District Councillors' Report

HAPPY NEW YEAR! We hope you had a good Christmas, despite the additional Covid restrictions.

On 26 November Councillors were informed by East Cambs Street Scene that they would be cancelling the green waste collection from Monday 13 December to Friday 28 January inclusive because they were short staffed. This announcement came just 11 days after the Operational Services Committee had met and no mention was made of reducing the service, although the problem of staff shortages was well known by then. Councillor Julia Huffer, as Chair of the Committee, decided that it was acceptable for the green waste to be cancelled for this period. To add insult to injury ECSS has described this as an 'efficiency saving' so the Council must continue paying ECSS as if they were providing a full service. The Council then issued a press release claiming that the reduction in service was to support the staff. We certainly agree that the waste staff deserve praise for keeping our collections going throughout Covid restrictions and we do not want them over-worked especially over the Christmas period. But we are concerned that stopping the green waste leaves residents with the problem of disposing of exactly the sort of waste which is most likely to attract rats and other pests and vermin. Suggesting that residents travel up to 44 miles round trip to Witchford to dispose of their green waste is impractical and unsustainable. We have asked Cllr Huffer to explain why she accepted this reduction in service, with no reduction in cost and why she decided green waste was the best collection to cancel. We understand that there is a marked reduction in green waste over the winter, but it is still important that it is kept separate and doesn't go into landfill. In her statement, Cllr Huffer noted "From our last waste analysis, we know that typically 30% of everything we throw away in black sacks is food waste..." It therefore seems very strange that she agreed to remove our option to have our green waste collected separately.

The grant to Citizen's Advice Bureau West Suffolk (CAWS) is to continue for another two years, which is good news for all our residents. We would like to thank those residents who contacted the Council to support CAWS.

The Council was late in publishing its annual accounts, even missing its own revised deadline of 'on or about' 30 November. As we write this article, they have still not been published. When they were presented to the Audit Committee, the auditors gave a verbal update to the Committee as they had not completed their review when the papers were sent out. They reported that the accounts were largely free from material error apart from a £2million error due to incorrect consolidation of the trading companies. We asked for a further meeting so that members could review a corrected set of accounts before approving them, but the Conservative majority decided that it would be sufficient for the Committee Chair to review them. At one point they were ready just to approve the accounts as they were, subject to non-material amendments, until we pointed out that that would prevent them from correcting the £2m error. They tried to deny this, saying £2m was not material but the external auditor confirmed that £2m was indeed material.

Parish Council Report

I must start the New Year with an update on the latest news regarding the Appeal to the Planning Inspectorate against the refusal of planning permission for a Retirement Village to the rear of 163-187 High Street by East Cambs District Council (ECDC). As I indicated last month, the hearing has been set for 25 January. Although not yet confirmed, we believe this will be conducted online.

In deciding how the Parish Council should contribute to the Inquiry, we have liaised closely with the Planning Team at ECDC and concluded that our views as a Council are completely aligned with theirs. In summary, this is that it has not been demonstrated that there are very special circumstances justifying such a development on Green belt. There is already substantial provision for the elderly and planned provision of affordable homes elsewhere in the village. Further, Bottisham Medical Practice services two large care homes in the village, plus a high dependency unit, placing a heavy demand on local GP resources. This development would place a significant and unacceptable extra further strain on medical resources, to the detriment of other residents.

The District Council and the Bottisham Medical Practice will be involved in the Inquiry under "Rule 6". This means that they can be legally represented and will have the power to cross examine witnesses appearing for the appellant. ECDC are engaging an experienced barrister on their behalf - this is not a cheap process!!

Given our alignment with ECDC and the Medical Practice, all have agreed there is nothing to be gained by Parish Council incurring the significant legal costs involved in also appearing under "Rule 6". However Cllr John Wilson and I have both registered our wish to address the Inquiry on behalf of the Council. We believe that the case for rejecting the appeal is strong, but will take nothing for granted in representing the strong opposition registered by so many residents to this development.

