



A Book to die for!

I have on my bookshelves about a dozen different translations and paraphrases of the Bible! Most of them are the result of a desire to read the word of God in contemporary English. To make it intelligible and accessible to anyone who may choose to read it. My dozen or so English versions are only a fraction of the hundreds which have been produced down the ages. There is also a huge demand for Bibles in practically every other language, and people are working tirelessly to meet that demand. The whole Bible has been translated into about 350 languages, and portions of it into 2123 languages! It is still a worldwide best-seller – mainly because so many people actually want to read it!

Many of these versions are the result of groups of scholars painstakingly translating from the earliest known Greek and Hebrew texts. Modern scholarship and recently discovered texts have resulted in increasingly accurate translations from the original.

It was not always so! In 1408, it was declared an offence punishable by death to translate anything from the Latin Bible into English. Why? Because both Church and State were afraid of what might happen if ordinary people were able to read all of God's word for themselves in their own language, rather than simply hearing in Latin the interpretations the Church wanted them to hear.

Recently I watched a TV programme about the life of William Tyndale. At the same time I was watching 'Wolf Hall', a drama set in the court of Henry VIII, just when Tyndale was translating the Bible into English; living in exile, in hiding and in fear of his life. These were the days when religion was literally a matter of life or death. England was an authoritarian state, ruled by King and Church. Spies and informers were everywhere, and those who didn't toe the official Church line could be branded as heretics, tortured and burned at the stake! Non-conformism was not for the faint hearted!

It was in this atmosphere that William Tyndale determined that the common people of England should have a Bible in their own tongue. He vowed that the common ploughboy would know more of the Bible than the pompous clerics of the Church. In 1524 he was forced to flee from England, but devoted the rest of his life, first to translating and publishing the New Testament. Later he began work on the Old Testament, which he never completed. Copies of his work were smuggled into the country in various ingenious ways, and to be found in possession of one could result in torture and death. The same situation can still be found in some countries today!

On one occasion, the Bishop of London burned 6,000 copies of Tyndale's New Testament on the steps of St. Paul's Cathedral. William Tyndale was himself burned at the stake in 1536 in Belgium. He was only 42, but he had changed the course of English history and profoundly influenced English language and culture.

How easy it is for me to take my Bible for granted. Yet people like Tyndale gave their lives, suffered and died, so that I could read, study,understand and be transformed by the word of God. For me, as one who tries to follow Jesus and his teaching, the Bible is a priceless treasure. At RE:NEW the Bible is essential to us as we seek, week by week, to understand its message and apply it to our lives. Have you got a Bible on your bookshelf? Why not dust it down, open it at the New Testament, and see why Tyndale and many others thought it was a book to die for?





Parish Council Report

Our Speedwatch Co-ordinator Mr Tony Jolley came to our February meeting. He explained how Speedwatch was implemented in 2009 as the result of concerns over speeding in villages by Parish Councils and the public. Tony co-ordinates several Community Speedwatch Teams (CST), the Bottisham one having 4 members. When conducting a survey a log is recorded of all vehicles going through the speed check for statistical purposes, speed data is recorded at 35mph and above. Data matching the criteria results in a warning letter being sent to the registered keeper by the Police. Tony reported that a recent speedwatch survey in Bell Road found that through traffic has reduced and that the majority of vehicles are keeping to within the speed limit. The average speed of those offending vehicles was lower than last year before the traffic calming was introduced, from 42mph to 36mph in a 30mph zone. 40% of vehicles were speeding in a 2013 check; this has now been reduced to 16%. Overall it is felt that the traffic calming has had a positive effect. No speedwatch checks have been done in Tunbridge Lane but local residents report that there does not seem to be as much through traffic and vehicles are slowing down. The vehicle activated signs, once installed n Bell Road will further improve results. CST's rely on volunteers without whom local speed checks cannot be made. If anyone is interested in becoming involved with Speedwatch please contact either Tony Jolley or myself.

