I cannot write anything this month, until we deal with the biggest impact that might have been made to this village since the nine-mile hill development was addressed back in the 1980's.

It was good to get the news eventually, that the appeal against the decision to reject the retirement development was turned down. That seems like bad grammar, but the result is that there will be no development on that bit of green belt.

If you read the detailed report from the Planning Inspector, it was not all plain sailing, however the decision was made and we can all be thankful for that. It highlights that green belt is there for a reason and makes the environment that we live in what it is.

Developers ought to take note and turn their attention to sites that are already suitable (and there are many) and not try to look for keyholes to take over areas which are not suitable or indeed available.

Our cover picture this month, taken by John Harris, shows the field which was to be part of the concrete and brick development being used for what it is good at, and that is growing food and crops on green belt land.

We also should not take our eye off the ball, because there may be other plans put forward which would continue to change our environment bit by bit.

Developers have a knack of submitting plans which initially look innocuous, but which lay the ground for further development further down the line. Unfortunately, the bureaucratic planning system which we have does not allow the decision makers to look over the fence to see the bigger picture when it is plain to others what the scheme is.

However, note was taken of the submissions made by villagers and in particular the medical practice. So it does no harm to air your view if you see planning applications coming forward which you think are not good for the village.

In addition, if you want more information on a particular planning application that you see in the Planning notice in The Cresset, then note the application number and go the East Cambs planning website and you can see all the detail there. Including other people's views and objections.

As I write this it is Easter weekend, and the weather is being very kind to us. I have even dusted down the Barbecue for when the family come over for the Easter egg hunt.

I hope you can enjoy the good weather when it comes and avoid the dreaded lurgy which still seems to be rife, if less severe. It seems most people view the catching of Covid as inevitable. If you are one that catches it, then I hope it is a mild one and you get over it without any long-lasting effects.

# News From Holy Trinity Church Bottisham

I am delighted to report the success of two fundraising activities in the Church. On 19th March a coffee morning gathering in aid of the Red Cross Appeal for Ukraine raised a magnificent £1161. One-week later Julie Bristow and her choir gave a concert which raised a further £1244 for the same cause. Many thanks to all those involved in the organization of these events and to all those who attended and contributed to this very worthwhile cause. In the meantime, we are exploring the possibility of housing a refugee family from Ukraine in the area.

On April 1st Lucy Frazer, our Member of Parliament, met in the church with several of the volunteers who had helped with the food bank and food distribution during the first lockdown resulting from the COVID pandemic. On behalf of these volunteers, our vicar the Rev Sue Giles, was presented with a certificate in recognition of the Bottisham Volunteers for their outstanding service to the community. This is displayed on the church notice board.

**Future events**: On Saturday May 7th we are holding an informal 'Coffee, Cake and Concert' in the church from 10.30am. The first two words are self-explanatory and the short concert will comprise some easy listening and popular pieces for violin (Stuart Field), soprano (Sarah Maxwell) and piano (Jonathan Giles). Entry will be £4 for adults, to go towards the significant cost of maintaining the church fabric, with no charge for children. Please do come along to support us.

For the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Weekend on Saturday 4th June, we are planning a celebration tea and garden party in the vicarage garden with typical outdoor garden party activities. In addition, we plan to hold an exhibition in the church displaying photographs, taken in and around the village during the 70 years of the Queens reign. # Parish Council Report

Firstly, could I encourage residents to join us at our Annual Parish Meeting on 24th May at 19.30 at the Bottisham Community Sports and Social Club? Those of you who attended the Covid-delayed Annual Meeting in October last year, will recall the success of a new format we trialed. This minimised the amount of formal sitting down & listening, with extended opportunity for informal discussion with councillors & representatives of public organisations that serve our village. Everyone who attended clearly enjoyed and welcomed the new format and we intend to follow this approach again. If you can join us, this is a great opportunity to have a voice in helping grow our village as a great community to be part of.

Now on to other matters. The news we have all been waiting for has arrived! On 7 April we received a copy of the Planning Inspector's judgement on the appeal against the refusal of planning permission to develop a retirement care village to the rear of 163-187 High Street. The appeal has been dismissed. This is the outcome many local residents, the Medical Practice and the Parish Council hoped for.

