ARMISTICE DAY 11th NOVEMBER 2020

However this year with the restrictions on youth organisations meeting etc. and public gatherings restricted there will be no parade, but a reading of the names and two minutes silence will take place at the memorial before the service.

You can read in the magazine about the Armistice Day activities in the village and also notice of the fact that there will not be the usual Poppy Appeal collection boxes in use, either door to door or at the entrances to supermarkets. Online is the way they want us to do it. Everything is going 'on-line' these days.

Another event will be the 5th November, gunpowder, treason and plot etc. With the restrictions on gatherings for the larger public events, I suspect there may be more garden displays. But even those will have to be to limited numbers. Cambridge Fire & Rescue Service have some very clear advice in their article this month.

I hear lots of comment about the 'new' village shop, aka the co-op. Lots of well-loved items no longer available and the atmosphere much changed. I do think that the old shop had a USP because it did have different things that other shops didn't. Now it is more like any other co-op shop and therefore has lost some of that attraction.

It was a destination shop for greetings cards for example, because of the choice that was always there. Also, an outlet shop for small individual manufacturers and producers like Broadland hams, McLellan Castle pâtés and Delphi salads, but not now. Also, Lanes bakery, a local low miles supplier of bread is no longer stocked.

I do hope that Bill is able to bring back some of that individuality and keep the character of the old village shop. Given all that, it is great to have the convenience of it being here in Bottisham at all.

It is sad to report the death of a couple of Bottisham characters. Colin Bryant passed away last month, and Peter Midgley also died just a couple of weeks ago. Our thoughts are with their families.

In the magazine now, Sports nut gives his view on all things sport. Always a good read, even to those of us who do more watching than taking part.

Great to see the Library opening up again and tackling the distancing issue so well. Wonderful commitment from all the volunteers.

Lots of other items of interest, so have a good read, let us know your views and we'll be back next month. Christmas already on the horizon!

East Anglian Air Ambulance



Despite the ravages of, and restrictions necessarily imposed to combat, Covid-19, EAAA continues its invaluable lifesaving work within our communities. The funds required to allow it to continue flying 'Anglia One' from Norwich and 'Anglia Two' from Cambridge are in the region of £13m this year. A tidy sum ! Much of this comes from individual bequests, and contributions through red boxes in shops, public houses, garages etc. Another income stream is via sponsored events such as 'Together we Run' - EAAA's virtual 2,000 Mile Challenge Fundraiser,

Back in May this year in Long Meadow Jen, daughter of one of our lovely volunteers Jean, suffered a brain aneurism. The NHS sent an ambulance and Anglia Two attended with a specialist trained crew. 'Neil' and others spent the best part of an hour administering treatment at the scene before accompanying Jen to Addenbrookes.

In view of this, Megan, Jean's granddaughter, decided to take up the Challenge Fundraiser by walking a Marathon along cliff paths and promenades whilst in Devon on holiday. "I wanted to do this challenge for EAAA because they recently came out to my Auntie who had a burst brain aneurism. If the Air Ambulance and Paramedics hadn't reached har as fast as they did she probably would not be here today."

Megan helped raise over $\pounds700$ - the total raised to date is in excess of $\pounds16,000$ - and rising! East Anglian Air Ambulance is celebrating its 20th anniversary this year - having progressed a long way since its inception when the AA and Frankie Detroit helped with its founding.

"The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it" - $John \ 1.5$

These words resonate so strongly with me as I reflect on 2020.

I don't like to be a draining doom-and-gloom-type person, but I am committed to authenticity, honesty, vulnerability, and the truth is, for many, 2020 has been a very dark year.

Maybe your darkness has been rooted in relationship breakdown, job loss, loneliness, illness, bereavement, empty-nest syndrome, financial difficulties, [insert other situation] - all very difficult things to go through, only accentuated due to the nature of life with Covid-19.

For me, 2020 has been a very dark year, with struggles and battles not rooted in the pandemic, but certainly compounded by it. I have struggled with symptoms of depression and anxiety and on doctor's advice took some time away from 'work' to seek to get to a more healthy place.

I have been struck throughout this year by how the depth of the darkness enables the light, however small, to shine much brighter.