Carrying on with the theme of traffic, we recently met with County Council Highways to discuss the possibility of extra lay-bys being placed at the 'Triangle' area by the shops. The parking situation seems to have grown progressively worse over the last 6 months as there is simply not enough space for the amount of vehicles wishing to visit the shops. The County Council have no funds at all so this would probably have to be paid for by the Parish Council. We may be able to make an application under the Minor Highways Bids which take place in September this year. This is a fund set aside by the County Council for local highway projects which would cost less than £10,000. At this stage we just wanted to know if lay-bys were an achievable option and to get an approximate cost which we are waiting for. We also met with our local PCSO to discuss the parking situation at the shops. He has said that he will look at the parking whenever he is in the village and will take a zero tolerance approach to those parked on the double yellow lines and also those parked half on the pavement in Tunbridge Lane which now also seems to be happening on a regular basis. This results in pedestrians walking towards the doctor's surgery, including those with pushchairs having to walk round the vehicles into the road on the bend where they can't see what traffic is coming towards them. As those driving into the village from Bell Road will recognise it completely obscures your line of sight when a vehicle is parked on the double vellow lines, especially when it is busy. Please can residents be mindful of this and think of other road users and pedestrians when they park near the shops and keep our village safe.

Thank you to those who left out their electrical recycling in December. This collection raised £161.32, a similar amount to previous collections. The next collection has been arranged for Wednesday 20th May, there will be plenty of reminders nearer the time.

Recently the Parish Council asked for applications to clubs and societies that were looking for a small amount of extra funding. Following on from this it was agreed to give £260 to the Community Library for the cost of installing a phone line, £300 to the Village College towards floats and lane ropes for the pool and £400 to Saplings Pre-school towards the cost of repairing the roof.

On a final note, I think most people are aware of the general election taking place on May 7th. You may not realise that this is also the date for the parish council elections. Councillors are elected onto the Parish Council every 4 years. Everyone has got something to give and everyone's





Planting of the new Himalayan silver birch grove has now been completed. The grove is located just beyond the existing grove towards the end of the Winter Garden. It's a big thank-you to everyone who donated towards the purchase of the new trees.

The House re-opens for the season on 11 March. Recently while waiting at the High St. bus stop by the pillar box the no. 10 bus emerged from Beechwood Avenue and pulled over so that we could board further down the High St. Apparently two cars had parked opposite each other further back up the High St. and he couldn't get through the gap. Presumably anyone waiting at the church would not have been picked up.

Tony Jolley is right in appealing for more community-minded spirit – an awareness that we are part of a community as we go about the village. Historically and even now this has had the church at the centre. Pauline and the Rev. David Lewis set up the Wednesday coffee morning at Queen's Court and this has been successful but due to deaths and people moving away the numbers have dwindled. Do join us – it is a happy get-together. It is now moving to the Poppy Room at the British Legion. The Rev Simon Goddard was behind the setting up of The Hub, which until recently met at Queen's Court on the first Saturday of the month. It started well with the various clubs, craft activities, etc. attending but there were few visitors and it has gradually dwindled in support and ceased. Now that so many women are working outside the home there is a lot to do on a Saturday and it is understandable that popping out to The Hub for coffee, browse and a chat would not be a priority. It is sad that the community use of the Sports Centre has been cut – Henry Morris set up the village colleges as community based hubs. Years ago I taught an evening class at both Soham and Bottisham village colleges and remember how lively the atmosphere was. Individual societies which meet in the evening seem to be well supported and reports appear in the Cresset. These are all run by long-term residents - let's hope that all our new residents can join our community and help to run Bottisham Unlimited! From my reading of the Lode Star they seem to have a good community base.

The Cambridge News continues to be at the heart of the wider Cambridge community. Letters continue about the problems with the park and ride ticketing system and also the systems at the unmanned railway stations such as Whittlesford. There are to be new railway tickets designed and printed as people are being fined on trains because they have purchased the wrong tickets from these machines. After complaints there is to be new lighting by the guided busway's cycle path from the railway station to the Trumpington Park and Ride site and also from the A14 bridge to Milton. There has been a great loss of passengers of the park and ride buses due to the new ticket machines and these are now being introduced by the guided bus park and ride sites. A recent letter complained of the serious traffic congestion on the A14 and queried how the guided bus has in reality caused less traffic on this vital route.

There is reportedly a big increase in rail travel – see the figures at dataportal.orr.gov.uk. Both the CN and the Newmarket Journal have highlighted the need for improvements at Newmarket railway station – CCTV and improved lighting. This is a busy commuter station and also a welcome to people who have come to what is called 'the world headquarters of racing'. There is a request for more frequent services and, like our local request for buses, an evening and Sunday service. Mike Petty today (12/2) in his Looking Back column quotes a request in 1965 for an improved rail station.