It is clear from reading the judgement that making the appeal decision is a complex process. The evidence for the many issues raised during the appeal was weighed in detail by the Inspector in coming to his decision. The outcome was by no means a foregone conclusion and it is now clear that the careful work by so many people was essential to it being achieved. My thanks go to the team from East Cambridgeshire District Council, to our District Councillors, Dr Keith, all local residents who made representations (particularly those who registered as "interested persons" to the Inquiry) and my colleagues on the Parish Council.

The key factors leading to his decision were that only 3% of the land within East Cambridgeshire is Green Belt and that this development would have caused harm. However there have been judgements made elsewhere that "very special circumstances" may justify the building of a retirement village on green belt. A key part of the appellant's evidence was an "Alternative Sites Assessment", which claimed that there was no other suitable land for such a development in the District. The Inspector found that the criteria set for the assessment were unnecessarily narrow, to the point that only 4 alternative sites were identified (and each of these was rejected) out of a possible 285!

The other good news we have received since I last wrote, is that the Board of Trustees of the National Trust agreed in March not to oppose the Compulsory Purchase by ECDC of the land needed for our new cemetery. Work on the planning application is nearing completion and we hope to lodge it by the end of May. Again, this work has involved a lot of work by many people; I am very grateful for the Councillors and residents who have played their part in bringing us to this key stage.

In my March article I described the work required to the trees on the boundary of the present cemetery and invited comments from those interested. No one has raised any issues in response and the Parish Council decided at its April meeting to follow the recommendation to cut back the basal growth to the Lime trees between the cemetery and the public footpath. This will leave gaps which will be closed by suitable fencing.

Finally, I have received a plea from a local resident concerning gravel "leaking" from driveways onto the pavement, causing difficulty for people using wheelchairs. If you have a gravel driveway, could you please regularly sweep gravel back on to your drive to keep the paths smooth? Your drive will also last longer!! At the same time, it is a timely reminder that wheelchairs and pushchairs all need room to move along the pavement and it is important that cars do not park on kerbs and create an obstruction.

# District Councillors' Report

#### OPERATIONAL SERVICES COMMITTEE

- 1.The ECSS (the Council trading company that collects waste and cleans streets) Business Plan for the forthcoming year was approved. This included possible opportunities for further commercial operations, e.g. bin cleaning, even though there are still problems with waste operator staffing.
- 2. Adopted an Environment Policy, and is seeking 'Investors in the Environment' (iiE) accreditation; it believes that the Council can achieve 'Bronze' status this year, and 'Silver' potentially achievable in 2023.
- 3. A Community Sports Facility Grants Scheme was approved, in order for leisure providers to make improvements to their business. Unfortunately, only those facilities that are regularly open to the community for at least 30 hours per week are eligible, and this precludes many of the leisure facilities in our ward; John Trapp raised this point, and it was agreed that a similar scheme for smaller leisure centres should be considered.
- 4. A report on the progress of the Youth Action Plan was received.

The revised bin collection schedule has come into operation, and there have been a few teething problems which is to be expected. If your bin has not been collected, please contact ECDC, 01353 665555 or online at www.eastcambs.gov.uk. The sooner the new schedule is running well the better.

#### FINANCE & ASSETS COMMITTEE

The main item was to approve the Eligibility Criteria for the CLT Pre-Development Grant Scheme (total £100,000) that was created in the budget for the forthcoming year. This is to fund existing CLTs (there is a separate start-up grant of £5000 for communities to set up a CLT) and bridge the gap between creation and commencement of development. Some members felt that a minimum of five members in a CLT was not sufficient to represent the community, but a motion to increase the membership to at least 4% of the community was defeated, and so a CLT is eligible to bid for this fund even if it has only five members. The other point of contention was in specifying a minimum number of affordable houses in the scheme, and a motion to state a minimum of affordable housing was defeated; the current eligibility criterion is that 'The proposed project must contain an element of affordable housing'. It was also decided that a draft allocations policy should not be compulsory, even though there are many existing examples of allocations policy to use as exemplars as a draft.

In a separate item £543,400 was allocated to much-needed improvements, including refurbishment of the working environment, to the Portley Hill Depot. A further £282,550 was retained in reserve to meet the need to incorporate renewable energy on the site, including EV charging, which is good forward planning.