A single candle flame, in a bright room during the day will have minimal impact on the environment; as evening approaches, the light's influence on the surroundings will be more noticeable; in the depth of the night, that single flame will be sufficient to lighten the whole room.

I want to encourage you, the light is shining in your darkness.

For me, this looked like: my incredible wife who was beside me, loving me, praying for me, supporting me, covering my shortcomings throughout my darkest times; my fantastic GP who genuinely cares, is wise, encouraging and challenging where appropriate; my children, who bring me joy by their love for me, their joyfulness, their simplicity, their need for a drink, a biscuit, a bit longer on their devices; the beauty of my surroundings, and the deep joy and brightness experienced when walking Barney (our 9 month old labradoodle) for miles everyday, in all weathers, through the amazing countryside around me; the gift of good friends who were close enough to let me know they care, without being too intrusive and demanding of me.

Each of these light-shining-people, I believe, carry and reflect light from a particular source; the same source being talked about in *John Chapter 1.5* - the loving, creative, joyous, gracious, generous, hopeful, kind, gentle, good, patient - LIGHT of God, seen in creation, "**let there be light**" (*Genesis 1.3*) and experienced in the person of Jesus Christ whose coming Christians will celebrate next month, "**the true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world**." (*John 1.9*)

Sometimes I need to be reminded to open my eyes, look around, and see the light around me rather than keeping my eyes closed, looking down and dwelling in the darkness. When I look around I see the beauty, I see the light shining in and through the world and in and through others - the light of God.

WHAT IS 16 DAYS OF ACTIVISM?

16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence is an international campaign. It takes place each year from **25 November** (International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women) until **10 December** (International Human Rights Day).

Throughout the campaign, Mothers' Union joins with around 6,000 organisations from approximately 187 countries who participate in the campaign, to raise awareness of, and call for an end to, gender-based violence in all forms and in all societies. There is often a theme for the campaign but as of the production of this pack (September 2020) this has not been announced.

As part of the campaign this year we will be holding our first Global Day which is centred around the disturbing figure that "1 in 3 women worldwide have experienced domestic or sexual abuse" and that Mothers' Union, as a leading women's organisation, believe this to be unacceptable.

The 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Based Violence campaign is an extension of the day-to-day grassroots work of Mothers' Union. We work alongside communities to help end gender-based violence and to support those affected by it, every day of the year.

We pray for all to follow Christ's example of treating children, women and men with equality and respect.

WE PRAY for all who live in fear of violence and despair that life will ever change.

Bring to an end their suffering, restore their sense of worth.

WE PRAY for those who perpetrate abuse with no sense of guilt or shame.

Bring to justice their actions, change their inner hearts.

WE PRAY against regimes that endorse violence.

Shatter their influence, initiate peace.

Loving Lord, we pray for a better world where love, justice and peace may flourish. - Amen

Parish Notes

My first task is to introduce myself, as this is the first time I have written the Parish Notes. My name is **Jonathan Giles** and I have just taken on the role of Parish Clerk. I have lived in Bottisham since 2012 and, for the last three and a half years, have been Parish Clerk for Lode. While that gives me experience of the tasks I will have to undertake here, I know that each village and Parish Council is unique. So my first priority is to catch up on the huge amount of knowledge built up by Claire Fullwood in her 15 years in the role. I am grateful to her for the guidance she has given so far and for the assurance that I can go back and ask more questions!

Given the challenging times we are living through, the Parish Council invited Mrs Rankine, Principal of Bottisham Village College, to outline how the staff are meeting the challenges presented by the pandemic. I think everyone was struck by the sheer number and complexity of the extra tasks required in order to reduce risk for students, staff and everyone living locally. She explained that the college is now organised into 5 year group "bubbles". Young people are asked to follow the guidance to protect their friends, rather than under threat of sanction. She estimates that 97% of students are self-regulating and that issues arise with only a small minority. The precautions span the whole day, including the transport, where seating plans are used to reduce mixing beyond the "bubble" children are in during the day. Recognising that returning to college after the lockdown creates issues for young people, the College has devised a three point plan: i) refamiliarising students with the environment (90% of students returned in the first week which is now up to 97%) ii) rebuilding students' confidence, and iii) catchup strategies to make up for the time lost during lockdown. As if this wasn't enough, the College has also developed contingency plans to respond within 24 hours if government imposes tougher measures to prevent the spread of the virus

Referring to the arrival and departure of students, which is the factor having most impact on the village, she advised that parents were asked to use the sports centre car park. Parking near the entrance is discouraged, as this disrupts school buses and other traffic. While many have worked within this system, a few are continuing to park in Lode Road or the Triangle, often for some time and leaving engines running. Senior staff are seeking to keep things running smoothly but are, on occasion, sadly receiving abuse from parents.