Crossrail 2 could link to Stansted and Cambridge but it needs to be funded. The London-Cambridge-Stansted Consortium wants to see a four-track line between Cambridge and Stansted. A station at Addenbrooke's is also under consideration as part of the City Deal.

Public transport needs to be more user-friendly so that the high level of road congestion can be cut. There is talk of electric buses -see 'Electric Buses 2015-2025' by Cambridge based IDTechEx. Travelling by bus not car can save you money according to a Stagecoach study – St. Ives/ Cambridge by car including parking is £145.06 a week but £24 for a bus ticket. They offer a 5-day Smartcard. 

Thoughts of a Sports Nut

I confess my golfing ignorance was on display last month in my round up of what's coming in 2015. My attention was drawn to this shortcoming so politely in the bar of the Legion that I resolved to please the gentleman concerned by having a bit of a swot!

And what did I find? Well, sadly, February brought news of the death of the first African-American to play on the PGA Tour. Promoted from caddie in 1961 when the Association finally dropped its ridiculous Caucasian-only rule, Dr Charlie Sifford, went on to win two Tour events and the PGA Seniors' Championship in 1975, and was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame in 2004. East Camb District Councillor's Notes

COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE FUNDS

Further to last month's notes, an explanation of funds that the District Council negotiates from developers would be appropriate.

In the past, negotiations have taken place with developers to fund improvements arising from the impact of their developments. These are called Section 106 agreements, which are legally binding. However, there are now Community Infrastructure Levies (CILs) which apply to all developments, including new single dwellings, and are calculated on the basis of floor area. 15% of these levies go to the Parish Council and the rest to the District and County Council. However, Section 106 agreements still apply to large developments as well as CILs.

Where a developer has provided the necessary amount of public open space on the development (such as was the case for the Ancient Meadows and Ox Meadow developments) the Section 106 funds negotiated would only be there to cover other infrastructure requirements in the parish. This would include public buildings and facilities used by the community. Parish Councils and other bodies providing community facilities may request money from these funds. If the public open space is not provided on-site, or there is a lack of it, the developer must find the land elsewhere and maintain it or provide funds for its purchase and maintenance by the District or Parish Council. This applies to the Crystal Structures development and would apply to a future Bell Road development.

If there is indeed interest in a Community Forum or Society I will arrange for some that have done it elsewhere to come to talk to us. Perhaps also those that are running group activities could let the rest of us know a little more about them...

Of local interest this month is the 'green light' given by the District Council for the 'modified 'Crystal Park development of 24 houses in Tunbridge Lane. Unfortunately this decision delivers yet another 'slap in the face' for local democracy as it fails to address any of the community's priority concerns and aspirations. The 'Brown Field' site was earmarked in the last East Cambs 'Local Plan' for Business Units/Light Industrial - but the community wanted some of the space to be acquired for use as a community asset. The most likely outcome would have been a mix of the two yet neither of these wishes has been met because of the threat of central government interference. If the application was rejected on the grounds that it didn't conform to the Local Plan nor meet community needs it would almost certainly have been overruled on appeal by a Government Planning Inspector. So much then for central government's community empowerment agenda! Consequently, the quest for more POSs in the village remains unresolved. The decision to build even more houses without any proven justification (other than for profit and to meet targets), and to that matter on Green Belt land, simply adds to the evils the village already suffers from 'over development'. I recall going to a meeting with 'planning strategy' representatives of East Cambs a while ago when we were told there would be a moratorium on further housing development in the village – the memories of some are short lived aren't they!! A progressive school of thought suggests it's much better to custom build whole new communities of thousands of houses rather than ruin existing villages and decimate the surrounding rural environment with the odd fifty here and there - noting the debacle in Bottisham I think I'm inclined to agree!

I also understand that out of pure frustration the Public Open Space (POS) in Ancient Meadows has been 'taken on' by the District Council. Perhaps, as the District Council is now responsible for this area, we can expect a smidgen of the vast amount of Bottisham S106 money being held by East Cambs to be spent on some 'Nursery' Play Equipment in accordance with the original site development plan? We also hear that if Crystal Park goes ahead the District Council has offered Parish Council the £70K Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) on condition it takes over the Ancient Meadows POS. It's of little surprise then to learn that this offer has been met with lukewarm (Jolley ol' World continued on page 56.)

enthusiasm! Moreover I read that, even with so much that needs to be done to the supporting infrastructure in the village; the Parish Precept has again been frozen. Surely this is the time to be taking on responsibilities and accruing monies to meet the much needed community spending programme!