I have been involved with the project to secure a new cemetery for the village since we commenced our first discussions in 2012. So I am pleased to report that we have now passed an important milestone on this long journey! Following reaching agreement with the National Trust on a design which we shared with residents at the Open Meeting in October, the Eastern Regional Board of the National Trust has now recommended that the Trust should not oppose compulsory purchase of the land. This recommendation will be considered by their Central Investment Board in January, when we hope to finally get the "go ahead". Albeit the very final "sign-off" by the Trust's Director-General is likely to be subject to our obtaining planning consent. In preparation for the January meeting a surveyor has been engaged to provide an independent valuation of the land, plus we are in the process of engaging a planning consultant to make the planning application to ECDC. Once we obtain planning consent and sign-off by the Director-General, ECDC can finally commence the process of a compulsory purchase. While there are still several stages to go, we believe that the support by the Eastern Region is very important and I am optimistic we may finally be able to commence construction sometime in 2023. Although, as I have discovered many times with this project, suggesting a date is always very speculative - so please don't hold me to it!

As I write, the Government has just introduced the measures required under Plan "B". I sincerely hope that these will be effective in keeping everyone safe.

The Council joins me in sending our best wishes for a happy and healthy New Year!

Bottisham & District Gardening Club

We had an interesting meeting in mid - November when Pippa and Steve Temple gave an interesting talk entitled "Sir Lancelot Brown How capable was he?". It could be said that all his gardens looked the same from Stowe to Chatsworth to Burleigh to Wimpole to Blenheim – a lake, landscaped trees not a straight line anywhere and wide open spaces with clear views from the front of each stately home. He was from a relatively poor back ground but was lucky enough to be supported and cared for by Sir William Moraine after his father died when Lancelot was 3years old. He completed his 6 years as a gardening apprentice on Sir William's estate and then was lucky enough to serve another apprenticeship in engineering specialising in hydrology. He was therefore well capable of re designing Stowe under the leadership of William Kent. His excellent work there led him to introductions to the landed gentry and many important commissions. He was known as a hard worker and employed good people. He is known as England's greatest gardener, friends with royalty, designed 280 gardens and died a wealthy man (in the 1760's he earned an average of £6,000 a year which is more than £1m in today's money). He bought an estate for himself at Fenstanton and became High Sheriff of Cambridgeshire and Huntingdon.

His nickname came from his own comment when reviewing a new garden "What are the Capabilities?"

Our Christmas meeting held in December was a social event with wine, refreshments, quizzes and a competition for a Christmas table decoration.

Act to Ensure Your Travel Needs are met in the Future

If you travel into Cambridge for work or leisure, your journey over the coming years will change dramatically. As I explain below, the days of using your motor car to get into central Cambridge are numbered. We are all going to be encouraged (some may say.. prised) out of our cars and on to different modes of public transport – bus, cycling, walking - if we want to access significant parts of Cambridge. This article tells you how you can ensure your voice is heard as the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) and Combined Authority, the government bodies charged with leading the transformation of public transport in this area, make decisions which affect you and me.

WHY IS THIS HAPPENING?

- 1. The population of the Greater Cambridge area is expected to grow by 28% 33,500 new homes and 44,000 new jobs are planned*
- 2. If everyone continued to travel as they do now, 26,000 extra daily car journeys could be added to our already congested roads*
- 3. To ensure the region can cope with the growth and meet the reality of the Climate Emergency, the GCP have calculated that traffic needs to be reduced by 20 25% on 2019 levels*

WHAT ARE THE COMBINED AUTHORITY AND GCP'S AIMS?

