Parish Council Report

As I write this the Council looks ahead to a busy next week, with the start of the retirement village planning appeal and the community safety forum (the latter planned long before we had the appeal date) landing on the same day!! I will be reporting on the outcome of the appeal and the Forum in my next Notes.

Now to the central matter I wish to discuss - BUSES

PLEASE FILL IN THE BUS SURVEY!

The AtoB 1102 group (www.atob1102.org) is a cross-Parish body co-ordinating efforts to influence the development of our bus services, in liaison with our County/District Councils and the Mayor. It is the Mayor who holds final responsibility for our bus services.

While the No.12 bus is a completely commercial service (and should remain largely unchanged), the No.11 is subsidised by the Mayor and the contracts for any further subsidised services are up for renewal end March. So we are approaching a critical point, as decisions are made about future funding of services.

I am confident that the No.11 will continue. But the vexatious issue of the connection between Bottisham and the surrounding villages has yet to be resolved. A potential solution is to return to the routing of some/all No.11 buses via Bottisham - albeit this has implications for the many who have welcomed the faster direct service into Cambridge. Another alternative that has been mooted, is a completely new route connecting the B1102 villages to Addenbrookes via Bottisham, the Wilbrahams and Fulbourn. This might provide a better solution for all, if we can demonstrate there will be demand to fill the bus.

In order to help us guide the Mayor in developing an optimal service, there is a need to generate good quality data as to the genuine travel needs of residents. To that end, the B1102 group has instituted a resident's survey across the local villages. An online version can be accessed at:

A hard copy version is also available in the COOP, Bottisham Medical Practice and Holy Trinity Church - where there are also boxes to post your responses. Please could we have all responses back by 24th November, to give the group time to analyse the results to present to the Mayor.

Could I please ask that all our readers fill in the survey - whether you are a current bus user or just a potential user? Our objective is to see a service developed that will encourage us all to use the buses more - to help reduce congestion and our carbon footprint.

BROADBAND INSTALLATION

The Parish Council has been inundated with complaints about recent roadworks to install full fibre broadband. These have included complaints about lack of warning about roadworks and failures to "make good".

Unfortunately the Parish Council has no authority over activities on the public highways

and, contrary to rumour, receives no income from the works being carried out. However we have, in concert with our County Councillor, had numerous communications with the company over the matter. The company does provide the Parish Council with a list of planned roadworks that we place on our web-site but, of course, few see these. It also insists the contractor is instructed to deliver paper warnings to residents, but residents complain they have not seen them. There is not much more we can do but hope that our communications have improved matters somewhat.

As I travel around the countryside, I see evidence of similar activity in many villages and towns - so we are not alone!! One must hope all the aggravation will have been worth it in due course! The bad news is that the company expects to be continuing installations in Bottisham until after Christmas. The good news is that contractors are required to "make good" within 6 months and we have up to 2 years subsequent to completion to complain and request things are "made good". So please pursue the company if you feel things have not been left in a satisfactory condition.

District Councillors' Report

We were saddened to hear that James Fitch had passed away. James was County Councillor and District Councillor for many years for the Bottisham ward villages. He loved these villages and worked with and for the residents. One of his longest campaigns was to get safe cycle routes, so he was delighted when the Lode to Quy cycle path opened and looked forward to seeing the path from Burwell to Exning open. He knocked on Charlotte's door the day she moved in to Reach to welcome her and her husband to the area and introduce himself as their local Councillor – they were very impressed! They soon realised that he was regularly out and about talking with residents and helping to get things done. More recently, he has given us advice and support and shared his long knowledge of the area with us. Like many people, we shall miss James greatly.

Everyone should have received their black bin bags by the end of October. If you haven't received yours, please let one of us know, and we will make sure they are delivered.

After years of refusing to answer questions about the finances and management of its trading companies, and a demand this February for an extra £500,000 in fees for the year to 31 March, the Council has finally admitted significant problems with ECSS and initiated major reforms. The Chief Executive, who is also the Managing Director of ECSS, published a report triggered by a review instigated by the Audit Committee, following a proposal from Charlotte. There had been a clear indication of one of the major weaknesses when the Council's Observer at ECSS Board meetings, Cllr J Huffer, was asked how frequently she received and reviewed Management Accounts for ECSS and she admitted that "ECSS Board last reviewed the management accounts on 31 January 2023. Prior to this, as it is essentially on operational budget, the Board did not receive management accounts, instead it discussed and approved the annual statutory accounts". Regular review of Management Accounts is a key control of an organisation's finances. The Audit Committee will be reviewing the report in more detail and Charlotte will be pressing for a thorough and independent review of governance at ECSS and ECTC (which shares many of the same governance procedures as ECSS).