Parish Council has received messages from local residents expressing concern about the congestion and risk to pedestrians and cyclists. So we would ask that parents and carers minimise this by using the sports centre car park as requested. Congestion in the area will also be reduced if you can delay your arrival until close to when the pupils are released. Please also be respectful of the staff, who are working under such extreme pressure at this time.

The application for the Retirement Care Village was due to be considered by the Planning Committee of East Cambridgeshire District Council on 7 October, at which Parish Council were to make a verbal submission opposing the development. In the event, this item was taken off the agenda to allow the applicant to respond to a recent submission from the County Council. We await further developments.

District Councillors' Report

The District Council adopted the Custom and Self Build and Natural Environment Supplementary Planning Documents (SPD), which developers now must follow. We were impressed by how many individuals and Parish Councils responded with support and ideas to strengthen the measures further, particularly for the Natural Environment SPD. Unfortunately, SPDs can only strengthen and expand on policies already in the Local Plan. This meant that many of the suggestions, which Councillors also supported, could not be included as they could not be linked with policies in our current Local Plan. But they have all been recorded and will be brought forward again for consideration when we develop a new Local Plan. As the current plan dates back to 2015, John and Charlotte are keen that we should start work on drafting a new Local Plan which properly addresses the climate emergency and our need for affordable housing. Meanwhile, the Council is now consulting on a Climate Change SPD to ensure our Planning Policies reduce climate impact. We hope that many people will comment on this SPD by the closing date of 23 November – you can read the draft document on-line or request a copy from the Council.

We are also consulting on our Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Policy, which seeks to ensure that we fully include everyone in service provision, job opportunities and other aspects of the District Council's activities. This is an important document and we are keen for many people to comment, so that we develop a policy which builds a community in which all can take part and all can take pride. The deadline for comments is the end of November.

To comment on any consultation, go to the Council's website - https://www.eastcambs.gov.uk/ and click on the button for 'consultation' which will take you through to the document and details of how to comment.

Members of the Bus Working Party finally received feedback from the bus services consultation. This will be discussed by all members at a seminar at the end of October before Finance & Assets Committee decide on the Council's request to the Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority for improved bus services in East Cambs. John and Charlotte are pressing for the results of the walking and cycling surveys, which have still not been reported to members even though the consultation closed at the end of May. We were pleased to note that many people locally had responded to the bus survey with ideas for improvements to buses to Ely, Newmarket and Cambridge, including considering wider destinations such as Addenbrookes and Cambridge North.

We will be holding our next Councillors' **Surgery by Zoom on 17 November from 6.00pm**. The meeting code is: 631 542 4066 and the passcode is: 938720. If you prefer to follow a link, it will be on Charlotte's Facebook page - fb.me/charlottecanelibdem. The Surgery will be followed by 'Meet your Councillors' from 7.00pm on the same Zoom link. If you join for the surgery, you will be held in the waiting room if there is already someone in the meeting with us, so that any discussions during the surgery remain confidential.



SHOW RESPECT THIS BONFIRE NIGHT

Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service is joining forces with local authority partners and emergency services to help keep people safe this bonfire and fireworks season.

With many organised events cancelled across the county, emergency services are preparing for a busier night than usual. There is an emerging concern that more people will plan displays and bonfires to celebrate in their own gardens, which could pose significant risk for those who choose to use them.

We are asking everyone to show respect this Bonfire Night.

Head of Community Fire Safety, Group Commander Per Middleton, said: "Bonfire Night is historically a very popular fixture in the calendar where people come together to enjoy firework displays, however this year is very different. With the COVID-19 pandemic still with us, the organised displays we would usually enjoy cannot take place and we are concerned that some people may look to hold their own displays.