The aims are to create a more joined-up public transport system to ensure that journey times are better than they would be by car, that road space is better utilised, increasing the number of "sustainable public transport vehicles" on the road network as well as creating better environments for people to cycle, walk or just spend time enjoying public spaces. To achieve this, the GCP are exploring options including:

- 1. Increased car parking charges both at city centre car parks and at workplaces
- 2. Charging private vehicles to drive into parts of Cambridge
- 3. Charging vehicles to drive in particular areas unless they meet particular emissions criteria. The revenue raised from these options, if adopted, will fund a greatly enhanced bus network offering more frequent buses in all areas including rural areas, better connections, more direct services to areas of employment, faster journey times and lower fares.

WHAT DOES THE A TO B 1102 GROUP THINK?

- 1. We welcome this consultation and the proposal to dramatically increase public transport especially to rural communities, however
- 2. We believe the GCP should work in closer partnership with the communities, like ours, who need to access Cambridge to develop attractive alternative modes of transport that encourage car drivers to change their mode of transport
- 3. It is more difficult for people who live outside Cambridge to access the City by public transport If the city does not meet our needs, we will work and shop elsewhere to the future detriment of Cambridge!
- 4. We are concerned that the proposed new bus routes which form the basis for this consultation are not based on current reliable data which maps the current journey patterns of commuters and leisure travellers and we are lobbying the GCP to address this point before any final decisions are made
- 5. Whilst commuting patterns are still in a level of "flux" post the Covid Pandemic, it is vital that future bus routes operate in a way that meets the needs of commuters, in particular otherwise, people will fail to make the shift from car to public transport
- 6. As it becomes more difficult to get into Cambridge as routes are re-prioritised for bus, walking & cycling, motorists will find ever more inventive ways of getting around the blockages, traffic speeds will further decrease leading to more and more congestion beyond the City, for example, at intersections like Stow-cum-Quy
- 7. We believe that fast "express" bus routes need to be created with mini park & ride sites in villages enabling an express bus to make only one stop in each of the key villages, thus enabling fast journey times for commuters to travel hubs which offer connections to different parts of the City without all services going into central Cambridge. The proposals by GCP meet some of these ideas, which we welcome.
- 8. In relation to the proposed changes to our current bus services along the B1102 corridor, we want to know how residents of Stow-cum-Quy will access bus services and how our communities will access the Science Park area surely it would make more sense for an orbital bus route around Cambridge that went from Cherry Hinton to the Newmarket Road Park & Ride site (where it intersected with the service through our villages) and then on to the Science Park area, Milton and beyond?
- 9. Finally, we would like to establish why Dullingham Station is missing from the map and more information on how these proposed services enable our College Students to access Hills Road, Long Road Sixth Form and the Regional College with greater ease than they do at present.

This is an important first step to addressing a reality none of us can continue to ignore and we hope the Mayor, the Combined Authority and the GCP will continue to expand their engagement with us, the rural communities that need to access Cambridge day by day.





Anglesey Group Mothers' Union

On the 18 November Jean Webb, Ely Diocese Mothers' Union, Trustee, and Faith in Action, Task Group Co-ordinator spoke to us about her role and current Faith in Action projects. Jean has held her role as a Trustee for three years and will continue to do so for the next triennium.

Jean spoke about the Away From It All (AFIA), Mothers' Union holiday scheme, primarily funded by our members. It gives the opportunity of a break to those who may be experiencing stress or difficulties in their family life and it continued to go ahead (when restrictions allowed) during the pandemic. The number of families that MU funded for a holiday at Searles Caravan Park in Hunstanton had been somewhat less because of this. The families who had benefitted very much appreciated their holiday.

Each child is given a purse with pocket money to spend, and Jean encouraged members to look out for purses in charity shops or on stalls usually for the price of a few pence. How difficult it had been for the organisations that MU supports during the Covid pandemic lockdowns. Members throughout the Diocese were very productive with knitting and creating during lockdown and the number of knitted 'traffic light bonnets' for premature babies has been overwhelming. To the extent that local hospitals are unable to accept any more until current stocks have been used.

