edinburgh. It would take 3 hours 45 minutes in air-line style comfort stopping only in Newcastle or perhaps also in Stevenage. Crossrail is in the news for the way it is unloading the material excavated during its tunnelling operations. There is an interesting website showing the building of a jetty at Wallasea Island near Southend so that 4.5 million tonnes of soil can be delivered by ship from Northfleet to create a new 1500 acre nature reserve for the RSPB. An 800-metre conveyor system transports the material within the site from the jetty. Crossrail will deliver fare cuts of up to 40% from early June for London commuters to and from Liverpool St. eastwards as this section is removed from the Abellio Greater Anglia franchise and transferred to MTR. Romford is to get some of the best deals!

We recently enjoyed a Voyages of Discovery mini-cruise from Portsmouth to Guernsey, Honfleur in N. France and then back to Harwich. (Public Transport Matters continued on page 63.)

We took the train to Portsmouth from Waterloo and were pleased that there was a trolley service – something not available in our region. The train from Harwich to Ipswich was late but we did manage to catch the connection to Newmarket so no refund this time – but no coffee break at the station and no trolley service! We had used the earlier useful refund when purchasing our tickets to Portsmouth. We caught a local bus from St. Peter Port in Guernsey to visit the Museum of the Occupation – a shocking experience. The friendly bus driver had kindly shouted out the nearest stop as we drove through the lovely hillsides. On our arrival in Harwich I checked with reception regarding a ferry service to Esbjerg to replace the closed DFDS service and they said it hadn't happened despite a Regina Lines advt. on the web.

Stena Line from Harwich to the Hook of Holland also offers short breaks. They have a railand-sail service so you can travel with Greater Anglia to Harwich and then go by rail to any Dutch city.