"While most people enjoy fireworks responsibly, they can quickly become a disaster and, in the wrong hands, they can cause injury and damage to property. Fireworks are explosives and should be treated with respect. Only use fireworks in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions and the firework safety code, ensuring all necessary safety precautions are taken.

"We would strongly discourage people from lighting bonfires in back gardens as they present significant risks to residents if they get out of hand. Not only this, but the smoke can also aggravate coronavirus symptoms for those that might be shielding or isolating."

"We would encourage residents across the county to think twice before having their own displays and lighting bonfires in their gardens this year. Not only do these present risks for residents and our crews, but with the pandemic still with us we all have a responsibility to ensure we don't put unnecessary strain on emergency services. Please show respect this Bonfire Night and think twice about having your own display."

Group Commander Middleton added: "Although bonfire night might look a little different this year, there are still ways families can enjoy it safely. There are lots of family friendly activities people can do at home, such as watching a virtual display, or doing some crafts together to mark the occasion, without putting their loved ones at risk.

"It's also really important that residents remember the government's rule of six to help control the spread of COVID-19."

If you intend on buying fireworks for a home display, please follow the firework safety code:

- Only buy fireworks marked with a CE mark
- · Don't drink alcohol if you're setting off fireworks
- Keep fireworks in a closed box and always follow the instructions carefully when using them

- Light them at arm's length using a taper and stand well back
- ever go back to them once they are lit. Even if a firework hasn't gone off, it could still explode
- Never throw fireworks, and never put them in your pocket
- Respect your neighbours don't let off fireworks late at night and remember there are laws in place you must follow
- Take care with sparklers never give them to children under five. Even when they've gone out they're still hot, so put sparklers in a bucket of water after use
- Keep your pets indoors throughout the evening.

Fireworks can also cause a great deal of distress to animals. In a recent survey, 62 per cent of dog owners reported their pets showing signs of distress during fireworks season, with 54 per cent of cat owners experiencing the same. Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service and the National Fire Chiefs Council are supporting the RSPCA's Bang Out Of Order campaign, encouraging the responsible use of fireworks and the adoption of tighter regulations concerning their use.



Thoughts of a Sports Nut

WHAT a race this year's Tour de France was! It's a unique event anyway, with its history, its three-week duration, individual and team interests, races within races, alliances and feuds, awards for riders with different skills, all culminating in a glorious sprint finish on the Champs Elysees on the 21st day of racing. To put it simply, each stage is a separate race, timed to the second, and the overall winner is the rider with the quickest aggregate time. But he can achieve this only with the assistance of seven team members who take turns providing him a slipstream in which to ride more easily and also chase down attacks from opponents. On the way to Paris, in addition to the overall 'General Classification' (Yellow Jersey) there are four side competitions: for best sprinter (Green Jersey), best mountain climber (Polka Dot Jersey), best young rider (White Jersey), and best team (based on aggregate time of the teams' first three riders). And, as if that isn't enough, there is also a daily award for the most 'Combative' rider, as judged by the organisers. So, although most riders' jobs are primarily in the service of their respective team leaders, there are plenty of opportunities, not only for some personal glory, but also to put the names of the team sponsors in front of the world's cameras.

Anyway, may I straight away admit that I called the race winner wrongly! Against all expectations, the favourite Primož Roglič, the Vuelta Espagna reigning champion, suffered a catastrophic loss of form on the Stage 20 Individual Time Trial, and was overhauled in dramatic fashion by his powerful young compatriot, Tadej Pogačar, who snatched the 'Maillot Jaune' to become the first Slovenian to win the Tour and the youngest winner in 116 years! Poor Roglič! He sat disconsolately on the tarmac for a couple of minutes at the end of his ride, a picture of wretched desolation, then hauled himself up to go and congratulate Pogačar, who was mid-interview with French TV... a classy, touching moment that speaks volumes about the respect between the participants in this brutal sport!

And talking of 'brutal', please spare a thought for poor Geraint Thomas (the 2018 Tour de France champion) who crashed out of the Giro d'Italia for the second successive time with a fractured hip, after hitting a stray water bottle in the neutralised zone even before racing had begun! He still rode for a full day with the injury though... tough boy!