# Tim the Vinophile Writes

## Bubbles Dahling

Everybody loves to celebrate with fizz! Well not technically true (including yours truly) but it is universally recognised that when there's a celebration it's often accompanied by the pop of a cork. There's something about that sound that brings a smile to people's faces and quite often a shriek of excitement.

This is all thanks to bubbles produced by a second fermentation process. Probably the two best known fizzy wines are Champagne and Prosecco although there are plenty of others including Cava from Spain.

Champagne, aptly named, comes from the Champagne region of northeast France. It's made with Chardonnay, Pinot Noir, and Pinot Meunier grapes. Prosecco originates in the Veneto region of Italy, just north of Venice. It's made from Glera grapes, the use of which for wine can be traced back to the Roman era.

The method of producing bubbles in each of these wines differs. Both wines require two rounds of fermentation—the second round is intended for carbonation, which is the part of the process that differs between Champagne and prosecco.

Champagne requires a traditional method of carbonation in which the wine sparkles while it's bottled. Prosecco, on the other hand, carbonates in stainless steel vats, a less time and money-intensive process.

Taste notes for Champagne include: Citrus fruits, white peach, white cherry, almond, and toast. Flavours for prosecco are sweeter: Green apple, honeydew melon, pear, honeysuckle, and fresh cream

The price points for Champagne and prosecco differ in part because of their methods of production. Because Champagne requires a more hands-on and money-intensive process, it's generally more expensive than prosecco.

# Anglesey Group Mothers' Union

At our March meeting we studied the Mothers' Union theme for the year 'Transformation Now'. Julie Sale began by referring to the examples of change and thinking 'outside the box' that Revd' Sue Giles had spoken about during our Holy Communion Service in January. Moving on to look at the lives if three peoples whose lives were transformed by life experiences. Dame Cicely Saunders, founder of the modern hospice movement. Having suffered from back pain as a nurse, studied to become an almoner (medical social worker). Her involvement with the terminally ill led her to read medicine, and she went on to open the first hospice St. Joseph's, London in 1967.

Ann Langran gave an account of the famous Italian composer Giuseppe Verdi. At the age of 27, after his second opera had been a flop and losing his wife and both infant children to cholera, fell into a time of deep despair. He planned to give up composing altogether. When a producer sent him the text for a proposes new Biblical opera Nabucco, which he threw on the table with disgust. In his own words "The roll of paper opened out; and without knowing quite how, I found myself staring at the page and my eyes fell on the words 'Fly, thought on the golden wings" This gave Verdi a jolt, and he began writing obsessively to compose many of our famous and well-loved operas. Following this we had a time of reflection whilst listening to The Hebrew Slaves Chorus from Nabucco.

Julie concluded with how Archbishop Desmond Tutu's career was transformed. Having wanted a medical career, but unable to afford this he trained to be a teacher. After two years of teaching he resigned, and went to theological college in Johannesburg and was ordained in 1961. He went on to become the first coloured Anglican Bishop of Johannesburg and elected Archbishop of Cape Town in 1986. In turn during his career Desmond Tutu brought about transformation by becoming one of South Africa's most well-known human rights activists, winning the 1984 Nobel Peace Prize for his efforts in resolving and ending apartheid.

Learning of these life changes brought thoughts of those people whom we know personally, or how situations in our own lives that have instigated transformation.

Our meetings are usually held on the third Thursday of each month in Lode Church at 2.30pm. On the 19th May our speaker will be Wendy Lovell: on the topic of 'Coping in the Pandemic'. You are most welcome to come and join us.

## **Public Transport Matters**

I think this is a year for a Staycation holiday. The news at present is not good for people trying to cross the Channel by ferry due to the problems with P and O ferries after so many experienced staff were dismissed and untrained staff taken on in their place. They are failing checks as I write. Many different skills are required. The Channel can be choppy and you have to manoeuvre the ship into port. There are long traffic queues on the motorway approaching Dover and I feel sorry for anyone travelling by coach including the drivers trying to keep passengers comfortable.

Airports too are having problems with staff absences due to Covid.

We live on an island surrounded by sea with good connections by coach or train. Beautiful countryside and historic towns and cities. Hills to climb and sea and lakes to swim in. When I worked in Cambridge and Ely tourist offices we were able to show people brochures containing all the delights available. Sadly the Cambridge office closed partly due to Covid but I think the situation is being considered. Nowadays people can search on the web. Ely office is open.