The Greater Cambridge Partnership has dropped its plans to charge people driving into and around Cambridge. We are working with colleagues to ensure that we get the muchneeded public transport improvements for our area. This will require significant and sustained investment from central government, not just a one-off £2.3m. We were interested to see that the idea of a congestion charge in Cambridge goes back to 1990 when the Conservative County Council adopted 'demand management by road pricing'. This was firmed up by the Conservatives in 2009 with bids to Government for £500m funding to implement a congestion charge on very similar borders to the GCP's proposal, and deliver improvements to public transport, cycle paths etc. The Government funding stream was closed in 2010, and without the funding the County Council paused the scheme.

We had an interesting talk in September by Barry Carter from the Cambridgeshire Search and Rescue team (CamSAR). This is a lowland rescue volunteer group and compares with the better - known mountain rescue services, the coastguard and the RNLI. They are a specialist search term called on by the police for the search for high risk, vulnerable missing people, a child, an elderly person living with dementia, or even someone considering taking their own life. Each member is trained and examined to national standards and procedures and continues training throughout their service. They could be called upon if there is a local disaster (plane crash), power outage or flood warnings. Louise, a trained dog handler brought her dog Pip who is regularly called upon (there is an average of 60 callouts a year day and night) to join in the searches and is a valuable member of the service. A very worthwhile charity which has won the Queen's Award for voluntary Service.

We shall be collecting gifts again this year for the Salvation Army Christmas Appeal toys suitable for children, toiletries for single mums or children just out of care can be brought to our November meeting.

Next meeting is on Tuesday 21st November when Pat Howard our Chairman will show how us how to make Christmas cards.





At our September meeting, Wendy Bowen (wife of Revd Roger Bowen) gave us a talk on 'The Transformation of women's lives at the Jungle Doctor Hospital in Tanzania'

We began by looking at a modern map of Tanzania, highlighting Bunda in the north, where a girls' boarding school and safe house are built and supported by funds raised by the Anglesey Group of Parishes.

One hundred and sixty years ago missionary work began in Tanzania. The famous physician, explorer and missionary David Livingston (1813-1873) being one of the first. East Africa was divided into British and German spheres of influence by the Anglo-German agreement of 1886. British East Africa (now Kenya) came under the formal control of the British government in 1895, while immediately to the south lay German East Africa (now Tanzania). Germany not wanting Zanzibar or Uganda negotiated with Britain to acquire Heligoland and Britain take over Uganda and Zanzibar.

Soon after this the Anglican Church Mission Society (CMS) prioritised for conversion of Uganda. Not looking at the map realistically they thought the distance from Zanzibar to Uganda could be travelled by oxen and bullock carts. This turned out to be impossible due to the tsetse fly causing fatal harm to oxen. Arab slave traders from the middle east took a route from Dar es Salam, which the missionaries decided to use. Progress was very slow and their efforts ceased at Mpwapwa 108 km. from Dodoma (the current day capital of Tanzania).

We then looked at a 1930's map drawn in 1940, showing the railway from Dar es Salaam to Kigoma built by the Germans. Wendy drew our attention to the small town of Mvumi, 38 km from Dodoma. As the area became evangelised by the missionaries, a boarding school for girls and Jungle Hospital were built in Mvumi, and a small Cathedral in Dodoma. The hospital mainly dealing with maternity



and gynaecology needs. In 1960 Wendy and Roger came to live in the small village of Mvumi whilst at the Theological College. As a young girl Wendy had read many of the Jungle Doctor books written by Paul White. An Australian, Christian Missionary who established the hospital in Mvumi. Little did Wendy know when reading the books that she would actually give birth to her youngest son at the Jungle Hospital in 1969.

Girls were subjected to many harms, including disease, forced into marriage by their uncles, slavery, death in childbirth. Females were highly valued with wealth being valued in cattle. The uncles (not the father) of a female being given a cow when she married. Today it is not allowed to be valued in cattle. Boarding school is the best way of protecting

girls from being abducted whilst travelling to and from school.