Despite a few weather-related frustrations, we enjoyed a summer of scintillating international cricket in all its forms, culminating in a mini-series of One Day Internationals against our traditional foes from Down Under. As with West Indies, Pakistan and Ireland, huge respect is due to our opponents, and also the ground staff of both Old Trafford and the Ageas Bowl, for entering the "bio-bubbles" to make the games happen. At one game each, the climax of the ODIs in Manchester was adorned by three centuries, 600 runs and 14 wickets in the day. Australia squeaked home in the run-chase with two balls to spare, and England were left to rue a number of costly mistakes but, all things considered, this was sporting drama of the highest level in the most difficult of times, summed up graciously by Eoin Morgan, the 'English' captain: "Sometimes when you're beaten by the better side you've just got to put your hand up and today was one of those games."

Respect is also due to the West Indian Women Cricketers who came over for an entertaining T20 series against England. Unfortunately, they were outclassed by the home side in all departments but the skill level of both teams was impressive and one would hope that a closer contest would develop next time round.

I won't bore you with any lamentations over England's lacklustre Nations League matches versus Iceland and Denmark in September but, while we were fretting, something remarkable happened in Stockholm (at the beautiful Friends Arena, in fact, where the Bottisham boys had witnessed Zlatan Ibrahimovic putting England to the sword back in 2012). Cristiano Ronaldo, now almost 36, scored his 100th (and 101st) goal for Portugal in his 165th international appearance. It's fair to say that I have not always been Ronaldo's greatest admirer, particularly in his early days at Manchester United, where he was as noted for his double-somersault-with-pike as much as his goalscoring! However, having escaped the clutches of United's megalomaniac manager (may I just say how I chuckled at the Wikipedia description of Ferguson as "former football player"!), Ronaldo went on to grace the biggest stages of Europe with his ability to carry his teams to honours whilst apparently plundering goals at will.

This boy from Funchal, Madeira is a record-breaking machine! He has won the European Championship and Nations League with Portugal and, at club level, he has won seven League Championships in three different countries - England, Spain and Italy. Here's a small selection of his other records:

• Five times winner of European Champions League

Five times winner of Ballon D'Or (leading European goalscorer in a season)

- First player to score more than 50 club goals in four, five and six consecutive seasons
- Most World Club Trophies (4 shared with German, Toni Kroos)
- · Scored 450 goals for Real Marid including 35 League hat-tricks
- Most goals in Champions League history 130 including 20 headers
- Only player to score for Portugal in four different World Cups (17 matches in total)
- Portugal's most capped player with a goal tally unlikely ever to be beaten

And he needs only nine more goals to take Iranian Ali Daei's record as the leading international goalscorer of all time! So... respect, Mr Ronaldo, for a stellar career. You're not Pele, but you are genuinely a 'great' of the game!

From a footballing point of view, I wouldn't expect most people to care much about the saga of Gareth Bale's long-winded departure from Real Madrid and eventual return to Tottenham Hotspur in September... However, I would hope that any true football fan would be outraged at the sums of money involved at a time when we are about to see an unprecedented number of lower league clubs going bust! The Bale deal is that the player is receiving half of his preposterous £500K per week wage from each club whilst on loan for a year. How can anyone involved sleep at night when this sum is more or less the same as the debt that has put Macclesfield Town FC out of existence after 146 years, and is shortly to do the same to Southend United under a winding up order? With Bury Town already consigned to history, this could become a familiar pattern over the coming months as those clubs who rely on gate money for a significant proportion of their revenue find themselves unable to cover players' (and their bloodsucking agents') contracts.

I suppose this state of affairs is not exactly the fault of Bale's, or his two clubs. This time bomb has been ticking ever since the formation of the Premier League, the sell-out to Sky TV and the failure of FIFA, UEFA and the various national Football Associations to regulate the game in the best interests of all. Club owners, too, many of them only half a step ahead of the law (or not yet caught!) are complicit in this mess. Why could a relatively small levy not be introduced on Premier League club transfers and players' wages to support the game at lower levels? If the ridiculous wealth in football is not re-distributed more equitably soon, then the Football League as we know it will go the way of Nero's Rome! TTFN - Gerry Daish