I enjoyed visiting places by Stagecoach and then I could tell other people about them. Liverpool and its museums is a favourite and the northeastern coast. We wait to learn whether Stagecoach has finally decided which company it is connected with. There are queries about the German connection. Stagecoach East has brought back its 7 days a week city sightseeing tours. It visits 18 stops around the city including University of Cambridge colleges.

Our 11 and 12 buses continue to run usually to time. We are asked still to wear masks to protect ourselves and others. Many drivers have caught Covid. The number of passengers has slightly increased but many people have decided to work from home. School pupils do need to travel to Cambridge and that can be expensive.

In trying to cut staff costs the Transport Secretary is discussing closing ticket offices at train stations but the unions are against it as they say the staff help travellers including those without access to a computer for ticket booking. From next year trains will be run by private companies under Passenger service contracts to replace the franchise service system which collapsed during the pandemic.

The East West rail system has a new chief executive officer called Beth West. She previously worked for Balfour Beatty responsible for civil engineering and building projects.

Alstom has been awarded a contract for replacement of signaling in the Cambridge area - almost 700 items of 40-year-old equipment on 200 km of route. Automatically controlled half barrier crossings including Waterbeach, Dullingham and Six Mile Bottom are being converted to manually controlled barriers with obstacle detection. Improvements are planned for Ely station with a new ticket office, booking hall, ticket gates and waiting room with work stations and charge points.

Arguments about the East West rail link continue. The trains would run on high banks by people's gardens. There will not be a link from HS2 to Wigan. That has now been scrapped.

Train line is under review.

Go Ahead has the Southern and Thameslink rail franchises back. You can now go all the way from Portugal to Singapore by train! Enjoy.







## Thoughts of a Sports Nut

For the second month running, I write this column with a heavy heart as Putin and his Barbarians continue their unspeakable crimes in Ukraine. But, sometimes, out of the darkness of depravity there emerges the light of human compassion and selflessness which restores our faith in humanity among the masses. Two particular, heartwarming stories have caught my eye in the last four weeks.

During my days as a refereeing tutor, I got to know a young, football-mad Ukrainian – a referee and futsal player – whose work in the technology sector brought him and his family to Cambridge. Within three weeks of the Russian invasion of his homeland, he had crowd-funded an ambulance full of medical and logistical supplies, which he then drove across Europe to deliver it personally to a refugee centre in Krakovets, near the Polish border. Whilst in transit, he is on the way to raising another £10k for a second one, and I guess he'll continue until... well, I'm not sure he's thought further ahead than that at the moment.

The other story concerns Edinburgh-based Hibernian FC, or rather, their fan club. Hibs had been drawn away to Dnipropetrovsk in a UEFA Cup tie in 2005 and, while in the town, a group of supporters befriended the staff and children of the local orphanage. They formed a charity, Dnipro Kids, and subsequently continued to support them from afar. When the bombing started, Steven Carr, the charity's chairman, flew to Ukraine, hired a bus, personally collected the 50 children and their carers, and took them by road to Lviv, from where they moved on to Poland before flying to London. They are now in the safety of Edinburgh homes until such time, if ever, their homeland is safe to return to. The power of sport, eh...!

In the light of all that's going on in Eastern Europe, it was especially distasteful for Russia to put in a bid to host the 2028 and 2032 European Football Championship finals. Obviously, that's just a piece of posturing by the gangsters who rule Russia, given that they're currently suspended from international football, but one wonders if the joint UK & Ireland bid for the same (dubious?) privilege is also optimistic, given the Wembley debacle last June! The outcome of the bidding process should be known by the time this Cresset hits your doormats. My money is on Turkey!

Decisions, decisions... The England & Wales Cricket Board have a big one to make in the aftermath of England's awful series defeat in the West Indies. That is: whether Joe Root hangs onto his captaincy for the home Test series against New Zealand or whether he plays under someone else's leadership. The trip to the Caribbean was supposed to herald a new dawn for England following the departure of Chris Silverwood as head coach but, the toothless attack and fragile batting produced only more of the same, culminating in an embarrassing defeat inside three days in the final Test. Despite his prolific run-scoring, Root has now led his side to only one victory in the last 17 matches, but it's difficult to see who, within or without the current squad, could be considered a suitable replacement. In the meantime, England's Director of Cricket, Sir Andrew Strauss, has announced a root-and-branch review of domestic cricket which, presumably, will focus on the critical balance between the county game and limited overs formats... It can't happen soon enough!