Sadly, involvement with Littlehey Prison had to be suspended due to covid restrictions, but hopefully this will be able to resume in some form in the not-too-distant future.

Jean then went through a table of items she had brought with her, including mixing bowl filled with essential kitchen and baking items, and little bags filled with essential toiletries. Many clients at the refuges and hostels arrive with no personal possessions. A newly introduced knitted item Jean has been working on is the Dementia Canula Sleeve for patients that have a canula in situ. Once on the arm it prevents the patient from pulling on the canula. The sleeve is knitted in a similar way to a 'Twiddle Muff', and decorated likewise with small knitted items and varying textures. Jean concluded her talk by clarifying how important and essential all these items are in making the recipients' lives that little bit easier. Donations for these organisations are acceptable throughout the whole year not only for the Christmas appeals!

Copies of our programme for January to June are now available in all five parish churches and the programme begins with our New Year Communion Service on Thursday 20th January in Lode Church at 2.30pm. This will be led by Rev'd Sue Giles. You are most welcome to join us.

A Hearing Loop for Holy Trinity Church Bottisham

Those of us who live in Bottisham are very privileged in that we have in our village a beautiful Grade 1 listed church, parts of which were built over 800 years ago.

Whilst most do not regularly worship there, many make use of the church for weddings or funerals, or to attend special services at Christmas, Easter or Remembrance Sunday. Our schools also often use it for special services or carol concerts.

The existing sound system was painstakingly hand built by a member of the congregation some 60 years ago. It has served us well but has become unreliable and is considered inadequate for the effective addition of a hearing loop which is now a requirement under the Equality Act (Formerly the Disability Discrimination Act). The Parochial Church Council (PCC) have decided to pursue the installation of a new hearing loop, but the provision of a new sound system to support this has hugely increased the cost. This will greatly enhance the quality of the sound particularly for those with hearing aids.

The best quotation we have is £14,000 for this work to be done. We receive no financial support from the Diocese or other Church of England sources and so we need to raise a significant proportion of this for the work to proceed.

A real labour of love. He must have had a very understanding wife especially as he painted in stages ie not one room at a time.

Public Transport Matters

Many articles and talks on the radio with local politicians regarding how to promote convenient local transport and how to improve the climate. The budget statement gave the green light for new electric buses. Cambridge city is to get 30 new zero emission buses with a more than 4 million pounds grant award. This is ZEBRA - zero emissions buses regional area. There was a meeting of local councillors and the Department of Transport. They want to get people out of their cars and on to public transport. They also want to improve the problem of congestion along Newmarket Road. There is a campaign group 'AtoB1102' that wants better public transport for people in the eastern villages from Quy, through to Bottisham, Swaffham Bulbeck and Prior, Burwell and Fordham. The question is whether traffic priorities for Newmarket Road will cause problems for the villages if there are more buses not just the hourly ones.

Rail is much more in the news. By the time you read this there should have been the ceremonial opening of Soham railway station on December 13th.

There are other stations reopening that were closed by Dr Beeching particularly in the North and Midlands. Northern leaders say they will pay towards this. 



Thoughts of a Sports Nut

HAPPY NEW YEAR EVERYBODY; welcome to 2022, a year in which I have promised to do my best to find some happier yarns to spin! Given the ongoing events at the time of writing, this is proving to be something of a challenge... my beloved Ipswich Town is sliding back towards mediocrity down in League One, England were predictably trounced by Australia in the First Ashes Test, and we are all wondering if the government will survive its latest PR disaster! However, a promise is a promise, so I'll do my best to put smiles on your faces, even if it's only sardonic ones!