And so to the main topic; the title may strike a chord with some as I've heard it discussed in numerous places over several weeks. It relates to the self-appointed 'Thought Police' who seek to influence the self-proclaimed 'jury' that sits nowadays on Social Media. Since when, in this 800th Anniversary year of Magna Carta, which by the way was 'drafted' not many miles away from here in Bury St Edmunds on St Edmund's Day in 1214, yes 1214; has the judgment of disaffected 'Bloggers' become part of the judicial process? And since when has ''Trial by Twitter' determined someone's guilt or innocence? But, according to many correspondents this is precisely what's happening, in particular in the cases of a footballer and a teacher. We also read in our papers of a Café owner who asked a couple in his café to desist from publicly 'kissing and canoodling' as such acts were contrary to the standards the owner and his patrons expected. Unbeknown to the Café owner the couple turned out to be 'gay' women. Needless to say the 'Twitter Militia' took up arms resulting in the Café owner being chastised on Social Media and forced by the 'authorities' to make an apology or, I believe, even face closure and possible prosecution for Homophobia!

The Red Bucket appeal

We have been raising money to buy a 24-hour blood pressure monitor (ABPM) for use in the Practice since Christmas. So far we've collected £627.01 in the red bucket. However, a very generous patient living in Bottisham has pledged to pay for the monitor outright, for which we and the doctors and nurses are extremely grateful. A particular ABPM has been identified after consulting Addenbrooke's Hospital and we hope it will soon be in use at the surgery. We are left with a considerable sum which can be used to purchase other equipment for the Practice. Whilst the Practice already has the necessary basic equipment to provide good medical care, additional medical equipment like the 24hr Ambulatory Blood Pressure Monitor can assist the doctors, nurses and patients with diagnostic tests which otherwise require attendance at Addenbrooke's Hospital. The Practice is currently researching appropriate medical equipment which will further benefit patients. Watch this space and our noticeboard at the surgery for more details of how your money will be spent.

Refugees From Bottisham Swimming Pool (2)

We have, in addition to the facilities at Impington Village College, also sampled both Abbey Pool http://www.better.org.uk/leisure/abbeyleisurecomplex#/ and Newmarket Leisure Centre http://www.angcomleisure.com/. Abbey is managed on behalf of Cambridge City Council and is not linked to a particular school. The pool is open to the public Monday -Friday 6.30am - 9.45 pm and 8am - 8pm at weekends. During school hours it is sometimes shared with local schools. The session we went to had one lane in the main pool dedicated to school use for part of the time while the public used the remainder. Getting into and out of the main pool is by upright ladders. We joined for a one off £5 payment giving access at a reduced rate to Abbey, Parkside, and (although thankfully not at this time of year) Jesus Green open air pool for a twelve month period. Abbey is accessible by public transport and is on City route 3. We found the water temperature a little on the cool side and someone we met elsewhere also mentioned this to us. Newmarket Leisure is linked to Newmarket Academy and managed on their behalf. There is no joining fee and there are daily monthly or annual rates with concessions for the over 60's. It is open to the public from 6am - 10 pm Mondays to Fridays, 6 - 5.30pm on Saturdays and 8 - 4.30pm on Sundays. During school days it has certain dedicated times for school swimming and has some sessions for particular groups (e.g. ladies only, adults only). There are easy access steps into the pool (ask if they are not in position) and a hoist for those with disabilities as well as upright ladders. We have now been there about 4 times and the water temperature has always been comfortable. The three hairdryers have all been working each time we have been there. The Sports Centre's Montage café/bar provides a good range of lunches at a reasonable price so, thankfully, you can undo all the good you've done after your swim unless you choose one of their healthier options. It is on the route of the number 10 bus if you don't mind a slow trip through the villages and is also conveniently opposite the hospital.

Both facilities have communal changing areas but there are separate private shower cubicles. Lockers take returnable £1 coins. They also have a separate teaching/training pool. Staff and technology at the entrance ensure entry is controlled and payment is made.

Our experiences of the above facilities and of Impington demonstrate that it should be entirely possible for schools which have the benefit of community sports facilities to make those facilities accessible to the public during school hours and we hope BVC will make a positive effort to restore public daytime swimming to the community.