In other parts of the world, and in other sports, a row has been rumbling on over whether a transgender woman – that is a man who, by virtue of drugs and possibly surgery, presents himself as a woman, can compete against women in sports designated as female only. Absurd though it sounds, an American person identifying as female Lia Thomas won the US national colleges 500-

yard freestyle, even though he is still physiologically a 6ft 1in man dwarfing the other competitors. The National Collegiate Athletics Association seemed to overlook the fact that, as a man, Thomas was nothing more than a 'middle-order' average competitor, but was massively faster than the best women. As the story gathered momentum, British Cycling made a commonsense decision to prevent transgender Emily Bridges from competing in the Women's National Omnium Championships, but then it emerged that the England Universities' women's football team had controversially selected a 6ft tall transgender goalkeeper after some predictably outstanding performances for Hastings United Women!

"Trans Athletes Face Huge Fight for Equality" screamed the headlines on behalf of 'trans' rights. "What about the rights of women?" retorted the women's rights lobby, in the face of a backlash of 'transphobia' allegations. In an interview on American TV, even Martina Navratilova, a fierce campaigner for LGBTQ+ rights, agreed that transgender women competing against biological women was unfair and she criticised the IOC for not taking a firmer stance on the issue to date. (Remember we've already had a 'trans' weightlifter competing against women in the last Olympics.) Interestingly, Navratilova quoted her transgender friend Renee Richards, the former tennis player, in the interview: "She (Richards) agrees with me... and it would be hard for people to call her transphobic, right?"

Call me old-fashioned, but surely a relevant factor for a man considering a sex-change should be that he relinquishes his aspirations to participate in competitive athletics, unless it's against other similar individuals. Whilst the IOC sits on the fence, deferring decisions on eligibility criteria to individual sports federations, Lord Sebastian Coe, President of World Athletics, laments, "The integrity and future of women's sport, is very fragile if we don't get the regulations right." How difficult can it be, for goodness' sake? The Sports Council's Equality Group, itself, has stated that "testosterone suppression is unlikely to guarantee fairness between transgender women and natal females in gender-affected sports... (due to) retained differences in strength, stamina and physique." It seems to me that a simple genetics test would provide a very manageable solution, with only a double X chromosome securing a place in women's competitions. Otherwise, how long will it be before the majority of world records in women's sport are held by men?!

As my Cresset deadline looms, the two worlds of Women's Football and the movie industry are celebrating the 20th anniversary of the iconic film "Bend It Like Beckham". The effect of this film on female football is virtually immeasurable. It told the story of a British Indian girl who, against the wishes of her Sikh parents, joined a football team and became successful. Although it was a romantic comedy in essence, the film brought together a number of cultural themes which inspired a generation of female footballers. It ranked in the top 10 films of 2002 in India, Australia, South Africa and the USA, grossing \$104 million, and spent 13 weeks in the UK's no.1 spot. Bizarrely, the film was also the first ever Western film to be screened in North Korea! It also precipitated the establishment of professionalism in women's football, culminating in the formation of the FA Women's Super League in 2010. Now, football is the most popular sport among women and girls in the UK, with 3.4 million participants; and the UEFA European Women's Championship Final to be played at Wembley in July is anticipated to be a sell-out. Heady stuff, eh!

## What N∈xt?

Firstly though, I hope you weren't duped by the April JOW article about 'Polar Foil' which is of course an anagram of 'April Fool'. Some may recall a similar wheeze a few years ago on the topic of Post Codes which had quite a few in a tizzy with one industrious reader who saw it as a genuine business opportunity.