I was delighted to see that Gareth Southgate has been rewarded for his achievements as England football manager with an extended contract to December 2024, which will take in the World Cup 2022 and the Euros 2024. He will continue to be accompanied by his assistant, Steve Holland, something of an unsung hero in the camp, and I hope he will garner more recognition in future if the team challenges again for the top honours. We all have our opinions on team selection, tactics, etc, and often feel that Southgate & Holland are over-cautious or resistant to change, but the statistics don't lie: third in the 2020 European Nations League, semi-finalists in the 2018 World Cup and finalists in the 2021 European Championship...this is progress, folks! It doesn't come cheaply though... Southgate is now on £5million a year. I wonder what the FA will consider a fair price if he actually wins anything!

My only issue with all these competitions is the number of almost meaningless matches. You may have noticed England men's recent 10-0 win in San Marino and the Lionesses' 20-0 victory over Latvia in qualifying games. Who benefits from this? Would not the 'minnows' of world football (in both genders) enjoy a more valuable experience by competing in a group or groups of their own, where the winners would progress to the main tournament? The likes of San Marino, Andorra, Faroe Isles, Lichtenstein, Gibraltar, for instance – not forgetting their long-suffering supporters – would surely rather have competitive matches with a tangible prize at the end than be used as target practice for the 'big guns'!

A couple of interesting examples of footballers' generosity came to my attention just before Christmas. Firstly, the Serbian national team scored a remarkable victory over Portugal in their final qualifying match to secure their place at 2022 World Cup Finals, and they were given a million Euros by their government as a reward. The team immediately donated the money to a charity responsible for the treatment of sick children. Bravo Serbia! Then Ipswich Town announced cut price tickets for home matches over the Christmas period (ok, ok, you could argue that they're not worth full price at the moment!), but a supporters' group, working with a local charity, extended the campaign to actually buy tickets for struggling families. They raised £12,500 in less than a week... hats off to them!

Talking of money, there was great news for Azeem Rafiq in November when Lord Patel, the new Yorkshire County Cricket Club chairman, delivered a £200,000 settlement to the former player, together with an official apology for the club's racist past and thanks for Rafiq's whistleblowing exploits which, among other things, has left Yorkshire in tatters with an £18 million debt! It's interesting to note that the Yorkshire investigation upheld only seven of Rafiq's 43 allegations of racism and bullying... how large might that settlement have been with a higher

strike-rate? I don't suppose the inconvenient discovery that Rafiq himself had used anti-Semitic language on social media 10 years ago helped either.

Former government 'Homeless Tsar', Baroness Casey of Blackstock, duly published a well-balanced report of her findings from the enquiry into events surrounding the Euro 2020 Final at Wembley. Anyone interested can find all 128 pages of the Review on TheFA.com website. Obviously, there is plenty of criticism of the various stakeholders of the event and the Baroness concludes that the various, unique contributory factors (such as relaxing of Covid restrictions and England's participation!) created the "perfect storm" at the final. It seems that all the relevant authorities, not least the Metropolitan Police Service, underestimated the risk of trouble, but it completely escapes me as to how any of them thought that an 8.00pm kick off was a good idea on a day when pubs, supermarkets and and drug dealers opened for business first thing in the morning! As a spokesman for the MPS observed, in a breathtaking example of understatement, "additional resources from earlier in the day would have been desirable".

Much as I welcomed the review and the report, I must say I found the outcome a little anodyne. You could sum up the Casey recommendations in terms of better organisation, better communication, stronger action against offenders and a charge to The FA to campaign for "a seachange in attitudes towards supporter behaviours". I'm not even sure what that means, and Mark Bullingham, The FA's CEO, received the conclusions with such a predictable statement of "apologies", "moving forwards" and "lessons learned" I wondered if he was equally mystified! He even went on to talk about future major international events, but I think he can forget about Euros or World Cups for a while, don't you?!