Wendy re-told an experience she encountered in 1965 that she will never forget. Living in a very rural area, with mainly none Christians living in the bush. One very dark African night 'Black as velvet', huge clouds, no stars or moon she woke to loud shouting and on looking out a young man was shouting "wake your husband and come to our home we need a hospital". She and Roger quickly responded and got in the car, and with the young man running ahead they made their way along very dark rural tracks. Eventually in the headlights they could see a very poor little house, with two figures standing outside. The headlights soon revealed a young woman of 16 her face in utter shock and dressed in sacking. Behind was an older woman clutching something in her arms. It was soon revealed the woman was clutching twin babies. In none Christian Africa when a woman gave birth to twins it was assumed the mother had been unfaithful, and her husband was not the father. Unless mothers were rescued the babies and in many cases their mother were killed. Roger and Wendy took the young mother and her twins to a place of safety at the Mission Hospital. Unfortunately, Wendy never knew what happened to them after. Those first missionaries got their priorities right by providing safety for girls and women, which has resulted in saving the lives of thousands of African females.

Our branch meetings usually take place on the third Thursday afternoon of each month in Fassage Hall, Lode at 2.30pm. At our next meeting on Thursday16th November we will be looking at the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Based Violence, campaign which the Mothers' Union supports. East Anglian Air Ambulance



Last month's article set out who East Anglian Air Ambulance (EAAA) is and that the charity provides life-saving critical care 24 hours-a-day, 365 days-a-year by air and road. This could be road traffic collisions and farm accidents, falls, strokes or cardiac arrests.

Having been tasked, by rapid response vehicle (RRV) or helicopter, the charity's specialist doctors, critical care paramedics and pilots bring the advanced skills, equipment and medicine directly to scene, in the fastest time possible. Patients are then often transferred to the most appropriate hospital to continue the process.

However, that's not the end of the journey for the patient and their family - far from it. Aftercare is and has become an important part of the support offered by EAAA. Understanding what happened during their pre-hospital treatment (and why) can be a huge step towards a positive recovery for patients. In 2022-23, EAAA's Aftercare service connected with over 450 people to offer practical and emotional support following a medical emergency.

Earlier this year, a patient who suffered a cardiac arrest in Cambridgeshire received early CPR and defibrillation from bystanders. The patient was transferred to hospital and made a good recovery thanks to this early bystander intervention. The patient and the bystanders then reconnected with EAAA through the Aftercare service, and, to 'square the circle,' a base visit was organised for them. I was able to attend this visit to go behind the scenes to see for myself some of the support offered by the charity.

From meeting the crew who attended, to understanding medical interventions that were carried out at scene, and some of the equipment used, I could see just how valuable this process was to everyone involved in the 'chain of survival' on the day. They all appreciated how comprehensive the whole EAAA process is in helping them to see the whole picture.

EAAA covers Norfolk, Suffolk, Cambridgeshire and Bedfordshire 24/7 thanks to the continued support of the public. When you see, or perhaps just hear, an EAAA helicopter overfly your area or see one of the RRVs, this is potentially just the beginning of a journey for someone, so please do get in touch if you can help. Whether you volunteer, or play the weekly lottery, give a one-off or regular donation or even a bequest in your will, EAAA is OUR charity, there for everyone's potential benefit. **Together we save lives.**

News from Wicken Fen Nature Reserve

Earlier this year, the National Trust acquired an additional 15 acres (6.07 hectares) of arable land adjacent to the 24 Acres at Reach but separated from it by an Internal Drainage Board (IDB) ditch. The new land provides further opportunities for the National Trust to achieve their objectives of enhancing the habitats for the benefit of wildlife and providing access to nature for people.

One priority opportunity relates to Turtle Doves which historically used to be a regular summer presence locally. Unfortunately, British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) records show that the breeding farmland index list of birds have declined by more than 55% in the past 50 years, with loss of habitat a significant contributing factor. Turtle Dove, one of Britain's most iconic species, is now listed as globally threatened and is the UK's fastest declining species, with its breeding population falling by 99%.

Discussions with RSPB's Operation Turtle Dove (a national program set up to target habitat creation for the recovery of the species), identified the two plots of land as a suitable location to assist this species. To facilitate this recovery, the National Trust secured a Species Recovery grant from Natural England (NE). The grant will fund the creation of four UK Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP) Priority Habitats, allowing us to plant 635m of hedgerow, to establish wide arable field margins, lowland meadow and to create ponds. A wild bird crop will also be sown in the remaining arable area and a crossing point will be installed across the IDB ditch to join the two compartments via a permissive footpath from 24 Acres to Hightown Drove, providing an alternative green route between Burwell and Reach and offering greater access to nature for local communities. We're excited to be able to share this news and will keep you updated on progress.

Bottisham Bird Brain

After last month's Starlings, I thought I would tackle another common, urban bird that we find sociable, confident, busy but relatively relaxed... the Jackdaw.