"Appeal Dismissed" was the very welcome verdict delivered by the Planning Inspector on Thursday 7th April. This means that the plans for the proposed Retirement Village on the meadow and field at the southern and north eastern end of the High Street respectively will NOT be going ahead. No doubt the Parish Council will put something similar in their article. But the Inspector's Report does raise some issues for the future, mainly for District Council to resolve, but also matters that we as a village should be aware of. It is a warning to us (as a village) and to the District Council to put our respective houses in order. Whilst acknowledging that a new Local Plan (LP) was underway the Inspector was very critical of the East Cambs 2015 Local Plan and implied that it was 'not fit for purpose' especially concerning some policies apropos Housing and Growth. There was a demonstrable need for residential care for the elderly in the area yet there is an absence of a proactive strategy in the development plan to address such need. He was also very critical of the lack of Affordable Homes coming forward and the 'approach' adopted by ECDC when looking for and assessing potential sites for Retirement Care Accommodation.

I mention above that it is a time for the village to 'put its house in order' and by that I mean to reconsider having a 'Neighbourhood Plan' (NP) that clearly delineates where village growth should, and should not be. A NP was embarked upon several years ago by the Parish Council but the apathy from villagers (yes, you and me) meant that it could not be carried through. Another factor for the NP being put on the backburner was the assurance given by the Strategic Development arm of the District Council that Green Belt and Conservation protection status would see off potential development. Well, we now know differently...

However, a NP is not the sole responsibility of Parish Council. The driving force must come from within the community itself as a vast amount of demographic data has to be gathered and analysed before decisions are made and voted on by the village. Only when the village has voted on and approved the plan can it go forward to the District Council for scrutiny to ensure it reflects both Local Authority and National planning policies. When approved, which could be anything from typically 2 to 5 years; potential developers will know precisely where they can and can't build in the village. This will at least give residents some peace of mind but until that day comes you can bet that more predatory proposals will come forward - and this is why the Inspectors implied warning must be taken very seriously.

From a local perspective much weight for the dismissal of the appeal was put on the convincing evidence about the adverse effects on present and future healthcare provision.

However the Inspector judged; "The effect of the proposal on local healthcare provision was not a reason for refusal of the application. The BMP provided evidence of worse outcomes from an academic paper, but those were in relation to care home residents and not therefore directly comparable to the appeal proposal".

On the role of the District Council the Inspector commented that although he had dismissed the appeal; "...this does not reduce the importance I place on the Council's persistent and meaningful under-delivery of affordable homes over the past 10 years. I therefore place substantial positive weight on the proposed affordable housing. The Council indicated that the weight to be applied to the proposed delivery of affordable housing should be tempered by the harm they claim the affordable housing buildings would cause to character and appearance. However, I do not agree with this approach nor the absence of a proactive strategy in the development plan to address such need. The Inspector further commented; "...the LP is out-of-date and in any event says nothing about the specific need for older persons accommodation, extra care or otherwise. At present, there are no retirement care villages in the District. There are no applications, no site allocations, and no predicted completions in the next five years for extra care accommodation".

As for the suitability of Bottisham to host older persons accommodation and affordable housing he agreed with the appellant; "I agree, that the proposal is in an accessible location. Bottisham provides a range of services and facilities, and there would be good access to the town because of its proximity and because there are footpaths directly from the site to the town centre.

So what then actually saved the village from this 'blot on the landscape'? By the skin of our teeth it came down to just two issues: a) the Inspector's primary concern with the robustness of the appellant's Alternative Site Assessment (ASA) model and b) protection given to the permanence of the Green Belt. In other words 'not what it was but where it was'.

In his summing up the Inspector stated; "The submitted ASA is not robust. It has therefore not been adequately demonstrated that the proposal needs to be located in the Green Belt or that it would not be feasible to find a suitable site elsewhere. Additionally he commented; "only 3% of land in the District is Green Belt, and only three villages, including Bottisham, are sited in this Green Belt land. This makes it even more important that a robust ASA is provided to justify the use of Green Belt land. I place the onus for this on the appellant". Moreover; "...there would be harm to the permanence, openness and some of the purposes of Green Belt land. There is also harm, albeit with only a low to moderate weighting, to the character and appearance of the area, the wider landscape, and the heritage assets of Bottisham Conservation Area".

The Inspector concluded his report with this statement; "Overall, the other considerations, although including substantial benefits, also include a deficient ASA, and they do not clearly outweigh the harm to the Green Belt that I have identified, and the other harms. Consequently, the 'very special circumstances' necessary to justify the proposed development do not exist.

Whilst dismissal of the appeal is wonderful news for the village we can be confident that