I can't say that motor racing is my favourite sport but I must recognise that the 2021 Formula 1 season produced one of the most dramatic and exciting battles in living memory. A thrilling finale was anticipated in Abu Dhabi in December, with Max Verstappen and Lewis Hamilton level on points in the drivers' championship, after a roller-coaster year of thrills, spills and wars of words. Hamilton, already a seven-time world champion, versus Max Verstappen, the ambitious young Dutch pretender, and remember, Verstappen had been 32 points ahead of Hamilton before the Silverstone Grand Prix in July! So, the scene was set, but nobody could have imagined the drama that would unfold on the last lap at the Yas Marina Circuit! Verstappen effectively benefitted from a 12 second 'gift' after a safety car was deployed with Hamilton leading by 11 seconds and the 23-year-old Dutchman stormed through on fresher tyres to clinch his first world title.

There followed a tense wait for the result to be ratified by the FIA following a double protest from Hamilton's Mercedes team based on the implementation of the safety care rules, which — difficult though they are to understand — seem to have been 'bent', presumably on the basis that this was a world championship decider. Those who know a lot more than me (not difficult!) feel that any other race would have finished behind the safety car with Hamilton in the lead! Anyway, the FIA rejected Mercedes' appeals, duly allowing Verstappen to celebrate his triumph a second time. I would in no way dispute his right to be crowned world champion but firstly, I doubt he would have wanted to secure it in such controversial circumstances, and secondly, where does this leave the FIA's credibility? One wonders if the matter might still end up in the court room, and that cannot be good for anybody except the lawyers!

FATHER WHO ...?

The 'jolly' old man who sneaks into our houses every 24 December is beloved across the world and known by many names – some well-known others not so. But should we call him Father Christmas or Santa Claus? What's the difference? Where did he come from? Is he a Christian saint or a corporate stooge?

I pose these questions because wherever I went over the Christmas period I kept seeing or hearing references to Santa or Santa Claus. Who is this Santa person? On examination I find that Santa is yet another import, primarily from America, that is having an unwanted and an unnecessary impact on British folklore. Probably like you, I was brought up to call this mystical figure 'Father Christmas', as were our children and now their children. But I've become aware of late that folk are increasingly referring to this merry 'jolly' old gentleman as Santa Claus. What's more, when I looked at the display of Christmas Cards and Advent Calendars on offer, Father Christmas – let alone the nativity - hardly got a mention. Is this because we now see Christmas simply as a seasonal binge pandering to commerce, or another case of British traditions being dumbed down and possibly lost?

A couple of years ago the National Trust insisted that "Father Christmas" was used in its hundreds of stately homes and historic buildings because the name is synonymous with British culture. And for many in Britain he is also the personification of Christmas itself. "Santa Claus" on the other hand originates from the Dutch who sent settlers the US. They created a town called New Amsterdam which we now know as New York. Overtime their Santa has increasingly usurped the more traditional British "Father Christmas". Etiquette experts though back the NT's stand against Santa Claus. They describe the character as an Americanism and that British 'people' tend to prefer the less commercialised "Father Christmas". Yes, what goes on in America should 'jolly' well stay in America is what I say, and this doesn't just apply to Santa Claus...

But regardless of your preference or social standing the mythical figure is widely known for spreading Christmas cheer. As we all know – or do we – the first recorded date of Christmas being celebrated on December 25th was in 336, during the time of the first Christian Roman Emperor Constantine. Christmas is a derivative of Christ's Mass originating in Victorian England which is a religious festival celebrating the birth of Jesus and the term Christmas or "mass on Christ's day" is of fairly recent origin.

Father Christmas and Santa Claus could be considered distant cousins as they both find their roots drawn from the real-life Saint Nicholas of Myra, who lived during the 4th century. Father Christmas first appeared during the ancient British mid-winter festivals but at the time he was not called Father Christmas. He was known as a pagan figure that was the bringer of spring. Then while under Saxon rule, this pagan figure morphed into King Frost - well known for visiting people's homes during the holidays and if people were nice to him, it was believed that he would give them a present in return. Father Christmas as depicted in the 17th century, sported a beard, but it wasn't white, and his clothing colour was green, not red. And we can thank Scandinavian

myths for his reindeer pulled sled. His elves have a Germanic and distinctly devilish background but the mince pies, milk and sherry we leave out for Father Christmas have an even more ancient origin. Such offerings are reminiscent of sacrifices to pagan gods that long pre-date Christianity and there are some disturbing variations which I will not venture into.