A member of the Corvidae family (Crows), 'Corvus monedula' is smaller than the Rook or Carrion Crow and is much more likely to frequent your garden and your roofs, probably in social or family groups. They are easily distinguished from their all-black relatives by a silvery-grey back of the head and nape, and noticeably pale eyes. Jackdaws are omnivorous, like most Corvids, eating all sorts



of insects, worms, fruit, seeds, scraps and even eggs and young birds, but they will dominate your garden feeders if you let them! One way of harmlessly discouraging them is to use the spring-loaded feeders where the perch drops to shut-off the supply of seeds when a heavier bird alights on it.

Remember I mentioned onomatopoeic bird names a few months ago...? Well, the Jackdaw's name comes from its harsh call, emitted when alarmed or excited: "tchack, tchack". But its taxonomical name, 'monedula', is even more interesting because it underlines Jackdaws' penchant for picking up shiny objects: it comes from the same Latin stem, 'moneta', as money or coin. How about that?!

Jackdaws are pretty successful; widespread throughout the UK (over 1.5 million pairs), except the Scottish Highlands where there are fewer easy pickings, and you'll find them in fields, woods and parkland as well as in urban areas. Around this time of year, they'll often be joining up with their larger relatives to roost together for the winter. They'll nest in various holes or crevices and will certainly make use of unused chimneys if they're unprotected. A few years ago, Mrs Bird Brain and I were constantly picking up sticks from our ornamental fireplace, dropped by the Jackdaws nesting above. The birds were obviously having to constantly repair their home as the disturbance from their comings and goings persistently dislodged the foundations. And, when we finally called the chimney sweep (after the breeding season), Mr Bristley collected two huge sacks full of twigs and various debris, after which we hurriedly installed a cowl!

The more superstitious among you might be interested to hear of the Jackdaw's presence in different pieces of folklore (perhaps depending on your particular brand of superstition). Seeing a Jackdaw en route to a Fenland wedding was considered a good omen, but if it landed on your roof, then it could be a portent of either a birth or a death. The ancient Greeks apparently believed that all Corvids were white, until Apollo turned them black as a punishment for them telling him of his wife's infidelity. Then, in early Christian legend, the crow family all took black plumage in mourning after the crucifixion. (There's a caveat in the legend regarding the closely-related Magpie – which is black and white – but you'll have to wait for the Magpie page at a later date!)

It seems that man has found meaning in Jackdaw behaviour more readily than with other birds and this may be due to, not just the relative intelligence of crows generally, but to the Jackdaw's liking for eye contact. Furthermore, research (conducted in Cambridge) has found Jackdaws able to respond to human expressions, and there are examples of them being befriended and trained by humans (although of course it is illegal to keep a wild bird as a captive pet).

Things were not always this cordial though! Both Henry VIII and Elizabeth I classified Jackdaws as vermin under their respective Vermin Acts of 1532 and 1566, after poor grain harvests, and shooting of Jackdaws was commonplace until the late 19th Century when it became recognised that, not only were they less culpable for crop failures and game predation on managed land, but they could be helpful in some respects (e.g. pest control).

Call me an old romantic if you like, but one of my favourite things about Jackdaws is that – like many species – they pair for life. And there has been some interesting research into their social hierarchies. Austrian ornithologist Konrad Lorenz found that a single female Jackdaw, who ranks lowest in the pecking order, can boost her status by pairing with a male and assuming his seniority. She will then be accepted by others in the group, have equal access to food and be allowed to bully lower ranking females by pecking! Lorenz's work in the 1930s also found regular same-sex pairings among Jackdaws, particularly among those in captivity. Then Dutch researchers in the 1970s discovered that, when females in the wild lose a partner, they will often pair with another female, or even two other females, to form a same-sex union through which to protect their interests!

Things are not even as simple as that though! In 2012, the Cornish Jackdaw Project was set up to examine Jackdaws' social and sexual behaviour, and they have found a significant amount of non-monogamous behaviour, even though pairings are generally life-long! Males would sometimes mate with a second female partner and allow her eggs into the 'marital' nest; and occasionally a rogue male would visit and mate with a female at a nest when her partner was out! Who knew, eh?

Whilst my jottings concentrate largely on birds of local interest, it's perhaps worth mentioning that October (at the time of writing, so far) has been a spectacular month for rare visitors around the country. There are too many to name, but rarities include Red-Eyed Vireos in Yorkshire, a Wilson's Phalarope in Norfolk, a Red-Flanked Bluetail in Powys, and a Black-Browed Albatross off Plymouth! So keep watching and listening, folks; you never know what might randomly turn up on your doorstep!