Americans believe that Santa Claus can be found in the North Pole which considering it consists of constantly shifting frozen ice, is just a bit unlikely. The British and European traditions are more credible, and believe Father Christmas' workshop or grotto is in Finland, in an area called Lapland. But if our Father Christmas really wanted to be precise and come the night before the birth of Christ, he'd be popping down our chimneys sometime in September. So why does he come on the 24 December? Well, the reason we celebrate Christmas Day on 25 December is because Pope Julius I in the fourth century AD said so. He wanted to popularise Christianity and so appropriated existing pagan practises. This is perhaps why early representations of Father Christmas saw him dressed in green, representing the green shoots of spring in the depths of winter

And so combined with Christmas traditions of the past, Father Christmas or Father Noel was born. The earliest evidence for a personified Christmas can be found in a 15th-century English carol, in which a character called 'Sir Christëmas' shares the news of Christ's birth. He tells his audience to 'Make good cheer and be right merry. But this version of a Father Christmas was not associated with distributing gifts to children, but instead was believed to deliver the Christmas Spirit and encourage those adults around him to eat, drink and be merry. To conquer the English imagination the Victorians needed more from him - he was to be 'jolly' and dedicated to children and be associated with family comforts and safekeeping. He therefore needed to assume a more family orientated name and so 'Father Christmas' he became. As for Santa or Santa Claus, well like most things American - and judging from today's advertising and TV commercials - Santa has become synonymous with promotion and selling which to my mind makes him a corporate stooge. Whatever we call him the Father Christmas we all know and love today is well known for traveling around in his sleigh powered by 8 reindeer while carrying gifts for all the good little girls and boys around the world, and long may it continue to be so...,

"Have a very Happy and Prosperous New Year wherever you may be and whoever you may be with. I hope your 'Father Christmas' was kind and generous in whatever he bestowed..."

A major part of the work I do for EAAA is the siting of red collection boxes, their collection when full and their replacement. In response to messages from the office, and calls from publicans and retailers, I cover an increasingly wide area to do this and never cease to be impressed by the generosity I find stuffed into these boxes. Once again, and no apologies, a HUGE New Year thank you one and all for supporting such a worthwhile cause. Keep filling the boxes - please!

During the first three months plus of providing 24/7 cover by air and road -30/6 to 18/10 (2021) - crews were tasked 307 times between 7pm and 7am, averaging nearly three missions a night. During this period, 87 of the taskings were by helicopter and 220 by rapid response vehicle - justification, were any to be needed, for 'closing the nightime gap'. These extra missions, across all four counties and beyond, have been to a range of emergencies including accidental injuries, cardiac arrests, road traffic collisions, medical emergencies and assaults. After many years in the planning, it is gratifying to know that EAAA is providing the same level of service, no matter what time of day or night, over the whole area.

Soon, our helicopters will be looking a bit different! Babcock, our aviation partner, will be upgrading both aircraft by fitting new D3 five blade rotor heads. Anglia One's helicopter, G-RESU, is planned (as of early December) to be the first Airbus H145 in the UK to fly with this upgrade, followed by Anglia Two's G-HEMC. The new five blade rotor head will:

- Significantly reduce vibration in the cabin, ensuring a much smoother flight and better experience for both crews and patients.
- Allow the clinicians to perform more vital procedures in flight, thereby ensuring patients receive advanced treatment even quicker.
- Enable the aircraft to carry more fuel and equipment, helping crews to stay on station longer before needing to refuel or restock.

Coverage will not be disrupted during the refits as a stand-in helicopter, G-EMSS, will continue the vital life-saving work.


